
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Notes Quotes Myles Goodwin

A new endeavour is in its midst for a multiplatinum selling artist who has sold over 20 million albums throughout the course of his career, and been inducted into the Canadian Music Hall of Fame (2010). This edition of Notes & Quotes features Myles Goodwyn, who is the sole remaining member of the wellknown Canadian Rock band April Wine. In a casual and candid conversation, Myles talks about his latest musical effort, his motivation to release a Blues album, as well as what he thinks is the key to longevity in the music business.

Myles released the first Blues album of his career in April 2018 ("Myles Goodwyn And Friends Of The Blues"). It has been receiving favourable reviews in multiple publications (FYI Music News, SPILL magazine, Blues Blast Magazine, just to name a few), and features some well accredited musicians throughout every track - Jack DeKeyzer, Kenny "Blues Boss" Wayne, and Joe Murphy. The natural direction the conversation started with asking Myles about what it took for him - by his own account he does not see himself as a Blues player - to release a full length all-original album dedicated to the genre, and how he feels about the response he's seen so far. He offered:

"I worked hard to make sure that the words on this record were just right. I wanted to write the best songs I could possibly write. I even did lots of research. With other genres, the words don't have to be so important all the time. These songs are ones that I really wanted to capture everything right on. I took influences from a lot of different places. One of the things I did was listen to the all of the Greats - not because I wanted to learn how they play the music, but to get inspiration. I wanted to do a Blues album since the 60's. I didn't rush this because I wanted to do it right. It was really, really important to me that I made every word one that matters. I'm happy it is getting good reviews. Did I know that would happen? I did and I didn't. I think a lot of people expect to hear April Wine when they hear my name - a song like Rock And Roll is a Vicious Game - but I don't want that. I want this to be heard as a separate thing, because it is. And I'm not a Blues player - that's why I brought in such great Blues players for this record. (FYI Myles takes the reins on the singing and songwriting for the album) It's also why I took my time to really make sure that everything was just right."



Of course, it was appropriate to ask Myles Goodwyn, now 70, and still performing after decades of a solid career in music, what he thought is the key to longevity in the music business for him. Without hesitation, he says;

"There's a few things. The love and desire to write and play music. I've had that most of my life. My Mom passed away when I was 11 (1959), and I was really into music. It saved my life. It was my escape, and when she passed, I really dove into it. Music was always part of my life – even before then – and still is. The desire to keep going is also key. I can also say that being successful enough to maintain that living is a real factor too. And, I will say, there's a little luck involved as well (laughs). And hard work – lots of it!"

As per the Notes & Quotes standard, I asked Myles what advice he might like to offer to aspiring artists who are looking to have a successful career in the music industry. With confidence, Goodwyn says;

"I believe that nothing replaces work. You've got to work on the right things and do it one hundred percent. The people who make it gave it one hundred percent all of the time, and then they gave a little more than that." According to Myles, he will be looking to follow up the release of "Myles Goodwyn And Friends Of The Blues" with some live performance dates in 2019. Of note, he mentioned that he will be one of the showcasing artists at the upcoming Blues Summit 9. The Summit will take place from February 1-4, and will feature artists such as Sue Foley, Steve Marriner and Dawn Tyler Watson. Myles Goodwyn is slated to perform on Friday February 1st. The Summit takes place at the Marriott Courtyard Toronto (475 Yonge Street) and is the biennial event that will close the 22nd Annual Maple Blues Awards.

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"Can White People Sing the Blues?" (Part II)

Long time MapleBlues contributor Rita di Ghent tackles the sticky issue of cultural appropriation, very timely considering some recent events like the Montreal Jazz Festival's cancellation of the Robert LePage/Betty Bonifassi play SLAV.

In last month's issue, I referred to an email that a student had sent me, questioning whether or not she had the "right" to sing the blues as a "white" woman. I also summarized four arguments from Joel Rudinow's 1994 publication *Ethnicity, Expressive Authenticity: CanWhite People Sing the Blues?*—The Racist Argument, The Authenticity Question, The Proprietary Argument, and The Experiential Access Argument.

The Terms "Blues" and "White"

The question "Can white people sing the blues?" is a problematic one. As we were taught in graduate school, any terms we use in argument need to be "operationalized". To operationalize a variable means to provide a clear definition and, when

possible, provide a means of proof or measurement. So, how to operationalize "white person"? Does it mean"a person of European extraction"? If so, do Southern Italians feel white

in the same way as those from Northern Europe, for example? In the 1890s, the former were exported as cheap labour to the U.S. They were viewed as "the most idle, vicious, and worthless people among us" and some fell victim to the largest mass lynching in U.S. history. They weren't, as it turns out, considered "white," in spite of their European ancestry.

