Adieu Prof

The mystery of the disappearance of Professor Piano, Scott Cushnie, has been resolved and the blues community finally has some closure. He was indeed buried under another man's name in a bizarre case of mistaken identity. There will be a proper send-off for the Prof in the coming month watch for details in the next MapleBlues and the weekly "Where It's At." For the moment, we are reprinting an updated version of a profile by Bill Munson which originally ran in the December 1996 issue of the Toronto Blues Society Newsletter (as it was called back then).

We're fast approaching 1997 - high time that Scott "Professor Piano" Cushnie had a record under his own name. After all. he's been on the local scene since 1959, hopping most ably among musical styles: boogie woogie, blues, R&B, early jazz, pre-war retropop, rockabilly, folk-rock, skypunchin' stadium rock - you name it.

Two Pianos, No Waiting, the brand new CD by Scott Cushnie with Doug Riley and Joan Besen, sticks pretty much to the first handful of categories. In other words, the really old stuff, with the emphasis on boogie woogie. Here, the blues are prewar classics like W.C. Handy's "St. Louis Blues", Little Brother Montgomery's "Vicksburg Blues", Louis Jordan's "Early In The Morning", Charles Davenport's "Cow Cow Blues" and Jimmy Yancey's "Yancey Special".

Many of Scott's seven originals on Two Pianos, No Waiting (and Joan Besen's one) also seem written for a different age. Not that this should surprise, as the man's music has tended that way for an awfully long time. In fact, a couple of Scott's own songs on the new CD first appeared more than 20 years ago: "Gemini Rag" was recorded with Boogus in 1974, and "Boogie The Night Away" was recorded the following year with blues quitarist Mike McKenna and Diamondback.

1974 may seem like a long time ago (jeez, it was a long time ago!), but Scott's musical history goes back at least another 15 years before that. On the back of the October 5, 1959 CHUM Chart is a small but historic photo: a young Rompin' Ronnie Hawkins guesting with Scott and his group, The Suedes, at the CHUM Hi-Fi Club on Merton Street. Among the other Suedes, all identifiable in the photo, are Pete Traynor (the amps guy) and none other than guitar great Robbie Robertson.

Just about everybody knows that Ronnie Hawkins soon hired Robbie Robertson into his Hawks, but few know that he



hired Scott Cushnie first. Fewer still are aware that the two Robertson "originals" recorded by Hawkins on his early "Mr Dynamo" album were songs from the Suedes repertoire. Perhaps surprisingly, Scott remains understanding: "I wasn't around to sign the songs over to the record company, but Robbie was. It's not as if he got any money for them."

Whatever, Scott's next couple of years were spent travelling up and down the eastern half of North America - first with Hawkins and then with other touring rockers with names like Jerry Warren and the Tremblers and Barry Darvell and the Blazers. Scott may have come home with no money or recognition, but he still has from those days a most amazing repertoire of stories about playing in the south to a lurid array of rednecks and racists. A sampling can be found in "Ronnie Hawkins: Last of The Good Ol' Boys". (While on the subject of stories, Scott also has some great ones from his days in the late '70s with heavy metal heroes, Aerosmith; the group's producer, Jack Douglas, had Scott tour with the group and play on "Toys In The Attic" because they'd played together years earlier in a couple of other bands.)

Back to the mid '60s: by 1964 Scott returned to the Hawkins fold, this time in an administrative capacity - running Ronnie's new Hawk recording, publishing and management 'empire'. His first productions were both blues (however pale): "I Got My Mojo Working" by Ronnie Hawkins and "Fannie Mae" by Robbie Lane. Both singers were backed by Lane's Disciples

with Domenic Troiano on guitar. Troiano's searing Toronto-style blues work also powered Scott's first recorded vocal, "Betty Jo" by the Stratotones. However, itching to get back into playing live, Scott then hooked up with one of Hawk's acts - the Vendettas. The group's drummer, Bob Yeomans, has been in and out of groups with Scott for a full thirty years now, and plays on eight cuts on the new CD. (Al Cross appears on another two.)

