

Emily Burgess hosts Guitar Workshop Sunday Mar 1

Erin McCallum will be profiling local blues players in upcoming editions of MapleBlues. For this inaugural article she had a candid oneon-one chat with guitar player Emily Burgess who is hosting the TBS Guitar Workshop at the Dakota Tavern on March 1st

"I wake up every day, wanting to play guitar the best I can."

A telling explanation of why Emily Burgess is the accomplished player that she is. She also understands the work and commitment it takes to learn, hone, and refine those skills.

"You have to love music and put in the time to be successful". This philosophy is backed by Emily's playing, as well as her resume. From being a Humber graduate, to living life on the road, to teaching, this axe-donning musician has a long list of accomplishments.

When asked about being a woman guitar player in a music industry dominated by male quitar players, Emily says "I wish it didn't have to be a topic. There's no reason why women can't become great guitar players. It's hard to be compared to another woman quitar player just because you are a woman. Someone once told me that people listen with their eyes, not their ears, which I have found to be very true over the years. I get endless comments about

being a woman playing guitar, but I just want to be a guitar player playing guitar."

The truth is, Emily has certainly made her mark in the Blues community and beyond, and is more than capable of trading licks with the best. Serving as the guitar player in the 24th Street Wailers for the years, change was on the horizon for Emily.

She parted ways from the 24th Street Wailers last October, yet still has her feet firmly planted on the stage. What is she up to today? Currently, Emily plays guitar with The Weber Brothers, and the TBS Women's Blues Revue Band, and continues teaching lessons to aspiring guitar players.

"We'll be playing all kinds of blues music and talking about anything and everything to do with guitar. It's set up to be a learning environment and the audience will be encouraged to ask questions. I'm really looking forward to it!" It's clear that Emily IS looking forward - both to the Guitar Workshop and whatever her continued success as a guitar player brings her way.

Behind the Cobalt Prize

Prize, a contemporary blues composition award. The prize's founder Paul Reddick will perform as well. Brad Wheeler spoke to him about blues songwriting.

Can you speak about the motivation behind establishing the Cobalt Prize?

I'm trying to create energy in the blues scene by attempting to broaden its scope and its definition through songwriting. It's about the idea that songwriting is the central element. Blues tend to be modal and traditional. I think it could broaden its appeal through songwriting that explores the form.

If we look back at the Delta blues of the 1920s and the Chicago blues of the 1950s, are we now missing the cleverness and exploration of those eras?

I would say yes. Robert Johnson and Willie Dixon are probably the best examples of those two eras. They were writing sophisticated, interesting songs that were not dependent on guitar solos. They were powerful, and they were not all 12-bar form.

You mention guitar solos. What about the exploration of the form in the 1960s by such bands as Cream, The Allman Brothers and The Grateful Dead? That doesn't interest you?

Certainly. That was an interesting time for blues music, except it was known as rock and roll. They were not calling themselves blues bands. Maybe Paul Butterfield would be the exception to that. My feeling is that it would be nice if blues could broaden its scope without changing its name.

But are you talking about changing the name, or changing the music?

Altering the genre is a funny business. It may be preposterous. The blues have been used as a pallet, in rock and roll and in R&B. It just seems to me that it is still possible to explore the form.

I'm going to read you a lyrical passage. "Thought you'd never miss me till I got a fat city address/ Non-stop talker, what a rocker/ Blue-eyed murder in a size five dress."

I don't know it. It sounds Waitsian.

It's Van Halen's "Unchained", which I think is blues, as is something like "Runnin' With the Devil". Shouldn't we take blues where we can get it, and not worry what it's called?

But there's something unique about the raw beauty of blues music in its pure form. There's such strength to it. Of course it can be used to colour – and it is, because of its power. But I still think there's a possibility for blue music to be stronger within itself.

What about the resistance from socalled blues purists? You've had your own run-ins from that crowd when it comes to your own work, right?

I have met some resistance, here and there, from the blues press and from promoters. It's simple to market something when you know what you're going to get. To play blues music in a preservational or imitative way has its value, but the dwindling audience is telling.

Are you a fan of what Fat Possum did with some of its experimentation in the early 2000s adding trippy hip-hop production techniques to Hill Country blues?

Oh, certainly. There are all sorts of people doing interesting things with blues music. With the Hill Country blues, it was a shock to everyone to see those guys play such funky blues, with that raw, sexy quality. It continues to have a great impact, on The Black Keys and MonkeyJunk and Steve Hill.

You mentioned blues in its pure form. What is it, the blues essence, to your way of thinking?

There are a series of notes that have their own power. They just do, outside of individual artists or eras. Its vocabulary is a language. There's no limit to it.

