

Quebec Blues Artists Sweep Maple Blues Awards

Canadian blues artists from coast-to-coast were honoured by their peers at the 20th Annual Maple Blues Awards gala in Toronto last night as a crowd of blues lovers gathered to celebrate Canadian blues at Koerner Hall.

Quebec blues artists swept the awards with honours going to trio The Paul DesLauriers Band who won Entertainer of the Year, Electric Act of the Year, Drummer of the Year for Sam Harrisson, and Bassist of the Year for Greg Morency. Blues belter Angel Forrest took home three awards including Female Vocalist of the Year, Recording/Producer of the Year and Songwriter of the Year. The Blues With A Feeling Award for lifetime achievement was awarded to Stephen Barry, who has been a fixture on the Quebec blues scene for over 40 years. Montreal-based Frankie Thiffault of Ben Racine Band took home the hardware for Horn Player of the Year.

British Columbia blues artists were well recognized with awards going to David Gogo for Guitarist of the Year, Harpdog Brown for Harmonica Player of the Year and Kenny "Blues Boss" Wayne for Piano or Keyboard Player of the Year.

Other winners at the sold-out gala event were Manitoba's Big Dave McLean for

Acoustic Act of the Year, Ontario's 17-year old newcomer Spencer MacKenzie for New Artist or Group of the Year, New Brunswick's Matt Andersen for Male Vocalist of the Year, and Joe Bonamassa for International Artist of the Year.

Edmonton's Cam Hayden, a long-time broadcaster on CKUA and co-founder of the Edmonton Blues Festival was presented with the Blues Booster of the Year award, a very special Maple Blues Award honouring outstanding contribution to the Canadian blues music industry.

In addition to the Maple Blues Awards, the third annual Cobalt Prize Contemporary Blues Composition Award was handed out last night to Ann Vriend for her song "All That I Can", with runners up Michael Kaeshammer for his song "Sweet Grace" and The Harpoonist And The Axe Murderer for their song "Father's Son". A cash prize of \$1000 was presented to Vriend with second and third place winners each receiving \$250, courtesy of the benefactor The Unicorn Project.

Hosted by Steve Marriner of MonkeyJunk, the 20th annual Maple Blues Awards included outstanding performances from nominees Tim Williams, Sugar Brown and Shakura S'Aida, Michael Kaeshammer and the evening's big winners, The Paul DesLauriers Band along with the awards gala house band, The Maple Blues Band. Marriner amazed the crowd with spot-on impersonations of Paul Reddick and publicist Richard Flohil, going so far as to shave his beard halfway through the show to fulfill the illusion.




HMV Closing: An Ontario Superior Court of Justice approved an application to place HMV Canada Inc. into receivership on January 27.HMV owes nearly \$39 million to HUK 10 Ltd and would require between \$2 million and \$5 million annually in cash to stay open, according to court filings, and the company was losing \$100,000 a day as customers turned towards online media in recent years. TBS boarder and MapleBlues contributing editor John Valenteyn, who has been minding the blues department at HMV, advises blues fans that this would be a good time to pick up some blues CDs. Musicians Take Note: The Ontario Arts Council (OAC) has launched a new website with a new online grant application and management system, which is now live. The dynamic new website will make it easier for applicants to search for granting programs that best suit a proposed arts activity. The new application process will be much easier for OAC's approximately 12,000 applicants each year, and more cost-effective for both applicants and OAC. With OAC's move to online applications, many granting programs have changed, and some 2017 deadlines have changed. When OAC held province-wide consultations to develop the 2014 Strategic Plan Vital Arts and Public Value, the agency received significant feedback. This concert was well attended as Bob Walsh was an icon and was recognized as one of the Québec's leading blues artists. Bob also had a huge influence on many of the great blues musicians on the Québec scene today.

Blues Baby: Award-winning blues and roots vocalist Shemekia Copeland is the proud new mother to Johnny Lee Copeland, born in Chicago on Christmas Eve, December 24, 2016. Weighing in at 6 pounds, 11 ounces, Johnny Lee is said have his mother's pipes and does not like to be messed with. Copeland's latest release, 2015's *Outskirts Of Love* received a Grammy nomination for Best Blues Album.