The tail end of the '60s found our man with Ronnie Hawkins yet again - in a band of Hawks that included King Biscuit Boy and drummer Larry Atamanuik (later of Crowbar, Sea Train and Alison Krauss). Scott appears on much of Hawkins' first Cotillion LP (recorded in Muscle Shoals), which features some spine-chilling harmonica / slide interplay between Biscuit and Duane Allman on "Matchbox", "Down in the Alley" and "Who Do You Love".

As electrifying as it was, and is, that sort of material was no longer what Scott really wanted to do. While there were lots of rock bands through the '70s - Tundra, Jericho, Diamondback, Malcolm Tomlinson there was also a growing focus on roots and old-timey music: blues and boogie with Boogus; a stint in the house band at the Le Coq D'Or Tavern on Yonge Street, backing international headliners; an aborted directto-disc album project featuring nothing but Fats Waller songs.

Most notably, at the end of the decade and all through the '80s and beyond, there





On the phone are Sarah Kirkpatrick and Jamie Fleming of the punk-blues duo Catl. They are "somewhere in Missouri," says Kirkpatrick. "I think it's Arkansas," counters Fleming. "No, we're in Missouri," Kirkpatrick corrects, "about to cross into Kentucky." Fleming takes her word on it. "Okay. Anyway, lots of cotton fields."

Cotton and blacktop, as far as their eyes can see. Par for the course for Catl, blues people by choice and road warriors by necessity. They've just released their fifth album, Bide My Time Until I Die, 10 roughhousing songs about dance advice (Do the Monkey Rat), food-based metaphors (Hot Baked Cornbread and Spice) and paying the price. The album begins with Drive, a raucous manifesto and explanation of what they do.

From the road – somewhere – Catl spoke to Maple Blues about touring, bad auditions and finding their audience by the light of a GPS device.

How's the tour treating you thus far?

Sarah: We're both pretty tired. But our spirits are good. The places we're playing, we've been to before, multiple times. The shows have been good. We could use some sleep, and some fruits and vegetables maybe.

Given your popularity in the United States and Europe, have you ever thought about moving from Toronto?

Jamie: You live where you live. When we first started we had a pretty good push from the media in Toronto. It was all good. Then we went away for awhile. It took us four years to



put this record out, and we kind of lost our foothold there. But it doesn't matter. If we have to get in a car or hop in a plane to go find an audience, we're willing to do that.

Where did you play last night?

Jamie: Memphis, at one of our favourite places, Bar DKDC, which stands for "don't know, don't care." The night before we played a house party for 15 to 20 people, outside Memphis. Everybody was having a whale of a time. There was an old soul-shouter called Booker Brown. He was just hanging out, and he got up and played with us. We're not really a blues improv kind of band. But we played a rock 'n' roll riff and he shouted over the top of it. It was actually pretty good.

Signing to French label Beast Records helped you get a slot at the Binic Folk and Blues Festival this past summer. You played to some 20,000 people there, is that right? Sarah: Yes. It was nuts. But you take it in and you think, "Alright, I guess I better enjoy every second of this crazy experience right now."

Can you compare the house party in Memphis with a crowd that size?

Jamie: The show is the same. Playing the house party in Memphis was just as fun and just as intense as it was playing for 20,000 people.

Despite the highs, do you ever get disillusioned with it all? It can't be easy, what you're doing.

Sarah: There's ups and downs. Being on the road, there's all kinds of generosity and kindness. And then there's sleeping on a floor in Prague or getting your purse stolen in Germany. But, until the bad experiences outweigh the good ones, we'll keep doing it.

Congratulations to Dan McKinnon on his recent marriage and having his album The Cleaner selected to represent the Toronto Blues Society in the Blues Foundation's Best Self-Produced CD competition. The finalists will be announced prior to The International Blues Challenge with the winner revealed during the IBC Finals on Saturday, January 26.2019.

Blues from Chile: Taste It is a high-energy blues band from Chile who will be making several appearances in Toronto this month including a special after-party following the regular Wednesday MidTown Blues jam at Alleycatz on Wednesday, November28. They also have a few plays at Roc 'n Docs in Mississauga as well as The Moonshine Café in Oakville on November 29.

