Raoul & The Big Time Hollywood Blvd (Big Time): Raoul Bhaneja headed to Burbank, California to record this very fun record, capturing the sound of the blues as heard in Hollywood films in the '40s and '50s. The piano work alone makes this a

must-listen! (Mark Rheaume)

Steve Hill Solo Recordings Vol. 2 (No Label): Clever use of amplification and electronics, not to mention talent, breathes new life into the concept of a one man band – let there be many more

Braithwaite & Whiteley Blues Stories (Big City): Many highlights dot the solo c.v.'s of both Toronto-based performers, but on their fifth album together, multi-instrumentalist Chris Whiteley and singer Diana Braithwaite show that they do their greatest work in tandem. Blues Stories offers a breath-taking variety of the blues.

Fathead Fatter Than Ever (Electro-Fi): If you like mainstream blues, you can't do much better than Toronto's Fathead. **Levon Helm** once called them "one of the best bands I've heard in a long time." Two decades on, they keep the party hopping.

Morgan Davis I Got My Own (Electro-Fi): Anyone doubting the timelessness of the blues should check out Davis's latest. It mixes bright new recordings with tracks recorded live in December 2000 (on the singer/guitarist's final night in Toronto, before moving to Halifax) – and there's none of the jarring juxtaposition or aural whiplash one might experience with, say, pop sessions, laid down fourteen years apart.

Marquee Lonesome Ghosts (Self): Gypsy blues from Alberta?

A.W. Cardinal and Jasmine Colette deliver just that, on their wonderful second album Lonesome Ghosts.

The sophomore disc even drops in the odd moment of Tom Waits-styled inspiration.

Crumb's album-art output, including a 1972 cover done for one of Crumb's own old-timey bands, which comes with the excellent maxim, "Music self-played is happiness self-made!!"

B.B. King: The Life of Riley (MVD Visual): Pay the Blu-ray cost (\$22.27), and you're the boss. There's also a 2-disc soundtrack and a book that seems to be delayed. An attractive multi-media career summary to have as BB nears 90.

The Rise & Fall of Paramount Records, Volume Two (Third Man Records): Focusing on the influential label's final period (1928-1932), a US\$460 package of six LPs, clothbound hardcover book and biographical sessionography logs comes in an aluminum and stainless steel casing evoking Art Deco stylings and Machine Age modernism.



John Valenteyn, Producer & Host of John Valenteyn's Blues on CIUT-FM and a past

Johnny Shines Live 1970 (Rockbeat): A previously unknown solo concert by the legendary fellow traveller of Robert Johnson, criminally under-recorded during his lifetime, and at the top of his game here. Country blues doesn't get any better than this.

The Original Guitar Hero and the Power of Music-The Legendary Lonnie Johnson (University of North Texas Press): Dean Alger's marvelously detailed analysis of Lonnie Johnson's career and major recordings. You'll



be amazed at the information he has unearthed. Make sure you get the CDR Alger's assembled. He doesn't spend much time on the Toronto years but you can get Mark Miller's book for that.

Common Ground Dave Alvin & Phil

Alvin Play and Sing The Songs of Big Bill Broonzy (Yep Roc): These sons of a California union organizer don't always get along, but when it comes to **Big Bill** they make the most wonderful music together.

Blues Image 2015 Calendar: John Tefteller puts out these calendars every year that include a CD of rare blues 78s, so rare he paid \$37,000.00 for one. The good condition Tommy Johnson "Alcohol & Jake Blues" is




one of 24 songs here for less than \$20.00 and you also get all that Paramount artwork.



Passings: Hamilton guitarist Brian Griffith, one of the city's best loved musicians, died in his sleep at his Pine Street home last month at the age of 60. He was Jackie Washington's nephew, and played and recorded with a wide range of artists including Willie Nelson, Emmylou Harris, Daniel Lanois, Lori Yates, Tom Wilson, Dave Rave and Harrison Kennedy. Despite his international reputation, Griffith was

happiest staying close to home and playing regular gigs in the city's clubs and cafes. Daniel Lanois employed Griffith on several albums, including Willie Nelson's Teatro and Emmylou Harris's Wrecking Ball. Griffith won the Hamilton Music Award for guitarist of the year in 2004 and 2007 and also played on numerous other albums that won HMAs.

