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Raoul and The Big Time **DOWN IN THE DELTA**

Local musician/actor Raoul Bhaneja is bringing in some of his blues heroes to celebrate the Delta Blues and the 20th Anniversary of his band, The Big Time. And he's doing it in style with a big blues revue at Koerner Hall on April 29. Fresh off a red-eye flight from L.A., Raoul talks about his band and his connections to Winnipeg's Big Dave McLean, Misissppi blues legend Super Chikan and legend-in the making, "Big A" Sherrod.

In the near twenty years of performing with Raoul and The Big Time, I've been fortunate to share the stage with not only an incredible band featuring Darren Gallen, Terry Wilkins and Tom Bona and but a whole host of other musicians; local, national and international blues men and women of great reknown and talent. Each new interaction opens a door to a new experience of The Blues. I had always believed that the stage is where "the magic" happens. Being based here in Toronto, far from some of the centres where this music had it's birth (Africa, New Orleans, Memphis, St. Louis, Kansas City, Los Angeles, New York City, Chicago...) it was a convenient way to think. It is just music after all isn't it? What does geography or location have to do with it? Ilove this music; I play this music, that is enough. Isn't it?

I first arrived in Clarksdale, Mississippi on a cold day in December 2014. Funnily enough it was a research trip for my musical Life, Death and The Blues, which was to open the following year that brought me there for the first time. I had been to Chicago, sat in with Billy Branch at Rosa's on The West Side, I had played a number of gigs and recorded in Los Angeles with legends of the California blues scene but I had never made it to The South. It was just another dot on the map and figured I knew it all already, I mean I read the books, I listened to the records- I GOT IT!

It was dusk and I was staring at the horizon through a large tree with a split trunk on the Stovall Plantation, just a few paces from where Muddy Waters "shack" used to sit, the wet rich earth of The Delta, swallowing my feet and I realized I was wrong.

Geography did matter. This dot had as much significance as the one for The Taj Mahal or Big Ben or The Pyramids. How could I have spent all these years playing this music, inspired by artists like Muddy Waters, Howlin Wolf, Sonny Boy Williamson, Little Walter, Robert Johnson, countless others and not come here before?

In a handful of days my eyes were opened wide. In some cases I was staring at things I didn't want to see. The lasting legacy of slavery,



the ongoing struggle with poverty, inequality, and institutionalized racism and on the other hand a rich culture, natural warmth between people and need to celebrate a gift this place has given the world.

On my trip I met a number of talented musicians, countless entrepreneurs and fellow travelers who like the biblical wise men had followed a star back to this holy place and now were true converts.

Our first night I had been sent by my Big Time Horn band mate Pat Carey to The Hambone Gallery, property of Stan Street a musician and visual artist with a long association to The South Side Shuffle.

Stan immediately offered me the opportunity to sit in with the band that night, led by a young cool looking guitar player/ singer known as "Big A". Slashing through his guitar solos singing with a rich bass voice, he played traditional blues with his own unique spin. He had elements of a young Buddy Guy in his style but he was no imitator. He was a passionate original and I immediately thought to myself, "He has to make



his Canadian debut with us in Toronto". I would later learn from an amazing clip on YouTube that this same Big A was in fact Anthony Sherrod, who as a teenager, dressed in a sharp suit was invited out of the crowd, on stage by Buddy Guy himself where he makes quite the impression.

One afternoon I was guided into the workshop of a Blues Music Award winner, James "Super Chikan" Johnson, a man who grew up the child of sharecroppers and went on to play his unique style of contemporary Mississippi Blues all over the world. With the creative soul of a true artist, Chikan as his friends know him is an instrument maker, songwriter and singer who can entertain with great stories, a powerful voice and masterful playing. He is without a doubt a living legend. Chikan became the subject of a section of Life, Death and The Blues and one of his hand made instruments his "bojo" makes an appearance in the show, along with a great shot of the man himself.

In August 2015 I was lucky enough to bring Super Chikan and our long time mentor and friend Winnipeg's Big Dave McLean to Toronto to perform with The Big Time as part of PANAMANIA during the Pan Am Games, followed by a short trio tour. It was a great learning experience and a lot of fun for audiences to watch Dave and Chikan both explore their own connections to Mississippi. Funnily enough Big Dave one of Canada's great Mississippi Blues enthusiasts and players made his first journey to there only a few years ago and it was the subject of an excellent documentary called "It Ain't About The Money" which has played at several festivals to date.