Harp Players Take Note: The long anticipated Paul Butterfield documentary, "Horn from the Heart - The Paul Butterfield Story" is coming to Toronto Hot Docs. on December 21. www.facebook.com/ PaulButterfieldDocumentary.

Gibson saved: The troubled Gibson guitar company (aka Gibson Brands) announced a crop of new executives who hope to quide the business through a pivotal transition in its 124year history, as the company emerges from bankruptcy protection. The company's newly named president and CEO is James "JC" Curleigh, who is exiting his role as president of Levi Strauss & Co. to take the position.

Earlier this month, a U.S. bankruptcy



Blues legend Otis Rush died September 29 and the blues world mourns. He made a big impression wherever he played and long-time blues fans in Toronto can remember every time he came to town. Born in Philadelphia, Mississippi, Otis Rush moved to Chicago in the late 1940s and quickly began to make a name for himself playing in South and West side clubs. He helped define a distinctive West Side Chicago sound with his unique left-handed technique which allowed him to bend notes in ways few other bluesmen did.He won a Grammy for Best Traditional Blues Recording in 1999 for "Any Place I'm Going," and he was inducted into the Blues Foundation Hall of Fame in 1984. Otis Rush continued to play and tour throughout the 1990s and into early 2000. But he suffered a serious stroke in 2003 and never took the stage again.

court in Delaware approved the company's reorganization plan, which allows it to exit bankruptcy and keep itself in business. On Nov. 1, in parallel to the new executive team's first day on the job, will assume majority ownership control of Gibson. The incoming chairman of the company's board of directors will be Nat Zilkha of the investment firm Kohlberg Kravis Roberts & Co. (the new owners). He is also the former lead guitarist of the New York band Red Rooster, which released three albums in the 2000s and appeared at the Newport Folk Festival in 2008.

Under the reorganization plan, the

company will continue to manufacture its famous Gibson and Epiphone guitars, as well as maintain its professional audio business that makes studio monitors and loudspeakers under the names KRK and Cerwin Vega. It will be dropping its efforts to push into the home entertainment and headphone categories - areas that the company had once hoped would make up for a decline in instrument sales, but which accounted for much of its debt.

In its May filings for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection, Gibson estimated that it had up to \$500 million in debt.



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Notes Quotes

Nicky Lawrence

Born in Mississauga, Ontario, and currently a Toronto resident, singer, songwriter and actress Nicky Lawrence has her hand in many projects and can be found singing in multiple projects around the city. For this edition of Notes & Quotes, the conversation with Nicky Lawrence was rooted firmly in an upcoming endeavour that will be new to her: being one of the featured performers at the upcoming Women's Blues Revue.

According to Lawrence, the opportunity to be included in this year's lineup came during the midst of an Etta James tribute show at The Dakota; Toronto Blues Society President Derek Andrews was at that particular show and approached Lawrence about the prospect of performing at the Women's Blues Revue that night. The rest is soon to be history...

When asked how she felt about being one of the featured artists at the Women's Blues Revue, Lawrence clearly sees this event as much more than strictly a show. She offered;

"Any time you can get a group of women together and show that the girls can "hang", it's a fantastic thing. For me, this is about more than just a gig. What I am really excited about is paying homage to the women who really created the Blues by being one of the women who is performing the Blues at the Women's Blues Revue, just like Mamie Smith, Ida Cox, Ma Rainey, Sippie Wallace, Alberta Hunter, and so many others. If you look at Okeh Records and the artists who came through there, you know that the Blues would not exist without it. (Okeh records issued the 8000 series for race records and featured artists such as Sarah Martin, Eva Taylor and Esther Bigeou) This isn't just about the gig itself to me - it's about the women who created the Blues." And, in speaking about the Women's Blues Revue band itself, Nicky Lawrence draws a comparison to the Greats of yesteryear;

"The Women's Blues Revue band reminds me of the International Sweethearts of Rhythm. They were the first all female integrated band, and they were supposed to be the best integrated band out there. The Women's Blues Revue band is integrated and is made up of the best musicians out there, so that's pretty exciting to me."

For those who don't know, During the 1940s, the International Sweethearts of Rhythm played swing and jazz on a national circuit that included the Apollo Theater in New York City, the Regal Theater in Chicago. Recently, they have been labeled "the most prominent and probably best female aggregation of the Big Band era".