Guitar lovers take note: World renowned luthier William (Grit) Laskin has followed up his 2003 book on guitar inlay art, A Guitarmaker's Canvas—The Inlay Art Of Grit Laskin with a beautiful oversize, hard-cover, coffee-table book called Grand Complications, focusing on 50 complex inlay projects that he has completed over the last 13 years. In addition to being a master guitarmaker, he is a musician and songwriter, an artist and a storyteller and co-founder of Borealis Records.

For more than forty-five years, he's been hand-building guitars for such luminaries as Stan Rogers, Jesse Cook, Rik Emmett, and k.d. lang, inlaying many of these instruments with his personalized designs. No two are alike, and their starting points are as varied as the people who play them. Grand Complications is the story behind the story of fifty of these original designs from 2003 to the present. It describes how he teases out a client's interests and intentions, how he develops and refines his ideas, and how he brings them to life in his mind and on paper. From "Short Stories" that fill only the headstock of a guitar to full narratives that run the length of the neck, each inspired design is the product of research, deep thinking, and a little alchemy. Laskin is a true craftsman and his insights make fascinating reading for lovers of art, music—and the creative process. The book is available at fine bookstores, Amazon or from www.williamlaskin.com

Blues Music Awards Nominees: The Blues Foundation has announced its 2017 Blues Music Awards Nominees. Sugar Ray Norcia, individually, and collectively with his band, The Bluetones, received the most nominations with seven, including B.B. King Entertainer Award, Best Song, Best Album and Best Band. Chicago-based quitarist Toronzo Cannon garnered four nominations and he faces off against Norcia in both the Best Song and Best Album categories. Best Album probably ranks as the most competitive category, with Norcia and Cannon battling Bobby Rush, Kenny Neal, William Bell and the Nick Moss Band, who all have three nominations. Instrumentalist-Harmonica winner Kim Wilson is one of this year's nominees, and Cedric Burnside might again claim the Instrumentalist-Drums crown, Shemekia Copeland and Bettye LaVette also return to the categories they won last year. Detroit native Thornetta Davis's "I Gotta Sang the Blues" is up for Best Song, while Terrie Odabi is competing against the likes of Bettye LaVette and Mavis Staples to be named Soul Blues Female Artist. Hope for Hugh's Room

For over 16 years Hugh's Room has created a great space for the performance and enjoyment of high quality, live music. Richard Carson opened



the club in April of 2001 and the opening night roster included my brother Chris and I playing the blues. As well as their folk music mainstay they featured a lot of blues shows as well as world and jazz music.

Richard started the club and named it for his late brother Hugh Carson who always dreamed of such a venue. Richard's background was in the not-for- profit sector and unfortunately most of the years running the club were a financial struggle. In early January, cash flow problems made closing the only option. However, since that time, a group of music lovers and music business people has come together to revive the club as soon as possible.

There are still some pretty high hurdles to jump, including fundraising, restructuring and re-thinking the whole business model. However the committee involved in that restructuring has initiated a call for financial support with the immediate short-term target of \$150,000. They are planning a fundraiser for March 15 and then the first normal show will be next day, the 16th, with Lennie Gallant. But nothing will proceed if a fundraising threshold of 30K isn't reached on or before Feb. 20.

To quote Jane Harbury, long time publicist for the club, "What will it be used for? That target may seem ambitious, but this is the amount needed to cover upgrades to the club, current and owed salaries and cover some ticket refunds/losses. In short, it is to pay costs of reopening and keeping Hugh's Room open and operating until a new viable business plan is developed.

What does the donor receive? The only return on this contribution is the satisfaction that every effort was made to find a way for Hugh's Room to survive and prosper, and, if we are successful, recognition of the gratitude that these contributions were there at the most crucial time for Hugh's Room."

When I think of all the great blues I have heard there over the years from Odetta to Guy Davis, John Hammond to Lance Anderson's wonderful Last Waltzes and the "Genius of Soul" shows and so many other great local and international talent I can only hope some folks with deeper pockets than mine can step up for this. After running my Sunday afternoon Gospel series there for almost 15 years it is not only a lot of incredible shows that I recall, but looking ahead to so many new possibilities and hoping they can happen. I've been told that I should consider my March 26 show with the Fabulous Levy Sisters, Steve Eulberg and Nicole Edwards a "go".