"All the world in silhouette, with Sleepy John Estes and a cigarette."You wrote that. The vocabulary is there, maybe what's missing are poets like yourself.

My relationship with the blues is very personal. It was a vehicle for expression, and I had a responsibility to express myself. Just as the great artists who inspired me did. That never goes away.

So it comes down to the songs, right?

Songs are the wings that music travels upon. Songwriting is like rolling dice. It's magical. It's unpredictable. But as long as you keep rolling, something will come.

And if it doesn't?

There is no great responsibility to achieve. It's about making the choice to try.

We are at a loss for words. It is impossible for us to properly put into words how singular Steve was as a person. He was truly one of a kind. As Daddy Long Legs was a family, we are now minus one of our brothers. We couldn't miss him more. He was the stuff of LEGEND. Good-bye Steve. We love you." In an interview with Blues GR in Greece, Steve said "For me blues is a way of comforting people. Let people know that they're not alone. By speaking in a language that talks directly to their soul. Its about relating feelings to one another. Feelings of heartbreak, frustration, hopelessness. But blues also speaks about brotherhood, joyousness and celebration. It speaks about what's real." 

Colin James Hearts on Fire Universal

A quieter, ballad-heavy, mostly acoustic album is the new one for Colin James. He's touring more as an acoustic duo and thought some new material was in order - his last acoustic album goes back to National Steel in 1998. The first thing one notices is his vocals: warm, expressive, upfront: for someone who's almost as well known as a guitarist, this is something of a change of pace. The songs are mostly by Colin and Tom Wilson, the Lee Harvey Osmond leader and one third of Blackie & The Rodeo Kings. It's not all ballads and I liked these songs: "Heart's on Fire" could be Colin's tribute to the late [] Cale. It's a sorrowful but memorable song about watching an old flame searching for love when the narrator is still so close at hand. The two guitars of Colin and Colin Linden mesh beautifully and Sarah Dugas' harmony vocal is spot on. Linden's signature slide ignites the rocking "Just A Little Love", the narrator is certain he has what she needs. "Honey Bee" is not the Muddy Waters song but it is a stone solid rocking blues about rushing home from work to be with his honeybee. James plays some pretty effective harp here too. "You Were Never Mine" is from Delbert McClinton's team and no more needs be said. "Stay", the Rihanna hit, was apparently something they just started playing in the studio, it went down so well they decided to keep it. 'I Wanna Sing" rocks us out of the disc over Linden's slide as this heart on fire sings with an optimism not present on most of the other tunes. Recorded in Nashville, Colin Linden has assembled a stellar band: George Receli, from Bob Dylan's road band, on drums, Willie Weeks, the legendary bass player

and Reese Wynans, the B3 and piano man of countless sessions. He's currently on tour with Chris Caddell as an acoustic duo and they'll be at the Rose Theatre in Brampton on March 6 and at Massey Hall on March 11.




Rick Fines Driving Home Self

It's been a while since we've had some new music from multiple MBA winner Rick Fines - he felt he had to put out Muskoka Moon, a compilation drawn from his earlier albums, a couple of years ago but I'm pleased to report he's spent the time writing some very good new tunes. He's also decided to go electric, with a full band that includes a horn section on several songs. The result is strongly recommended. "Buttermilk Falls" is a tribute to his hometown (It's not far from the Southern entrance to Algonquin Park). The band cooks, the horns sound great and he sure loves it there. "This One Day" is a nice blues with a rhumba beat that has a wonderful lyric about starting a new life. There's a lovely baritone sax solo too. "Ridin'The Rails" is another blues, with Rick on slide - unfortunately the rails of his life are parting. He can rock out too, as "Long Gone" shows. Some of his generation did the right things, some didn't. Rob Phillips shines on piano here. You'll also like "You Took The Wind Out of Me" with its covocal with Alec Fraser, doing triple duty as co-producer and bassman. "Make The Change", with its Albert King guitar intro is another keeper. The other songs are equally good, if not quite as bluesy and Rick just smokes on guitar throughout. Kudos as well should go to saxman Kevin Goss. The web site is www.rickfines.ca and you should check there for a Toronto CD release party. The Peterborough Party was on Feb. 28 so it should be soon.