As the conversation was drawing to a close, Nicky Lawrence was asked what the one thing she wanted people to know about her as an artist would be. After the conversation that had taken place, her answer, unsurprisingly, was this;

"If you want to know one thing about me, I'd like you to know that I'd like people to be able to read between the lines." Of note, Lawrence is releasing a new single titled "Ugly Black Woman", which will make it's debut live at the Women's Blues Revue this November. For those who are planning on attending the 32nd Women's Blues Revue it is taking place at Roy Thompson Hall on November 16th, 2018. David Gogo 17 Vultures Cordova Bay/ Universal

Multiple MBA and JUNO Award winner David Gogo wanted to stretch the boundaries a little for album #15. He wanted to cover both his electric side & his acoustic side and he wanted to show that he listens to quite a lot of different music. I think you'll find though that the blues is not far away. The more overt blues first then: "Sulfite Boogie" features MonkeyJunk joining David on a paean to too much wine, a rocking boogie on which they clearly had lots of fun. Barbecue Bob's "Yo Yo Blues" shows his acoustic chops to marvellous effect as he plays some fantastic slide along with bass and light drums - a major highlight. Bob Dylan's "From A Buick 6" is more of a tribute to the late Johnny Winter with whom he became good friends, a loving tribute indeed. David plays electric slide. "Tomcat Prowl" was a song by Doug And the Slugs he remembered from one of the first concerts he saw growing up in Nanaimo. He discovered that this rocker was 'a pumping blues shuffle'. The title song is an ambitious rocker generated by seeing 17 vultures on a tree. Some dark thoughts subsequently surfaced that found their way into this song - another musical highlight. He closes with a second ambitious song that tries to address the opioid crisis. "(All I can do is) Shake My Head (and walk away)" combines acoustic and electric quitar parts as he follows a friend's descent - his quitar solo saying what his words cannot. There are a couple more rockers and an early George Harrison song but I think you'll agree that this one holds together nicely. Other than the MonkeyJunk track, his bandmates are Pat Steward on drums and Ben Dwyer on bass and a fine

engine room they are. Gogo was just here at the Canal Bank Shuffle and I'm sure he played some of these there. There is much more at www.davidgogo.com.



Kat Danser Goin' Gone Black Hen/True North

Edmonton's Kat Danser is now Dr. Kat Danser with her PhD in Ethnomusicology, taking her study of blues music to its highest level - she has spent more time in Mississippi than she has at home. She is also a tireless performer, now releasing her fifth album, produced by Juno-award winning Steve Dawson. The car on the cover is her 1949 Ford Lead Sled and much of the album consists some very well written travelling songs. Dawson helps a lot with his various guitars, Jim Hoke plays masterful harp, Jeremy Holmes, bass and Gary Craig, drums. They do an amazing job keeping everything moving. She leads off with the rocking "Goin" Gone", this time on a train headed to the South and then a car on Highway 61. "Memphis, Tennessee" is an attractive tune with Danser personifying the city, showing her deep knowledge of the importance of Memphis to the blues. She does something similar with her "Kansas City Blues", describing her feelings in terms of a winter day in that famous blues centre. Brownie McGhee's "Chevrolet Car" gets a lovely rendering with two fiddles highlighting the arrangement. Another fine original rocker has her pleading for a lover not to leave quite yet, "Hol'Up, Baby" features some fine Dawson guitar too. "Train I Ride" is credited to Fred McDowell but you'd hardly recognize it, with Dawson's much different guitar style and Jim Hoke on tenor sax. Danser's vocal is most persuasive. There is nothing dry or academic about this one, just a set of excellent modern blues. It's time for Ms. Danser to come east again and not just for the Blues Summit. Anthony Gomes Peace, Love & Loud Guitars Up 2 Zero