On April 29th 2017 Raoul and The Big Time celebrate these three artists as well as a special appearance from Juno Award winner and Life, Death and The Blues co star Divine Brown in a celebration of not only two decades of Raoul and The Big Time but Clarksdale and The Mississippi Blues!

Notes Quotes

Chris **Antonik**

For those of you who have been following Chris Antonik since the beginning, there has been a definitive thread throughout his offerings. His first release (2010) garnered him a Maple Blues Award nomination (Artist/ Group of the Year), and his second album (Better For You, 2013) spent three weeks on the top of the Dawg fm charts and was hailed a "masterpiece" by critics. Now, Antonik is preparing to release his third album, simply named Monarch. One would be correct in thinking that the common thread might be the success of each album, however, there is a definitive intention that weaves its way through all his releases. This new release is being dubbed as the final album to a trilogy of self expression, and in this edition of Notes & Quotes, Chris Antonik delves into the intention, the process, and the man behind his new offerings.

Chris started our conversation by discussing the title of his new album, which is set to be released on April 7th.

"There isn't really a particular reason for the title. Monarch. The title came more from the strength of the word. I hope it gets people talking."

The conversation started with discussing the obvious; finding out what it is about his recordings that allow for his work to be considered connected through one intention. He says that all three albums are really about a journey of discovery. When discussing the similarities, he offers; "It's ok to make mistakes, or have flaws, because it is never too late to fix them. It's all about self reflection. That is what I want people to get out of this work."

When talking about Monarch, Antonik discusses specifically what fueled the inspiration that spring-boarded the concept and material for the songs included on the album. He is not shy to say that it was his recent divorce, and the journey of change that it provoked in him. When speaking about the result of that journey, he summarizes the intention of the album, saying; "The main theme is forgiveness. This album is a journey of self discovery. If you can learn to forgive and "let it go" - that's what I want people to get out of this album."

Upon discussing the fact that Monarch is deeply rooted in Antonik's own journey,



I couldn't help but ask how this new album would resonate with listeners who might be working through their own personal journey that might differ from the one that brought his album to fruition. He offers, "Regardless of my personal journey that helped create this album, there is a message that forgiveness is free for everyone. The songs are written in a way that they can speak to anyone, and it is a message that I think a lot of people can learn from. The World today needs the message of forgiveness, I think. Also, regardless of the personal stuff, I wanted to create a great sounding album too - one that people will want to turn up really loud!"

This part of the discussion was a perfect segue for Antonik to share his thoughts about the process of making the album in studio.

"I found the process extremely stressful and challenging, given the life circumstances that surround this album, truthfully" he says. "With that being said, I am really glad that I did it, and happy to hear the final product. It goes hand in hand with the journey of learning and growing."

Going further into what the process of turning ideas into songs, and then songs into an album, Antonik speaks about parts of the recording process that created a final product that people will hear when listening to Monarch. He offers these thoughts;

"Being a part of the pre-production was a huge asset. There was a great opportunity to really focus heavily on the rhythm, which I think is important. With the drums, we really wanted to create drum tracks that a hip-hop artist might want to sample on some of the

When looking at the liner notes, it is easy to see why Chris Antonik had the forum to scrutinize each and every track. On Monarch, a lineup of hugely competent artists join Antonik: Chuck Keeping (Big Wreck) on drums, Guenther Kapelle (Wild T and the Spirit) on bass, Jesse O'Brien (Colin James) on keyboards, Samantha Martin and Delta Sugar on harmony vocals, and many others. Monarch was recorded by multiple Grammy and Juno award-nominated engineer Jeremy Darby (U2, Pink Floyd), and co-produced by Antonik and Ted Onyszczak (Better For You).

Another point to be noted on this album is although Monarch is considered the final part of three albums, there is one notable difference that I heard when listening: Antonik takes on more of the musicianship on this album - the singing, songwriting and guitar playing are all areas that he takes on in a more dominant position.