In Oakville, friends and family of **Frank Garcia** gathered at the Abbey Arms to pay tribute to Frank Garcia, a tireless promoter of blues music, who passed away in September. Musicians from all over joined long time friend James Anthony to close out the evening with an all-star jam in memory of Frank.

Another friend of the blues was Kitchener entertainment writer and videographer **Philip Bast** who passed away in his sleep at the age of 63. He was longtime Arts Editor at the Kitchener-Waterloo Record and in recent years he produced webcasts and television reports on local arts and helped produce "Love Lost & Found: The Story of Mel Brown." He had attended a special concert and midnight showing of that documentary the night before he died.

Sex sells. From 1920 to the Wall Street crash of 1929, record companies such as Vocalion, Okeh, Victor Talking Machine, and Emerson commodified "dirty blues", recording and marketing them as "Race Records" and selling them by the millions of copies. This was an era when women performers dominated the blues scene and achieved superstar status. Recording artist Bessie Smith was able to command a salary of \$2,000 per week via tent shows and TOBA² engagements. Her success was due in no small part to her comic delivery of salty numbers such as "Do Your Duty", "I'm Wild About That Thing", and "Hard Driving Papa". Smith's rival-apparent, Ma Rainey, had hit records with "Shave 'em Dry Blues", "Deep Moaning Blues", and "See See Rider Blues". Lucille Bogan had hits with "Stew Meat Blues", "Coffee Grindin' Blues", "Honeycomb Man", and "Mr. Screw Worm In Trouble". The public's appetite for dirty blues was so voracious and profitable that record companies dispatched agents to sweep the South in search of just about any woman who claimed to sing the blues. Although the heyday of huge profits (and concordantly,

the careers of blues recording artists) was to wind down with the stock market crash, dirty blues endured in the work of later recording artists such as Bull Moose Johnson, Louis Jordan, Lil Johnson, and Blue Lu Barker.

In 1927, Guy B. Johnson, a social anthropologist a n d distinguished student of black culture in the rural South" (ourblues.

net), published an article in The Journal of Abnormal and Social Psychology called "Double Meaning in the Popular Negro Blues"3. He suggested that double meaning songs could be divided into two general

categories: "those meanings pertaining specifically to the sex organs" and "those relating to the sex act or to some other aspect of sex life".

Under the first category, Johnson cites "jelly roll", "cabbage", "keyhole", "bread", "cooking", "cake", and "angel-food cake" as popular code terms for female genitalia in the blues. Johnson cites far fewer examples of

code terms for male genitalia, however, claiming that "This is probably due to the fact that Negro vulgarisms for the male organs are not suited to double usage." Whereas it seems true that metaphors for female genitalia outnumber those of male genitalia,

code words are not as scarce as Johnson suggests: "black snake", submarine" (Blind Lemon Jefferson), "needle", "shrimps",

> "bait" (Robert Johnson), "long pedigree" (Ida Cox), and "rattlesnake", (Charley Patton and Johnny Temple) are just a few that come to

Under Johnson's second category, "meanings pertaining to the sex act", he cites the examples "rock", "roll", "jockey", and "easy rider". It is interesting that Johnson documents a mere four code words for the sex act. Perhaps it was the year in which he wrote the article and any limited access to material that might imply.

It is clear that Johnson is morally outraged by the sexual references found

in popular blues music of his time. His description of blues performers as "vulgar", "ordinary", "indecent", "common", "lower class", and "lower strata" barely veils his indignation.





Jordan Officer I'm Free Select

You may know this Montreal-based guitarist from his playing with jazz singer Suzie Arioli but he has a solo career as well and with his second disc he has returned to his first love, the blues. The relationship with Ms. Arioli came to an end and this album deals mostly with the aftereffects. He begins the program a bit unusually with a talking blues, "At Least I've Got The Blues", which pretty much brings us up to date in 4 minutes. He also finds room for a lovely solo to go with his engaging delivery. His vocals are indeed a nice surprise and beautifully showcased in this setting with just his hollow body quitar and unobtrusive bass & drums. "I'm Free" is a solid slow blues in which the previously happy family man looks into the near future. His performance brings Lonnie Johnson to mind, it's an album highlight and well chosen as the title. "When We Were Just Two" picks up the tempo a little, combining Buddy Holly & Bo Diddley. "I'm All Alone" uses the famous riff from Roy Head's "Treat Her Right" as he laments being on the road and away from his family. A solo highlight is "Life Just Showed Me" which again shows how much influence Lonnie Johnson has had. The one cover is "Ain't Nobody's Business", which gets a performance that fits in perfectly. Officer has come up with a rather dark, late night blues album, but one you can listen to without knowing the backstory. He debuted the disc at the Cameron House on November 6, but I hope he'll be back soon. Find out when by checking at www.jordanofficer.com.

