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



Suzie Vinnick

What do you get when you blend 10 Maple Blues Awards, 3 JUNO Award nominations, a couple of finalist titles at the International Blues Challenge in Memphis, more than a handful of albums, and a whole lot of soul? The final result would be one artist that has been decorated with some well-earned success: Suzie Vinnick. In this edition of Notes & Quotes, Suzie dives into conversation about being a multi-instrumentalist, the excitement about being on the road, and even touches on her thoughts about music itself.

For those who don't know Vinnick, she's well versed on her art of performance and musicianship, and has had her feet planted firmly in the Blues music scene for decades. A properly defined singer, songwriter, bass player, guitarist, she's performed with her fair share of artists that share that same immersion into the World of Roots. Suzie began her musical journey in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, at a young age, and from there, she has not looked back.

"I started playing guitar at the age of nine, then started playing sax at age 11, then bass at 13. Picking up the bass was really good for me from a musician's perspective. I used to go to jams in Saskatoon on Saturdays, and play bass, and ended up sitting in for hours. The songs were predominantly Blues - I learned a lot from that. It taught me a whole new way of listening to and playing a song, and how bass playing is more than knowing how to play single notes on the root".

Although Suzie released an album defining herself as a solo artist in 1994 (Angel in the Sidelines), she had already been on the scene recording music for a number of years. Of note: Back in 1992, she combined efforts with Tony Diteodoro (of MonkeyJunk), who at the time was playing in "Tony D. and His Cool Band", and released an album. Vinnick's history also boasts her collaboration with artists such as Rick Fines (another multi Maple Blues Award winner), and other projects (The Marigolds, Betty and the Bobs, Vinnick-Sheppard-Harte) that she has been happy to share the bill with.

Suzie's album Me 'N Mabel (2011) was her very first all-blues release as a solo effort, and it garnered her a Juno Award nomination in 2012. This paved the way for Vinnick's most recent album, Live At Bluesville (2012), and the multi-instrumentalist has been touring consistently and extensively since its publication.

When speaking to a multi-faceted artist such as Vinnick, a natural question to ask is; what speaks most to an artist such as herself, musically speaking. Her answer is one that might be expected - from a person who has had a firm grasp on assembling sounds for almost a lifetime. She says:

"Listening to melody lines and the timbre of a vocal can really move something in me. To me, the melody lines on a guitar are voices too. Those voices I am talking about come in all forms of instruments and musical sound, and there's something about that... intention that can really speak to my soul. With Blues, there are a lot of different voices. I love all kinds of music, but I've been playing the Blues for a long time, so I seem to really pick up on that."

Having those decades of experience being a full time musician, a natural question to propose to Vinnick would be if she could summarize her thoughts on having taken this path in life and occupation. She offers this; "I feel glad and grateful. It's not an easy undertaking, being an artist and creative person as a profession, and running your own business. I will say though, that being a musician and creator has created so many life experiences that just might not have happened if it wasn't for this life. The positive outcomes drastically outweigh any of the challenges that arise."

Naturally, the conversation led to Suzie discussing the upcoming Women's Blues Revue, and there was a lot to talk about with the woman who made her debut at the event as a featured artist back in 1994, and

who has been affiliated with the all-star band since she joined as a regular band member in 1995. With over 20 years of being part of the Women's Blues Revue band, it is obvious the event holds significance with the songstress. When talking about the event, Suzie is quick to tip her proverbial hat:

"It's a great group of women, and it's always fun to get together and share in the comradery. That first show was in 1994, so it's been a lot of fun for a lot of years. And, I can say comfortably that it is an honour to perform with all of these girls, and it always has been over the years. I really try to speak out as often as possible about how great it has been, and how being in the band has opened some doors and created opportunities for me. Sharing the stage with artists that I respect in a beautiful venue is always something I will look forward to."

The Women's Blues Revue is taking place at Roy Thomson Hall on November 16th, 2018. RIP Monika Slack, aka "The Uppity Blueswoman", was a fixture on the Ontario blues scene, usually found on the dance floor at blues shows or backstage schmoozing with the musicians. She was a tireless booster of blues artists in Toronto while she was here and also in Kingston where she settled in 1979, working as a bartender among other stints, including landscaping, while promoting blues shows, selling musicians' CDs at festivals and meeting artists when they came through town. More recently she was a contributor to The World of Blues, an online radio station out of California, boosting Canadian artists wherever possible. She made her last appearance on the station a few days before her passing to say goodbye and hear her favourite songs and artists, including Georgette Fry, Kingston's "Blues Queen," according to Slack.