The truth is, the term "white" is too loaded to be operationalized. If you search urbandictionary.com you'll see that some contributors have "defined" white people as "people who clap when a plane lands", "[people who are] spoiled and who just have no life", "people who are generic in all regards", "someone who shoots up schools". You see, it's tricky. Another term that needs operationalizing is "the blues". At times, "the blues" refers to songs with a 12-bar form, three chords, and melodies and solos derived from a single "blues scale". At other times, "the blues" refers to songs that are non-vocal, bright in tempo, and more harmonically and melodically complex, using "outside" or "tension" notes from various scales. Sometimes "The blues" refers to music of any structure that sounds sad (e.g. "Cry Me a River" or "My Man's Gone Now").

Race Versus Ethnicity

As pointed out in last month's column, "race" refers to inherited physical characteristics:height, thickness or thinness of lips, texture of hair, bone structure, skin colour, etc. However, researchers (e.g. Smedley, 1998) report greater differentiation *within* races than *between* races. This complicates the idea that race alone is a reliable way to judge stylistic ability.

Ethnicity refers to "the shared social, cultural, and historical experiences stemming from common national or regional backgrounds that make subgroups of a population different from one another." An *ethnic group* is "a subgroup of a population with a set of shared social, cultural, and historical experiences; with relatively distinctive beliefs, values, and behaviors; and with some sense of identity of belonging to the subgroup." Ethnicity, then, seems to account for the natural ability of Greeks to feel time in 7, Andalusians to clap palmas, and Appalachians to play banjo.

Let's bring this all back to our question at

hand. Can my student, a selfidentified "white woman", trained in the classical tradition, be "successful as a Jazz/Blues singer"? As a teacher, I wouldn't speak directly to this question. I'd want to leave it as a personal,

if not rhetorical, question for my student to explore. If I were pressed to give an answer, I'd do that by way of some questions:

What music do you mostly listen to/watch?

If it's the blues, how much time do you spend listening to it?

Are you listening to masters of the tradition and know the key players? Or do you listen mostly to modern-day "revivalists"?

Do you "lift"? (Take note of every subtlety of a recorded performance and imitate it?)

Who are your friends?

How much time time do you spend playing and exploring the music *in community*?

Are you recognized by others in the community as conveying the tradition?

Do your performances feel authentic to you? Do you feel an honest connection or do you feel as though you're "acting" when you sing the blues?

In what way are you exploring ways to make a unique contribution to the art form?

These are the same questions that I imagine would be important to a Jesse Norman embracing opera, a Prince embracing glam rock, or a Dev Rynes embracing dance punk.

As my esteemed professor, Robert Witmer, gently and intelligently taught us, the lines between "black" and "white" are blurry and shifting. To my student I would say: Be disciplined. Be sincere. Have integrity. This trumps the agony of needing to know whether or not you're "appropriating".

Heralded as a living landmark (Berkeley Express), a national treasure (Guitar Extra), and one of the greatest living acoustic blues artists (Blues Revue), Rory Block has committed her life and her career to preserving the Delta blues tradition and bringing it to life for 21st century audiences around the world.





Whitehorse The Northern South, Vol. 2 Six Shooter

Back in May 2016 Melissa McClelland & Luke Doucet, the Hamilton duo who call themselves Whitehorse, released Vol. 1. It became one of the nominees for the Blues JUNO last year. They had already won a JUNO for Leave No Bridge Unburned. Vol. 2 may well do the same or even better next year. On both EPs, they combine their alt-rock (and laptop) sensibility with a deep understanding of the importance of the blues along with their very contemporary music, in each case adding new insights to the selected blues classics. Howlin' Wolf's "Who's Been Talkin'" leads off with electronic keyboards carrying the distinctive tune and with unison vocals, Doucet's White Falcon guitar solos paying tribute to Hubert Sumlin. Jimmy Reed's "Baby, What You Want Me to Do" has the same easy-going unison vocals over keyboards and the contrast with Doucet's overamped guitar solo is even more striking here. Son House's "John the Revelator" begins with gently picked guitar over heavy percussion before falsetto unison vocals begin. They thought that this end-oftimes biblical story could use some updating, so there are new verses on 'global warming, President Trump and religion itself'. The verses build nicely before the guitar picking returns to take us out - a highlight for sure. Slim Harpo's "Scratch My Back" opens with a marvelous harp solo from Doucet before we get McClelland's processed, down-in-the