For the aspiring artists who hear Chris Antonik and want to follow in his footsteps, he offers some words of advice:

"Keep practising, and always be true to yourself. I would also encourage people to be open to collaboration with other artists. Working with other artists - in my case I think of the songwriting - being able to work alongside someone can be a great asset.".

When asked about what's next for Antonik beyond the release of Monarch on April 7th, he mentions that the tour in support of the new album gets underway on April 18th At the Casbah in Hamilton. Of interest to the people of Toronto and surrounding area, Chris Antonik is scheduled to finish his first month in support of his new album at the end of the month. He is slated to perform at The Rivoli on April 26th. The show will feature special guests Samantha Martin and Delta Sugar. Also scheduled to perform as the opening act is Spencer MacKenzie, who won the 2016 Toronto Blues Society's TBS Talent Search.

Here Come The Festivals: The Orangeville Blues and Jazz Festival announced details for their 15th annual Festival. Festival Founder and Artistic Director, Larry Kurtz, stated "We are excited to announce the Festival will take place from June 1st to June 4th in downtown Orangeville and will feature over 90 acts performing on 3 stages and in local pubs and restaurants with pop-up bands featured on Broadway and Mill Street over the course of four days."

This year's Festival will have a larger main stage with improved sound and stage lighting and the entire main stage audience will be licensed with a \$5 per person daily admission fee to the Royal LePage Main Stage and Opera House performances.

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



Chris Antonik Monarch Self

Chris Antonik's third album was born in the crucible of divorce, a fact that colours all the songs here. We also have an explosive blues-rock album, complete with horn section, strings and chorus. With the help of some high-powered help behind the glass, we have a gorgeously recorded production. "(Between) The Monarch and the Wrecking Ball (We'll Find A Way)" lends the album its title. The song says they'll strive for a solution but the throne by itself in the field shows what happened. It's an excellent song, with gorgeous slide work and a powerful vocal from Antonik. Before that there are other originals: "Gold Star" (he won't get one from her), "Slow Moving Train" (to the end) and "You're Killing My Love." All is not anger, gloom & doom, however, as several of the songs deal with forgiveness and one of fond memories. "New Religion" stresses his new life and looks forward optimistically. The songs may be thematically related but Antonik has come up with some very good musical ideas for these thirteen songs, so good in fact that it's hard to pick highlights. If I had to pick one, it would be "The Art Of Letting Go." His band serves him well: Chuck Keeping on drums, Guenther Kapelle on bass, Jesse O'Brien on keys, Samantha Martin and Delta Sugar on harmony vocals plus many others. Antonik's guitar playing is masterful, never dominating his songs and his singing is very impressive. For someone who didn't sing on his first

album, his progress has been simply astounding. The release date is April 7 and there's a show in Hamilton at the Casbah with Jesse O'Brien on April 8. The Toronto Release is set for The Rivoli on April 26, with Samantha Martin and Delta Sugar, Spencer Mackenzie opens. After that, he embarks on a long US tour, something that's brought him a great deal of success. This album should guarantee more. His web site is www.chrisantonik.com.



Kim Doolittle Into The Blue Self

Kim Doolittle bills herself as a singer, songwriter, storyteller & musician and she's been living in the Peterborough area for some years now. You may remember her from her time here and she's toured the world singing on cruise ships. She has toiled in semi-obscurity for far too long. Out of it all comes 'Kim Doolittle Music,' a blend of blues, country and folk filtered through her East Coast upbringing and featuring her 'serious pipes,' as they've been called. For this album, she's enlisted the help of Ken Whiteley, who produced and helped write several of the songs. He also plays his usual assortment of instruments and brought along some other players that you know very well. The title song leads off, a rocking, optimistic song heralding this new chapter in her life - just take a look at that cover photo. Jimmy Bowskill adds lead guitar, Chris Whiteley, harmonica and Amoy Levy & Cecile Levy harmonize beautifully. "Under The Memphis Moon" was written during the IBCs, she says, and is about taking charge. Chris is on trumpet this time with Pat Carey on sax. "Poor Boy (Oh My My)" is a little bit of cajun fun, with Ken on accordion & slide. "Amazing Grace" gets quite an impressive reworking here, a song that obviously