It was a goodbye to her fans before her long-planned medically assisted death. At 59, she struggled with cancer and tumours for most of her life and last September she was diagnosed with stage 4 lung cancer. On the summer solstice, she received an injection before falling asleep, with her friends around her and her favourite blues playing in the background. Beforehand, she shared a last cigarette with her friends outside. They visited her apartment as they prepared, studying it. A back wall was the centerpiece, decked with concert posters and snapshots, signatures of all the musicians she met over her life -- she called it her "backstage pass." Settling in her favourite chair, Slack drank a glass of champagne and listened to the blues, played by members of The Shawn Dore band

-- Jessica Yarrow, and Don and Shawn Dore. She handed the glass off and shared some final moments with her friends. The last thing she heard was a mournful slide guitar. She continues to support the blues with a bequest to support Blues in the Schools in Kingston.



James Douglas Milne June 6 1948-June 16 2018: Jim Milne passed away on Saturday, June 16th in Lions Gate Hospital, Vancouver after a short illness. He was 70 years old. Always known as The Downchild Blues Band's"original bass player", Jim was a founding member with Donnie Walsh and Richard Walsh (Hock) in 1969. He performed on the band's early recordings, Bootleg, Straight Up, Dancing, Ready To Go and So Far. His bass playing is featured on the Downchild classics, Flip, Flop & Fly, Shotgun Blues, (I've Got Everything I Need) Almost and many of the songs that gave the band it's signature sound.

Born in the Hamilton/Stony Creek area he moved to Toronto at a young age. It was

the city that opened the door to his career in music. After his departure from Downchild in 1977 he headed for Vancouver to continue his journey in blues. While in Vancouver he played with The Foreman Byrnes Band (Al Forman & Jim Byrnes) and Kenny Brown & The Pervaders. Backing blues legends Lloyd Glenn, Lowell Fulson and sitting in with B.B.King were memories he cherished.

In the 80's he returned to Toronto, joining The Morgan Davis Band for a short time before relocating to Huntsville ON. In Huntsville he switched musical gears, playing country music with Ed Turley & Maplestreet and rockabilly with Matt Allen in Wild Card. In 2005 Jim moved to Gibsons BC on the Sunshine Coast to be close to his son Doug Leyden. He eventually gave up playing music for health reasons but it was still a big part of his life and he was proud of his contribution to Canadian Blues. Gone but not forgotten.

King Biscuit Boy The Lost Session 1981 Indie

Set the time machine for 1981, Richard Newell's then current LP, King Biscuit Boy, produced by Allen Toussaint in New Orleans, had been released in 1974. It was well received but there were frustratingly few recording opportunities after that. Enter Bob "Georgie Fab" Johnston and Darcy Hepner who wanted to get started in the music recording business and who approached Richard. They assembled a stellar cast of musicians at Grant Studios. Only the album never saw the light of day, no label wanted to release more blues and the master ended up in the studio basement. After a basement cleanup, Johnston and Hepner were told about the newly re-discovered tape and they decided to put it out in a limited edition. Remastered by none other than Nick Blagona, The Lost Session 1981 was released last fall to a local Hamilton record store and promptly sold out its first run. It's once again available. Richard Whitehouse is on piano; Bernie LaBarge & Peter Mueller, guitars; Roberto Occhipinti, bass; Claude Desjardins, drums and Darcy Hepner, saxes. On four tracks there is a horn section, a first for Richard: Rocky Verweel, trumpet; Bert Hermiston & Hepner, saxes; Simon Wallis, baritone & Gord Myers trombone. Richard is in superb form, the song selection now fairly well known from his live shows but this is, I think, their first appearance on record and certainly in performances of this calibre. "Bad Luck Soul" with the full horns is the storming opener; Otis Redding's "Hard To Handle" gets a makeover, KBB-style; "Let The Good Times Roll" has a marvellous horn chart to go along with Richard's powerful vocal & harp;

"Blue Light Boogie" was a set list favourite and a single in another setting but here with the full horns and group vocals it's something special and this roaring version of "Mama Loochie" goes to the top of the list; "Georgia Slop" is even faster and not radio friendly but does include his Elvis impersonation; more gorgeous R&B follows with Bobby Womack's "I'm In Love", Hepner adding a lyricon solo; the horns return for "I'm Gonna Play The Honky Tonks", a 1953 hit for Marie Adams that isn't heard enough; "Hard Times" shows how well he understood the Ray Charles song. The one Newell original is "Goodnight", a fantastic groove of a set closer with the full horns behind his harp. After such an amazing session, it must have been a huge disappointment in an already troubled life that it was not released. However, we can have it now and it adds significantly to his discography and his legacy. Get in touch with Dr. Disc in Hamilton as soon as you can. If you have trouble finding this one, five of the songs have been available on an album called Two Hound Blues, a posthumous release put together by Richard's friend Sonny Del-Rio. The other songs on this CD are by Richard and Sonny from a different session. This album is on Spotify.