Let's hope that Chris Whiteley and Diana Braithwaite's New Year's Eve show was not the last at this venerable Toronto institution. We'll keep sending good vibes and those with some money can help in the most practical of ways to keep Hugh's Room a continuing reality.

Harry Manx Faith Lift Dog My Cat

Harry Manx has a Canada 150 show at Koerner Hall on Feb. 3 and it will debut a new touring ensemble. Faith Lift is the new CD to go along with the tour. It is quite a departure from his usual sound in that he is accompanied by a string quartet. On the recording it is members of the Sydney Opera House Strings but at Koerner, it will be the Dévah Quartet (plus Kevin Breit, Davide Di Lorenzo & Clayton Doley). The album can be seen as a kind of career summary, the songs mostly drawn from earlier albums - after years of performing them he has reached a place where he felt a face lift was warranted. The instrumental colours the string quartet adds gives these songs an entirely new dimension. Clayton Doley makes his debut as an arranger, basing the charts on the organ parts that he too has often played but in some cases, particularly on "Baby, Please Don't Go/Help Me", he stretches out dramatically, and effectively. Manx plays guitar, banjo and/or mohan veena and adds an overdubbed vocal & harmonica. "Moon Going Down" is taken a little faster than the version on Bread And Buddha, with Manx playing guitar & banjo and a little harmonica, before the strings join in quietly. He adds some bottleneck quitar that heightens the contrast with the strings. "Death Have Mercy", first on Wise and Otherwise, has a vocal that shows how traditional songs improve with age. He plays the mohan veena and uses the song as the soundtrack to a video clip on his facebook page, a street scene sequence labelled 'From India With Love'.

"Working On A Railroad" is another traditional song that Manx transforms, but even with the strings, the original intent of the song is not lost. Longtime favourite originals like "Coat Of Mail" and "Point Of Purchase" are just lovely here. "Love And Happiness" may well have been performed live over the years but does not seem to have made it to disc yet. It certainly belongs here. Manx feels these songs represent his life's journey to find his own sound. His goal was always to combine East & West and the performances here show that he has succeeded in forming a seamless whole. The Koerner Hall date is part of a long, and long overdue, tour of Eastern Canada. Go to www.harrymanx.com for more dates.



Matt Minglewood Fly Like Desperados Cape Music

Cape Breton Blues Legend Matt Minglewood debuts album # 14 to kick off 2017. He is a pioneer of that uniquely East Coast blend of blues, country & rock and Fly Like Desperados has eleven new songs and one cover firmly in that vein. He also has a hot new band to play them: Emily Dingwall is on bass & vocals, 16 year old Nick McInnis on quitar, Jeff Stapleton on keyboards & vocals and long time drummer Moon McInnis. Special quests Roly Platt on harmonica & Mike Little on Hammond organ join the band for the recording. "Amsterdam", the first single, and the opening song here, is more to the country side of the blend but it's a fine song indeed: he and his new love are going to 'fly like desperados' to Amsterdam. There is a video for this one at his web site. "Shackles and Chains" is much more to the blues side, a downbeat tale of a man paying for his sins. Roly Platt adds some fine harp to the guitar solos. The gorgeous "Soft Place To Fall" sees him returning to his childhood home and safety. The harmony vocals are just superb. "Sister Cool" is another well-written rocker, about the activities of his ex-wife. "Kandahar" is an amazing song about what it was like serving in Afghanistan. He clearly had an honest talk with a few veterans. The song ends with the national anthem on electric quitars, shades of Jimi. Rodney Crowell's "Closer To Heaven" is an ambitious performance, this tribute to the common man comes complete with a soaring chorus and soaring guitars. On an album for and about the working class, this one fits right in. Back to the blues is "Weakness", again with Roly Platt, with remarkable insight into the human condition. "Yourself To Blame" is equally good and an equally good insight. Social and political commentary is within his gaze too - he's so fed up with what's going on in the world, he wants to go back to being "Young And Dumb", a superb rocker with some very clever rhymes. "Broken Dreams" is an even more searing "Khandahar" - a veteran sends his son off to war but to a very different war. Minglewood gives us a


glimpse into the condition of our returning soldiers. A lighter song concludes: "Nova Scotia Boogay" is a rocking diatribe against too many songs about Texas. There are no soft songs here, this bands rocks out, the songs are excellent, the singing superb and it's beautifully recorded. At 70, Minglewood does not have to pull any punches. Check out www.mattminglewood.com and have a look at all the awards he's won. This one will surely get him more.