means a great deal to her. "Everybody Needs A Good Friend" came about because no one was returning emails/ phone calls and is a well-written plea for personal contact, not social media. Pat Carey gets a fine solo and Doolittle gets to rap a verse! She co-wrote and duets with Suzie Vinnick on "It Just Don't Work Like That" - you can't simply forget lovers. Vinnick gets a lovely lead break on guitar. Doolittle's experiences on those cruise ships and the idiotic musical requests that get made are the subject of "Snowball's Day In Hell" - delightful. "Some Loves Never Leave" is a gorgeous ballad dedicated to Jeff Healey, with whom she played in the '80s. An album at this level of accomplishment has been a long time coming, maybe she'll finally get the recognition she richly deserves. There is no CD Release Party here yet but the main one is in Port Hope at the United Church, 34 South St. at 7:30pm on April 8. Ken Whiteley will be on hand as well as Healey Band alumnus Rob Quail. TG Swampbusters Swamp Rock Country Blues Self

TG is Tim Gibbons, a Hamilton guitarist/singer/songwriter whose second disc is a quite wonderful set of songs in all four of those categories, usually all at once. He is also a groove master. 'Swampy' Joe Klienfiltr on bass and 'Patch' on drums are the Swampbusters and that's all TG needs. TG plays rhythm and lead guitars and adds harp on most of the songs. His songs have some very clever lyrics and the music shows there's quite a lot of life left in those three chords. "Honky Tonk Angels," about a musician on the road, "Five Minutes Past Midnight" a fine slow blues about enjoying blues

on the radio (Yes!) and a hard rocking "One Hundred Proof Blues" will turn your listening space into a swamp party. TG has a sense of humour, too, as you'll hear in "She Always Ate Her Crackers In Bed." TG is on acoustic on this one, with slide & harmonica and cracker biting noises. "Pitching A Tent" is a rocking little tale of a camping trip. Maybe he knows about **Joe Hall's** "Vampire Beavers From Hell." "The Devil Gets His Due (Tonight)" is a party invitation (to the crossroads) with a very good groove. "Twist My Rubber Arm" is about a friend who parties even harder than he does. He's back on acoustic for the closer "She Gave Me The Blues" he's 'sleeping single & drinking doubles.' The web site is www. swampbusters.ca.



Mainline No Substitute Pacemaker/ Fontana North/Universal

McKenna Mendelson Mainline was one our iconic bands, with famous albums like Stink, Canada-Our Home And Native Land and Bump & Grind Revue-Live at The Victory imprinted in our collective memory. There were many personnel changes over their short lifespan but by the final LP, only Joe Mendelson and Mike McKenna remained. It was now the fall of 1972 and the album was released with little publicity the following year. Mendelson had already released his first solo album and in many ways this can be seen as a second one, but with McKenna adding what is perhaps his best slide work. Longtime producer Adam Mitchell contributes mandolin and background vocals. Mendelson wrote all the songs, plays guitar, 'harpmonica', drums and percussion. There are more players though on what is very much a band album. No one is credited with playing electric bass but it is very prominent. There is also piano on a couple and a female backup singer. "Meet You Beat You (At Your Own Game)" is classic Mendelson, his spiky half-spoken lyrics delivered in that unmistakable, gruff voice. "Get To You" is the closest song to the classic Mainline sound and "Give It To Me Straight" is a very good slow blues. It's clear that a great deal of effort went into this album, maybe all these years later we can give it the place it deserves in the canon. Joe Mendelson would soon become Mendelson Joe and, while continuing to record, would be more famous for his painting. McKenna would soldier on and there was even a Joe-less Mainline reunion for a short while. He is currently part of the re-formed Luke and The Apostles with a new album coming soon on True North. No Substitute's reissue here means all their albums have now been digitized. Mainline toured briefly with King Biscuit Boy, I don't know if that was ever recorded but that would surely be very nice to have. Check out www. pacemaker.cd.