Spencer MacKenzie Cold November Gypsy Soul/Fontana North/Universal


A sophomore album is always difficult but Spencer MacKenzie, now 18, has met that challenge and then some: his voice has matured and his songwriting has blossomed. Working with producer Dean Malton and on one track none other than Eddie Kramer, he has moved into the big leagues. He retains the quartet sound, augmented here with a horn section & a chorus and mentor Brant Parker returns on guitar, playing lead on three tracks. The best example of his songwriting and his performing is "Cold November", the title song and its new single. Dedicated to the 'November 2015 Paris attacks and to everyone affected by terrorism and hate in this world', this impressive slow blues

deserves to be heard. Unusually for someone his age this is the first song in a sequence of four slow blues that forms the middle of the CD when the norm would be to keep it rocking. The album opens with a funky "Fine Place To Start" with the horns, a song full of pickup lines and not actually refering to its place on the CD. "Move On Down The Track" is a very good train song about obstacles, in this case keeping him from his baby. Parkin rips off a fine solo. Another highlight is one of those slow blues, "Your Mama's Crying", with its attractive lyric about a quarrel. Gary Clark Ir.'s "Next Door Neighbour" is one of the two covers here and the song produced by Eddie Kramer. He gives the band a much harder electric sound with Parker on lead, different but very much a highlight. 
Riot & The Blues Devils The Roxboro Sessions Self

This is a veteran Montreal trio led by a man who calls himself Riot. He plays guitar and sings while Big Papa Mike handles bass and Mark Di Claudio drums. André Chrétien adds keyboards for the CD. They play some fine rocking blues as those who were at the Aurora Winter Blues Festival will attest. Songwriting credits here go to the trio and they get full marks for the opening "Saturday Night Widow", perhaps the finest song written for and about a working musician's wife that I've heard. With Riot rocking away on acoustic slide, this one's a keeper and just check out that middle solo. A slab of R&B is up next with "How Many Times" producer and MBA winner Frankie Thiffault supplies the appropriate horns. Riot is on electric here with another imaginative solo." [D Kisses" is a lovely Stones-ish ballad with Riot back on slide in a delightful stop time paean to his partner. "Walls Are Closing In" is a more traditional sounding slow blues with sterling piano & guitar. More R&B follows with the B3-led "Do I Have To Beg", a soaring electric guitar solo taking it out. One more highlight is the rockabilly blues "Howling At The Moon" and a frantic one it is. Riot is an excellent singer, reminding me at times of Matt Andersen, and with this band and the quality of these songs, making for a hard combination to beat. Their previous album was a live CD/DVD set, you will enjoy that one too. Their web site is www.riotdevils.com.



Dan Doiron Livin' Centre Stage Earwig

Dan Doiron becomes the third Canadian bluesman to sign with Chicago's Earwig Music, after BC's Les Copeland and Hamilton-born, Mississippi residing Guitar Mikey. Doiron calls Halifax home now being originally from Cape Breton and after several years as a sideman releases his fourth solo album. He has represented Atlantic Canada twice at the IBCs and will do much better with this excellent disc. He fronts a quitar/ keys/bass & drums lineup and has a very good set of blues-rock songs to play for us. The first single is an uptempo tribute to the early blues ambassadors called "Ridin' The Rods" contrasting the wealthy in their luxury coach to the hobos in the boxcars. If I were to release a second single, it would be "It Is What It Is", a rather clever but cynical reworking of clichés with a great groove. There are a couple of radio-friendly ballads:"Cheap Trick" and "Rocky And Adrian" a lovely song to his parents. The title song sums up his view that people should follow their dream regardless of age. He has set up a project with its own web site to further that cause: www. liveCentreStage.com. It has an attractive tune too. Doiron is a very good singer and guitarist with a knack for a melody. A most attractive album. His web site is www.dandoiron.com and it shows he's not leaving the Maritimes any time soon but if you're there you should make a point of catching a show.