Sabrina Weeks & Swing Cat Bounce Live SCB

A live recording (audio & video) before your home crowd is always a good idea and Sabrina & crew have some fine new songs to play for the enthusiastic audience. And the Kamloops crowd certainly brought out the best in this band on this night. "Bad Boys" from the first CD opens the show in fine fashion and it's followed by a couple of new ones, some covers and closes with "Got My Eve On You" from the second album. These two are perfect vehicles for Sabrina, who plays the flirting but happily married woman role so well. "Jimmy Dee" is about the local guy who always seems to be on his way back to jail. The covers allow Sabrina to shout out to her idols: Etta James's "You Can Leave Your Hat On" is an excellent choice and she makes the most of it. Tina Turner's seldom



heard "Strange" follows. "Tarantino" is a fine new original with husband Mike Hilliard on slide and with an impassioned vocal - a tribute to producer/director Quentin and now released as a video on You Tube. Leiber & Stoller's "I Can't Hear A Word You Say" was written for **Ruth Brown** and Sabrina has fun with it and Hilliard has another fine solo. She tackles Big Mama Thornton next with her version of "Hound Dog". All in all, this is an excellent showcase for Sabrina Weeks & Swing Cat Bounce. Sabrina has been here a couple of times recently and that's always a good sign. Too many bands just stay home and play before those enthusiastic audiences and as a consequence very few of us know about them or their music. The web site is www.sabrinaweeks.com.

Guy Bélanger Blues Turn BROS

The MBA-nominated harmonica ace Guy Bélanger's previous discs were not all blues but that's his focus this time out. To do that, he's put together three bands in three different cities: his Montreal band with André Lachance; here, with the ubiquitous Steve Strongman leading and in Chicago, with Studebaker John. The result lends great variety, unified by his unique harmonica playing. The program opens with a John Mooney version of an old Leroy Carr



tune, "Take A Walk Around The Corner (Courtroom Blues)", a fine uptempo acoustic blues to which Bélanger contributes an attractive vocal to go along with the excellent country blues harmonica. This is the Toronto band, which also is featured on a stomping instrumental next, "Queen Street Storm", with Strongman doubling Bélanger's harp over Alec Fraser's bass & Adam Warner's drums. Later on there's a new arrangement of "Corinna Corinna". The Montreal band backs five songs here beginning with "Highway Song", which features Bélanger's heavily amplified harp this time as André Lachance sings of blues on the road. He gets two more vocals, including a Blind Boy Fuller song, "Trouble". The Chicago band features Kenny "Beady Eyes" Smith, the Windy City's premier drummer, along with Felton Crews on bass. The highlight of these three songs is special quest Jimmy Johnson's version of "Last Night" - he plays guitar here and turns in a wonderful vocal. Hats off to Guy for giving this criminally under-recorded bluesman a place to shine. The harp work is simply stellar. We also get a roaring version of "Forty Days & Forty Nights" and Reverend Gary Davis' "Death Don't Have No Mercy". Bélanger's vocal on that last one and on Dan Penn's "Dark End of the Street" are outside his comfort zone and he might have been wise to get a singer for those as well. Other than that, though, this is a fine modern blues album showing how pre-war, post-war and contemporary styles can work together.