Eric Bibb Migration Blues Stony Plain/Warner

The prolific Mr. Bibb wanted his new disc to open our minds to the plight of migrants everywhere, whether refugees of today or former sharecroppers leaving Clarksdale for Chicago. Helping out on this timely and worthy disc are our own Michael Jerome Browne and II Milteau, on harmonica, along with a couple of

"Refugee Moan" opens, a very effective preamble pointing out

how important leaving home has suddenly become. MJB accompanies on his fretless gourd banjo. "Delta Getaway" retells a conversation Bibb had with one of the many who went from Clarksdale to Chicago, It isn't strictly a blues but "Diego's Blues" is, as he relates the story of a Mexican field hand who took the place of the departed in the Delta. "Prayin' For Shore" pays tribute to the refugees desperate to escape their war-torn homes that didn't make it. Big Daddy Wilson guests on backing vocals. The title song, somewhat unusually, is an instrumental, with Bibb playing the resonator guitar on the cover, MJB on 12-string slide & [] on harmonica. Bibb writes that 'it's got that sacred geometry thing that goes straight to my heartzone.' "Four Days, No Rain" was introduced on MJB's last CD, written with his partner B.A. Markus. Its lyric about famine & drought make it rather more appropriate here and it gets a fine vocal from Mr. Bibb. "We Had To Move" was inspired by the childhood of James Brown. Bob Dylan's "Masters Of War," naming the people who create all those refugees, is a brilliant idea. MJB's gourd banjo and II's atmospheric harp help immensely in this understated but powerful performance. MJB & JJ on fiddle and chromatic harmonica salute the Acadian exiles with "La Vie C'est Comme Un Oignon," "With a Dolla' In My Pocket" has Bibb writing an early country blues that didn't have to pull any punches, our narrator would run rather than be lynched. "This Land Is Your Land," in its original version, reinforces the inclusiveness Woody Guthrie intended. MIB and Bibb duet on a new MJB/B.B. Markus song, "Blacktop," a stunning new one about trying to hitch a ride to anywhere -'Everyday, seem like murder here.'

The disc concludes with an African spiritual, "Mornin' Train," with Ulrike Bibb helping on vocals but an equally effective closer might have been "Brotherly Love" from earlier on the disc, which stresses the importance of welcoming those refugees. This is a valuable and beautifully done project, congratulations to all. Check out www. stonyplainrecords.com and www. ericbibb.com.

Congrats to "I Am The Blues": Daniel Cross's film I Am The Blues won two Canadian Screen Awards last month (these film awards were formerly known as the Genies). It won for Best Feature Length Documentary and Best Cinematography in a Feature Length Documentary. This is wonderful recognition of an important film about the blues. The film was also recently signed to a distribution deal in the U.S., where it is going into theatrical release now -- another real victory for this film.

Remembering "Johnny Shuffles":

Victoria's music community is heartbroken at the loss of musician John Fisher. Well known by his stage name "Johnny Shuffles," John is widely regarded as a father of the local blues scene. Busker Dave Harris, who performs as a one-man band at The Inner Harbour describes John's contributions to Victoria's blues scene as "incalculable".

John's partner Sharon Wadsworth wrote, "John's musical journey began in the 1960s.

In his family basement, he and fellow music legend Norm MacPherson started the 38 Slug Jug Band and the Little Red Roosters. In 1965, they formed Blues X Five, along with Richard Moore, Ron Flatman, and Ed Wright. Norm went on to establish his own musical significance, as recognized by his 2010 induction into the

Victoria Music Hall of Fame and a Lifetime Achievement Award. According to Dave Harris, "many people came and went from John's bands, all getting some degree of education in the blues genre. But it was after John and his partner Sharon Wadsworth restarted as Elmore's Bar & Grill that John really graduated to mentor of the scene." Many musicians credit Elmore's 1990s Jams at the Fernwood Inn, as giving them their start. Harris names a few, "Jesse Fisher, Gary "G-Man" Thompson, Bill Johnson, Daemon Baker, Morgan Smith, Gene Hardy, John Kernachan, Noah Kasper, Walter McFee and lots (I mean lots!) more."

Doug Cox, producer and artistic director of Vancouver Island MusicFest suggests

filling the huge

hole John leaves in the Victoria blues scene with memories of how John supported his fellow musicians, along with the great sound he made. He called John "an inspiration about how a musician should act and treat

others. He had the rare quality of being an ego-less artist. He was part of the fabric of Victoria." John's last gig was in January 2017, when Elmore's Bar & Grill played at Hermann's. After a sudden illness, John passed away on Tuesday, March 14.



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