Steve Kozak It's Time Self

The small print on the cover points out that The Harpoonist & The Axe Murderer are guests on Steve Kozak's new, fourth, one. In even smaller print are the names of Jerry Cook and Dave Vidal. Cook has a very prominent role on the first two songs with his sax work. The basic quartet is Kozak on guitar & vocals, Dave Webb on keys, Roger Brant on bass and Chris Nordquist on drums. Kozak's "Cane Sugar Sweet" is firmly in the west coast jump blues sound as is the fine version of Jody Williams' "You May". Cook sits out on Kozak's rhumba blues "Messed Up" but Webb's keyboards shine. Magic Sam's "Every Night And Every Day" benefits mightily from Shawn Hall's harp work and a stellar guitar solo from Kozak. Kozak's "Trouble" is a fine new one, with The Axe Murderer, Matthew Rogers, (who also produced) on lead guitar over some excellent drumming from Nordquist. Anson Funderburgh's "One Woman I Need" is a well-done reminder of a recent classic. Vidal quests on quitar. "That's Cool With Me" has Cook's saxes on board again on a stop time song reminiscent of Willie Mabon's "I Don't Know". "Stranger In My Hometown" is not the Percy Mayfield classic but a Kozak original. Little Willie John recorded "Love, Life and Money" in 1956, another fine choice by Kozak and a very good performance. He closes with a tough Chicago blues, "Goin' Fishin', with Hall blowing some suitably mean harp. Kozak

has a couple guest guitarists on board but he turns in solid slide work here. Some very good originals, some well chosen covers, a superb band, go to www.stevekozakband.com for your copy and if you're visting Vancouver, make sure you catch a show.




Elvin Bishop's Big Fun Trio Alligator/ Fontana North/Universal

Elvin Bishop keeps on rolling: he was inducted into the Rock Hall Of Fame as part of the hugely influential Paul Butterfield Blues Band, and into the Blues Foundation's Blues Hall Of Fame for his lifelong contributions to the blues, both of these happening last year. You probably remember his string of recordings for the Capricorn label in the '70's with his Top 40 hit "Fooled Around And Fell In Love". This is his sixth disc for Alligator and it surely proves his contributions to the blues continue unabated. The Big Fun Trio is a very attractive concept, with Bishop, the pianist from his road band, Bob Welsh and a veteran percussionist/vocalist who played on previous albums, Willie Jordan, creating that all important chemistry. A catchy boogie opener, "Keep On Rollin" has some good advice for dealing with difficulties, the first couple of lines about the political scene. Bishop & Jordan trade lines here. On Lightnin' Hopkins' "Honey Babe", they sing in unison and very well too. A couple of quests are on board, Kim Wilson being one of them and his harp work is featured on Sunnyland Slim's rocking "It's You", a solo vocal for Bishop. Rick Estrin is featured on acoustic harmonica on "Delta Lowdown", a Bishop-penned instrumental with some fine Welsh piano. The third guest is Charlie Musselwhite and he & Bishop wrote "100 Years Of Blues". It's the kind of talking blues Bishop is so good at and Musselwhite gets a verse too as they regale you about their combined 100 years of playing blues. They marvel that they're still at it - a highlight among highlights. A good number of the

songs, especially "That's What I'm Talkin' About", feature hilarious repartee between Bishop & Jordan but Willie gets a solo on Ted Taylor's "Can't Take No More", he does a fine job. The disc closes with a quite excellent instrumental, "Southside Slide". Welsh play bass on some songs and Jordan plays cajon throughout. Willie Dixon was a part of the Big Three Trio decades ago, Elvin Bishop has updated it wonderfully and they do have fun. His last album, Can't Even Do Wrong Right, won a Living Blues Award and three Blues Music Awards, I suspect this one will be on those lists too.