alley vocal - this invitation would be very hard to resist. They nail the loping rhythm. Willie Dixon's "I Just Wanna Make Love to You" has never sounded so direct, Doucet and McClelland trade lines with equal abandon over his heavily-distorted guitar lines. "St. James Infirmary" gets unison, straightforward vocals over a guitar 'noisescape' (played by McClelland on Doucet's guitar), a banjo and percussion. Blues Top 40 hits of the fifties updated the Whitehorse way. Melissa McClelland is a very good blues singer and I hope one day she gets to be a part of the Women's Blues Revue. Whitehorse have a very big fan base and this album should serve as an excellent introduction to blues for them. The release date is January 11 and their web site, www.whitehorsemusic. ca, shows them in Whitehorse next month.



Eric Schenkman Who Shot John? Vizztone

You've seen Eric Schenkman's name in the listings playing guitar in Jerome Godboo's bands for some years now along with many others. He's also a member of Godboogie, a more formal Godboo lineup whose album Play Music and Dance was released last year by Vizztone. Schenkman was a founding member and guitarist for the New York City alt-rock group the Spindoctors. He co-wrote their five Top 100 hits but he now calls Toronto home. This is his third solo album and it's a power trio affair with Cody Dickinson of the North Mississippi Allstars or Van Romaine on drums and Shawn Kellerman, his bandmate in Godboogie and a veteran of the Bobby Rush and Lucky Peterson bands, on bass. While Jerome wrote most of Godboogie's songs, the songs here are all Schenkman originals that the press release says cover 'raw rockin' blues to funk/soul/pop'. They reveal a songwriter of considerable skill, capable of injecting

new life into several straight-ahead blues: "I'm Alright", it's Ok to go out with me (the second single); "Far Away" and "Only A Fool". Veteran that he is, each has some nice touches to lift the music out of the ordinary. "Locked in the House" is a flatout radio-friendly rocker with a fantastic groove and some unusual changes. Our narrator is fed up with his current relationship. A more ambitious blues is up next with "Lincoln's Feat", whose lyrics deal with someone in desperate need of salvation. An irresistable slice of New Orleans funk is the title song and first single - a tale of violence during the Mardi Gras parade. "Sign of the Times" is an attractive slow blues dealing imaginatively with moving from one relationship to another but regretting it. There are occasional keyboards, backing vocals and rhythm guitar overdubs but he and his co-producer Shawn Kellerman have managed to make this beautifully recorded studio album sound pretty much as it would be live. Schenkman is a seasoned vocalist, guitarist & songwriter who doesn't have to take second place to anyone. The album's release date is January 11, check out his Facebook page for details on his live shows.



Blue Standard A Good Thing Big Time

This is the new project for **Raoul Bhaneja**, entertainer, vocalist, actor, harmonica player & bandleader. He's joined by **Jesse Whiteley** of the famous Whiteley clan and a keyboard wiz formerly with bands like **JW-Jones** and the **24**th **Street Wailers**. The duo's name derives from 'jazz standard' and they chose songs from well-known jazz singers such as **Nat King Cole**, **Chet Baker** and **Jimmy Scott**. The album title comes from a **Joe Williams** song, which gets a lovely vocal from Raoul.

This Joe Williams was the well-regarded

vocalist with the Count Basie Band before heading out on a hugely successful solo career. His many blues recordings are rightly viewed as classics. You'll recognize many of the titles here, such as "Walking My Baby Back Home", "When Did You Leave Heaven" and "You're Nobody 'Til Somebody Loves You". You'll also marvel at the voice/piano reduction - as has been written in another context, these songs are not so much covered as 'uncovered'. Blue Standard save a couple of more uptempo songs for last: "Teach Me Tonight" and "Crazy Rhythm". This last one gets a quite wonderful harmonica solo from Raoul. Javmz Bee writes in his liner notes that 'open minded jazz aficionados should be impressed'. I would add that open minded blues lovers would enjoy this as well. Categories and labels are handy to organize information but when it comes to musicians it often does them a great disservice, ignoring the fact that many of them have far wider interests and abilities. You should check out this album wherever you get your music. And don't forget that Raoul Bhaneja will once again host the MBAs on Feb. 4. The CD release party will be at the Jazz Bistro on Jan. 17. I should add that this is not a complete departure for Raoul, Raoul and The Big Time continue to perform, go to www. raoulandthebigtime.com to check for shows.