Rory Block A Woman's Soul Stony Plain/

After six albums that were tributes to the 'rediscovered' bluesmen that she had met personally, Rory Block's new series is entitled 'Power Women Of The Blues'. In her perceptive and well-written liner note she points out how difficult it must have been for women to pursue a career in blues along with all the other obstacles they would face in the Jim Crow South. One woman who would rise far above all that through sheer talent and will power is Bessie Smith. Although perhaps an obvious first choice, it did present several problems for Block: Smith often recorded with a jazz band; she often used songs written by professional songwriters, not working blues men or women and she overcame that possible problem with the force of her art. Block dealt with the first by transcribing the songs for acoustic guitars as only she can and the other two by singing her heart out. In a final note, Block deals with the overtly sexual nature of many of Bessie's songs, pointing out that they portray a woman's needs honestly, they're never dirty, just sexy.

At least for this first volume, Block has not contributed original songs about Bessie nor it seems has she altered any of the lyrics. What we get is ten gorgeous performances in settings that shine new light on Bessie's songs. In particular, her use of slide on many of the songs brings them much closer to country blues. It's hard to choose highlights from the ten songs here but "Kitchen Man", "Gimme A Pigfoot And A Bottle Of Beer", "I'm Down In The Dumps" and "Empty Bed Blues" stand out a little bit for me.

You'll find the entire package is very attractive, a worthy beginning for the series and a remarkable tribute to Bessie Smith.

July Brings Hot Talent To Cool Festivals. John Németh is just one of the many international acts flooding over the border for your listening pleasure, sharing the stage with your fav home-grown Blues powerhouses. Whether you're in the North, South, East or West of the province, there's something here for everyone:

Early July: Check out RBC Bluesfest in LeBreton Flats (Ottawa July 5-15), which is the stomping ground of MonkeyJunk who will be hosting one of the festival's All-Star Blues Revue weekends. The festival itself is chock-full of talent from the USA including Benjamin Booker, Beth Hart, Brandon Santini, Mr. Sipp, John Nemeth. Catch Canadian top talent like JW Jones, Steve Hill and Colin James to name a few. Thunder Baty Blues Fest (Thunder Bay July 6-8) brings northerners some high caliber acts this month like Melissa Etheridge, Sass Jordan, Mindi Abair & the Boneshakers and The Chain from Australia.

Mid July brings an impressive line up to Western Ontario as LiUNA Bluesfest (Windsor July 12-15) packs their stage with back to back talent: in one evening you can catch Sugaray Rayford, Danielle Nicole, Pat Travers Band and Colin James. Also on the bill are Angel Forrest, Jonny Lang, Beth Hart, and more. Take note that Sugaray Rayford plays 3 consecutive nights! Another impressive fest in the west is Lighthouse Blues (Kincardine July 13-15) which boasts a fantastic American presence: Joanna Connor Band, John Nemeth Band, Ghost Town Blues Band, Gracie Curran, Tas Cru, Danielle Nicole Band and Victor Wainwright & the Train. Canadian talent highlights are Soulstack, Sons of Rhythm, Rick Fines, Justin Saladino, Trevor MacKenzie Band and more.

Late July: Porquis Rock N Blues Fest (Porquis Junction July 20-22) near Timmins brings fab Canadian talent to their northern stage with: Barrellhouse Blues Band, Pappy Johns Band, Lee Holmes & the Beautitones, The Shaftsmen, Ria Reece Band, Jack de Keyzer and more. Closer to home here in Toronto, the Beaches International Jazz Festival is turning 30! Though this fest spans across most of the month, late July packs a solid blues punch with some highlights being Raoul and the Big Time with Super Chikan on July 20, and a July 22 performance by Digging Roots. Street Fest will have you strolling from band to band along Queen St. E from July 26-28 with performances (7pm-11pm) by: Blackboard Blues Band, Jenie Thai Band, Clint Ryan and the Burgess Brothers, Johnny Max, Blue Room, Jerome Tucker (to name a few). The Balmy Beach Club stage will host The Paul James Band on both Thursday and Friday, July 26 & 27. Get out and enjoy what July has to offer. 
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Blues Brothers guitarist Matt "Guitar" Murphy has passed away at the age of 88. He released his first album, "Way Down South," in 1990 and starred in both Blues Brothers movies, 1980's "The Blues Brothers" and 1998's "Blues Brothers 2000." He was inducted into the Blues Hall of Fame in 2012. Murphy said in a 1999 interview with The Indianapolis Star that he enjoyed the making of The Blues Brothers. "At that time, I was in heaven," he said. "I had never done a movie before. ... I didn't want it to end. We had so much fun doing that thing." Murphy was born in Sunflower, Mississippi. "Through his music, he will live forever. We ask that you join us while we offer condolences to the entire Murphy family," read a post on the official Blues Brothers Instagram page. Murphy's nephew, Floyd Murphy Jr., posted a tribute to his uncle on Facebook saying his uncle was a strong man who lived a long, fruitful life and "poured his heart out in every guitar solo he took."