With this release **Anthony Gomes** wants to bill himself as a 21st Century quitar hero although, with a master's degree from U of T, he knows the blues is much more than that. He showcased his deep knowledge of the blues on his Electric Field Holler in 2015. For album #13, he has written some very fine songs indeed. As you might tell from the album title, this is a blues rock extravaganza. He calls "Come Down (from heaven BB King)" (because this kingdom has no king) a modern work song, and his guitar work shows pure homage. This was the first single and a major highlight. The flat-out chugging rocker "White Trash Princess" jumps right out at you, she's a gun-toting femme fatale he desires. The grinding "Blues in The First Degree" sees him pronounce his girl guilty. Especially good is his boogie shuffle "The Whiskey Made Me Do It", his explanation for bad behavior. It's just possible this excuse won't be sufficient as he gives us the lurid details his crime. Loud guitars do open the anthemic title song as a chorus joins him in his plea for 'three things worth fighting for'. It's actually better than it sounds - it is no doubt a crowd favourite. Gomes has some fun with the Robert Johnson myth in "Stealin' From the Devil", he's going to hell to get Johnson back. He plays some mean slide and has a gospel chorus help out - very nice. "The Only Woman I've Ever Loved" is a solid slow blues with a rather more sincere vocal than he's used on some of the other songs here along with some stellar soloing. Gomes has the leather-throated voice to carry over his power trio sound and he certainly has some excellent new songs. Mike Brignardello on bass and Greg Morrow on drums provide all the support he needs. He has some help on keys and background vocals but this is his show all the way. There's a lot of competition for 21st Century quitar hero but Gomes has thrown down the gauntlet now. His web site, www.anthonygomes.com, shows Quebec and New Brunswick dates on this side of the border but he's built a huge career in the States and that's where he spends most of his time.




Jack Semple Can't Stop This Love! Self

Guitarist/singer/songwriter Tack Semple mostly stays out west, he lives in Regina, which may be one reason he's not so well known in these parts. He has released some ten albums and has won awards for his television and movie soundtrack work. As he says on his web site, he 'plays modern blues without forgetting where he came from'. It's not a bad description of this album either. The opener is the title song and it shows a deep knowledge of BB King's later albums. He does a BB tribute show and "Can't Stop This Love!" shows how well this would sound. He did spend a couple years here as a member of the Lincolns and that love of a funky R&B sound is well represented here in "Don't Give Up" and "Dance of The Undivided" to name but two. "What If (you let me try again)" is a very attractive soul blues, a well written episode from the relationship wars, which form the material for most of the disc. Even better is "Let's Get Back", with its attractive melody. He can do a more traditional blues too, as in the original "I Can't Quit You", listing all the vices he's had to quit, except one. There are many among us who would appreciate his "Working Overtime", a frantic rocker about why this is too often necessary. He concludes with the mostly acoustic "Walkin", a tender love song. He's a very good quitarist who knows how to solo succinctly and within the needs of the song. With keyboards, bass & drums behind him, he's written and performed a very good modern blues album, well worth checking out. His web site is www.jacksemple.com.

Murray Kinsley & Wicked Grin Murder Creek Self

This band is based in Ottawa when they are not touring and they are seldom there. They've won a New Artist MBA and bassist Leigh-Anne Stanton won that MBA a couple of years ago. Murray Kinsley is the lead vocalist/guitarist/songwriter, Rod Williams plays harp and Bruce Saunders on drums & percussion. The hard-rocking blues quartet added Jesse O'Brien on keys plus Darcy

Heppner & Sonny Del Rio on saxes for this outing as well. With renowned producer Nick Blagona on board, this is a major leap forward from three already good albums. Things get under way with the defiant, pounding rocker "This Old Dawg (knows the blues)" (with Tom Bona questing on drums). They were working in Florida when the Parkland school shooting occurred, the slide-driven "Trouble Coming" was the result and it's worth the price of the album alone with its perceptive lyric and powerful performance. "So Long, Too Soon" is a well-written slow blues dedicated to those who've passed, principally Ron Casat, the late keyboard ace. The eye-catching title song was found on a road sign they saw




while touring in Alabama & they found the story behind it - all history should sound this good. There are more rockers, a jazzy "Dance the Blues" with Williams on chromatic and some lovely a capella singing as part of "Take Me Down (women & whiskey gonna make me pay)". The program concludes with an impassioned "Freedom", written by Colin James and Tom Wilson, originally on Colin's Bad Habits. Kinsley turns in a remarkable vocal performance as a man wrongly convicted. Their web site is www.wickedgrin.ca and it shows they are on a US tour with a stop at the Sportsmens Tavern in Buffalo on Nov 10. Catching an Ottawa band in Buffalo might seem unusual but they are worth it - they're an excellent live band too.