Robert Davis Yuca Con Mojo Self

Robert Davis moved here from Kingston in 1981, playing harmonica and learning guitar while teaching in community college and working with the homeless. He was also learning Spanish and would regularly visit Cuba to play with band called **Bluespirit**. He formed a band here called **Up the Line**, which was a finalist in the 2007 Talent Search. **Fraser Melvin** is a very talented guitarist and arranger about town, currently playing with **Bad Luck Woman & Her** Misfortunes and you heard some of his amazing charts at the Women's Blues revue last fall. As Davis points out, Cuban blues is not that much of a stretch: after all, the Bo Diddley beat is a Cuban clave rhythm. Cuban musicians Yasel Giralt and Pedro Pérez Quintero round out the guartet and they play a variety of instruments in these sessions recorded in Cuba last May. Conga drums drive the opening "Got My Mojo Workin'" as it gets the Cuban street party treatment. Davis delivers a fine "Sittin' On Top of The World" with some local lyric changes and Yasel Giralt picking the Cuban laud. Quintero plays the bassline on a potbellied earthenware jug and a marimbula. The distance from New Orleans to Cuba is much shorter and Ernie K-Doe's "Mother in Law' sees Fraser Melvin taking the vocal with Davis on harmonica over some distinctively Cuban percussion.

Comments from Norma the studio cleaner are included and although she's speaking Spanish it's quite clear she's taking the mother in law's side. **Yank Rachell's** "Up North Blues" features Giralt on the Cuban tres and Melvin on acoustic. Davis throws in spoken asides, the way John Lee "Sonny Boy" Williamson did on Rachel's 1941 original, although Davis' are in Spanish. "Bo Diddley" takes the beat home except that the chorus is 'Listen to the Clave'.

RJ's "Me and the Devil" closes, a fine solo performance by Davis recorded at a festival in Cuba the year before. Something a little different then and maybe Davis and Melvin should make more working trips to Cuba. The web site is <u>www.robertdavis.biz</u>.

Robert Connely Farr & The Rebeltones Dirty South Blues Self

Robert Connely Farr is a Vancouver resident, who grew up in Bolton MS. In 2017, he travelled to nearby Bentonia to learn from **Jimmy "Duck" Holmes**, who runs and performs at the Blue Front Café there. It's celebrating its 70th anniversary this year and is the longest running juke joint in Mississippi.

Bentonia Blues is a unique style of blues whose best-known practitioners were **Skip James** and **Jack Owens**. They both learned from **Henry Stuckey**, who didn't record. Stuckey also taught Holmes, who is now the last of the originals in this style. All of this might lead you to think that Farr is a country bluesman except for the fact that he leads a five-piece Southern rock band called the **Rebeltone Boys**. Farr has now used this combination to write some very effective modern blues.

From almost solo performances to flat out rockers, the ten songs here are exceptional. The album's title song is 'Farr's attempt to reconcile/question some of the more controversial elements of the south such as the rebel flag & pockets of racism that are still prevalent'. Over twin slide guitars, a B3 and pounding drums & bass, he sings that if you go down south to criticize these things, you better watch your back. "Magnolia", with its lowtuned guitar & tom-toms, contrasts the beautiful flower with its not-so-beautiful surroundings.



He does write about Bentonia in several songs: "Blue Front Café" finds him sitting on its porch contemplating his mortality and that he may not be going to heaven. I don't think Skip James would recognize this version of "Hard Time Killing Floor Blues" but it is a remarkable, tuneful, performance. He and Holmes rewrote one of Holmes' songs, "Just Jive", a rocking number about some of his current partner's comments. He does sing about his adopted hometown but in a most unflattering way: "Lady Heroin" is a harrowing song about that epidemic.

Farr is a powerful, expressive singer and Leeroy Stagger's vibrant production serves him well as do the Rebeltone Boys: Evan Ushenko, lead guitar; Tyson Maiko, bass; Kyle Harmon, drums and Michael Ayotte, keys. This is a most impressive album and I hope he goes further down this road, we have quite enough southern rock bands. His web site is www.robertconnelyfarr.com.