Roly Platt Inside Out Self

Roly Platt's name should be familiar to you from his role as a sideman over more years than he probably wants to remember but this Barrie-based non-singing harmonica player now has his first solo CD. With his old friend Lance Anderson as producer, he has assembled his own cast of stellar sidemen for a program of well-chosen instrumentals and songs with quest vocalists. That this is a harmonica player's album is never in doubt, Platt's playing is uniformly inventive & tasteful. I want to start, though, with the one Platt vocal, a song he wrote that's just a stomper, "Rippin' It Up". If you're still sitting down during this, you're not well. **Steve Strongman** was on board to write a couple with Platt and sing them: "Good Mind To Wander" has a great



tune, with Lance as a co-writer and on his beloved B3. Strongman also helped with "Ocean of Tears", and after Platt's powerful harp intro, turns in an impassioned vocal on this lengthy slow blues about lost love. Iohn Tilden plays the stunning slide part here; Tilden's is a name I haven't heard much since the golden days of Albert's Hall. I knew he was still teaching guitar but it's good to hear him on disc once again. Al Cross is on drums and Russ Boswell on bass. Jordan John guests on "Bartender's Blues", an acoustic, country-ish tune that closes the disc. The instrumentals really let Platt shine and The Crusaders' hit "Put It Where You Want It" is a great way to begin. It's just a warm up though for Platt's own "Mad River" a rocking harp workout, with Neil Chapman getting the guitar solo. Harold Arlen's "Over The Rainbow" is a bit of a change of pace but Platt certainly shows he can play this material and not sound like Larry Adler. His web site is www.rolyplatt. com.

Al'Wailin"Walker is a Vancouver veteran, a blues rocker with three CDs under his belt, but none of them very recent. I'm happy to report that this is an excellent return. He's apparently written more than enough new songs (hence the Volume 1) and they are all very good. This is power trio music with 2nd guitar and keys added where necessary and it rocks. The roaring "Stop Talkin" adds some political commentary as it's the politicians he's addressing. Jerry Doucette is featured on guitar. "Lookin' Good" is one smoking rocker but his description of the perfect woman might not be to everyone's taste. Walker turns in an amazing guitar solo. He can turn it down a little too with a new version of "Drink Muddy Water". Doucette is back and the two guitars play off each

other nicely although a solo is faded rather abruptly near the four-minute mark. "What Kind of Woman" is a well-played shuffle as is "Balls on Fire". Willie McCaulder adds his piano wizardry to great effect on that last one - as with "Lookin' Good", Mr. Walker doesn't bother much with euphemisms or innuendo. Add in some more experimental rock songs like "In Your Dreams" and "Black Mass" and you get some idea of Walker's wide ranging tastes. Eric Bibb Blues People Stony Plain/ Warner

Eric Bibb's Blues People is a tribute to Dr. Martin Luther King's "I Have A Dream" speech, an 'homage to the original blues people'. The title comes from a book by LeRoi Jones (Amira Baraka). He envisioned an album of songs about change & hope and invited many players from other parts of the world to join in. The songs are new, either by Bibb or with a guest, starting off with "Silver Spoon", Poppa Chubby adds electric fills on Bibb's acoustic autobiography. "Driftin' From Door To Door" is co-written with Michael Jerome Browne, who plays Bukka White's National Duolian guitar most effectively. Long time accompanist Browne then plays electric slide on "Turner's Station" on Bibb's evocative tale of a migrant from the south. Guy Davis contributes his "Chocolate Man" and leads off the singing on this lovely duet. "Rosewood" is the story of an African American community destroyed in a race riot. Bibb is accompanied by a string orchestra, an unusual choice perhaps but it adds to the drama of this indictment of racism. The Blind Boys Of Alabama & J.J. Milteau, the French harmonica ace, help out on a tribute to Rev. Gary Davis. His "I Heard The Angels Singin" gets a rousing performance with lots of spontaneous contributions from the Blind Boys. "Dream Catchers", co-written with Harrison Kennedy & Ruthie Foster, and sung by all three is the central reference here to Dr. King's speech. It's a masterpiece. "Needed Time" is the traditional song, opened traditionally by Taj Mahal and his banjo before a much more contemporary setting begins with Bibb, the Blind Boys & Ruthie Foster. The concluding "Where Do We Go" has to carry a lot of weight in the context of this concept album and Eric Bibb has come up with a lovely and helpful song, assisted on vocals by **Leyla McCalla**. I think Eric Bibb, with his low-key profile and obvious sincerity, is one of the very few people who could successfully do an album like this. Mr. Bibb and his producer **Glen Scott** have created an album that has a message and that all Bibb's many fans will enjoy.