Eric Bibb Global Griot Stony Plain/Warner

The title of **Eric Bibb**'s new disc works on several levels. A longtime resident of Sweden, Bibb was born in the USA, the son of music legend **Leon Bibb** and has spent a long time soaking up the music of West Africa, revisiting his heritage. After five decades of recording and performing internationally, we can easily call him a 'global griot' – a keeper of an oral history and revered storyteller. He has invited some other griots on board as well: our own **Harrison Kennedy**, American **Linda Tillery** and Africans **Habib Koité** and Kora master **Solo Cissokho** among many

others too numerous to list. He also brings a global perspective to some problems not everyone recognizes as being global. The first single, "We Don't Care", is a stinging



litany of practices we all do with no thought of their environmental damage, from buying trendy sneakers without thinking about who made them to driving everywhere without thinking about polluting the atmosphere. Big Bill Broonzy's "Black, Brown and White" dates back to the fifties and perhaps even earlier but is all too relevant today. "Wherza Money at" attacks corruption in high places, particularly from oil revenues. Harrison Kennedy provides a grittier edge compared with Bibb's light tenor, especially on "Black, Brown and White", which also features Michael Jerome Browne on electric quitar. Kennedy & Browne (on harmonica) also contribute to "Brazos River Blues" a searing indictment of prison conditions, a song co-written by the trio. But Bibb spends much more time here advising us of the possible solutions with songs like "Gathering of The Tribes", "Remember Family", "Race and Equality" and "Spirit Day". (On the latter, Kennedy adds vocals and Browne plays his fretless gourd banjo & guitar.) In "Human River" he describes his calling: he's one of a million people telling the world the solution is love. The gently lilting African melodies serve to highlight the way forward, a stark contrast to the harder sound of the songs pointing out what must be dealt with. The instrumentation is also very ambitious, fully utilizing a modern recording studio without detracting from the informal, acoustic vibe of the program. His vision encompasses two CDs, recorded in twelve studios in seven countries, yet another level of meaning. After absorbing this masterpiece, you may well want to join that 'human river'. was the wonderful Canadian Aces: Scott, bassist Terry Wilkins, quitarist Mitch Lewis, drummer Bucky Berger, saxman Jody Golick (or Wayne Mills), multiinstrumentalist Chris Whiteley and singers Eileen and Marian Tobin, aka the Honolulu Heartbreakers. Though an '80s group, the Aces always sounded - and sometimes looked, for that matter - lost in the '20s and '30s. Their only LP was entitled Modern Primitive, which sounds pretty accurate to me considering the music that these relative youngsters were playing: old show tunes and pop songs, plus the occasional original that always managed to fit perfectly.

In other words, something that on paper may look very much like the new CD. But where the Canadian Aces were recreating old music with polish and pizzazz, the performances on Two Pianos, No Waiting come across as more personal and timeless. Of the 18 songs in total, six are duets with Doug "Doctor Music" Riley - one of Toronto's very finest musicians, of any style - and eight are duets with Joan Besen of Prairie Oyster. Both busy people, "Doug and Joan did it 'cause they both love boogie woogie", says Scott.

We should thank our lucky stars that they did. But most of all we should thank the remarkable, and remarkably versatile, Scott Cushnie for delivering this gem. "Two Pianos, No Waiting" - something to be rushed right out for.

** Two Pianos, No Waiting was such a success that it was quickly followed by Two Pianos, No Waiting, Vol. 2, and then by Two Pianos, No Waiting: Live at the Montreal Bistro. But after that, not all that much - a diminishing amount of gigging - punctuated by a brief reunion of the Canadian Aces and the unrelated appearance of an old tape as The Canadian Aces Live at Albert's Hall - and no more recordings. Scott Cushnie passed away in early August of this year as the result of a fall while out for a walk.