Danny Brooks This World is Not Your Friend HisHouse

The economics of touring with a band

get worse and worse and Danny Brooks has accommodated to the new reality very well - Debi Brooks adds harmony vocals, cajon and percussion to Danny's various guitars and harmonica. His vocals are as committed as ever and his all-original material won't surprise anyone here. The new songs are all very good though and he's expanded his musical range to include more folk, country and even a little reggae. The title song is a rather pessimistic one about how tough life can be, albeit with great slide and harp. Some childhood memories highlight "Blue Highway" and "All God's Children" is a story about a bar and it's manager from his early, hard-living days. "Spirit of Rock 'n' Roll" is a very good, uptempo paean to the audience that keeps him going every show. A lovely tune graces "Gotta Find My Way Back Home Again", a song written for daughter Caitlin who suffers from depression. Having plenty of his own demons to deal with, this is an especially moving performance. The lyrics



booklet says "One More Mile" is an older song re-tooled for playing on his new cigar box guitar, which he plays with a slide - it's stone solid blues. "Who You Gonna Call" has verses remembering his first trip to prison and then verses remembering pictures sent home by his father fighting in the war. The two images make for a powerful song. The concluding "The World Is Not My Friend" is not the same song as the opener, but perhaps a response to it. With Danny accompanying himself only on harp and with Debi's cajon as the only other instrument, it is a fitting conclusion. The duo made their way from their home in Texas to Hugh's Room last fall, they'll be back this month and next, beginning with a show at Long & McQuade's in Pickering on March 10. www.dannybrooksmusic.com will fill in the other dates.

Mike Goudreau T.G.I.F. & Je Reste Accroché PMG

Sherbrooke's Mike Goudreau is a most prolific singer/songwriter/guitarist,


these two discs being less than a year apart. He also leads the Boppin' Blues Band with its extended discography. www. mikegoudreau.com shows that Je Reste Accroché his seventeenth disc! T.G.I.F. is the English disc and the title song is from the Boppin Blues Band songbook, at least for the opening. After the first verse, Maxime St. Pierre on trumpet and Serge Arsenault on trombone get to play jazzy but short solos. The horns sit out for the slow blues "Ain't No Guitar Hero", a bit of autobiography in that he always wanted his guitar playing to be in the service of the song. He rips off a fine solo anyway. The horns come back for the jazzy "Jack's



Place", with a fine vocal from Goudreau and a sax solo from Dany Roy. "Blue Note Shuffle" is a nice instrumental in the same vein. "Don't Get Close To You" is a fine rocking blues and another highlight is the slow blues "You Can't Keep A Good Man Down". "Got Your Letter" is a very attractive country blues, with Goudreau on banjo the letter is of course a lover's rejection made all the worse for it being such a formal letter. "Give Me Faith" is an organled gospel tune and a couple more songs further showcase the Boppin jump blues style. He may not be using the name, but the tradition continues. Je Reste Accroché is no less interesting, with the title song's Motown-like horns. "Arrète De Boire" is a tough Chicago blues as is the grinder "Le Cimetière Me Court Après". "C'Ètait Un Peu Trop Beau" is a lovely slow blues to conclude. In between, there are more songs in that jumping Boppin Blues style. You'll be happy with either one or both. The Blues Violin featuring Lenny Solomon Self

Violinist Lenny Solomon should be a familiar name to you, going all the way back to the mid 70's, when he was half of the JUNO Award-winning folk duo Myles & Lenny. This son of a Toronto Symphony



first chair violinist is most recently known for the Celtic fiddle group Bowfire but has spent most of his time in the jazz world. He has now turned his hand to blues, assembling a cast of players perhaps better known in the jazz community than in blues: Mark Ganetakos on guitar, longtime collaborator & song co-writer Shelley Berger on bass, Mark Lalama on keyboards, Steve Heathcote on drums and, occasionally, three horns. Following in the footsteps of Papa John Creach & Sugarcane Harris, Solomon's virtuosity encompasses most every blues style: He opens in big band jump blues with "Jumpy", "Winter Tears" is a slow blues dedicated to the late Johnny Winter and co-written with Danny Marks. These two songs are done as videos as well, you can find them on YouTube. Just the basic trio is next as Ganetakos picks up a National for "Slow Slide Into Blues". Bassman Berger even gets a short solo on this most effective country blues. They do New Orleans too, on "Second Line Blues" - Ganetakos does some very nice slide playing here behind Solomon's violin. "Half Full Blues" is highpowered electric blues with Lalama on B3. Ganetakos is back on acoustic slide for "Fishin' Blues", another highlight. "Jojo" is a thinly disguised "Mojo" that takes the disc out on an uptempo, Chicago blues mode. Solomon's violin playing is exemplary - for all his other work, he's obviously well versed in the blues. So if some blues on violin suits your mood, this one's for you. Ganetakos's playing makes for a most effective pairing with Solomon and I hope they get to work together again on disc. Meanwhile, if you see his name on anything, he's definitely worth a closer look. Solomon's extensive cv is at www. lennysolomon.com and it'll have all the future performances for this new band listed there.
