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The Blues Foudation has reported the passing of Blues piano great Henry Gray, who was inducted into the Blues Hall of Fame in 2017.

He played piano in the Howlin' Wolf band and other Chicago blues groups before returning to his native Louisiana in 1968. He was rarely in the spotlight, but he steadily built an impressive resume entertaining audiences around the world with his blues-drenched piano pounding. Gray, born on January 19, 1925 in Kenner, Louisiana and raised in the Baton Rouge area, was playing both in church and in local nightspots before serving in World War II and then moving to Chicago. Gray's style continued to develop under the influence of Big Maceo Merriweather, and he began playing with Little Walter, Little Hudson's Red Devil Trio, guitarist Morris Pejoe, and others.

Gray's tenure with Howlin'Wolf lasted 12 or more years, although he was in and out of the band. According to The Blues Discography 1943-1970, he recorded only eight songs with Wolf – four in 1955 and four in 1961, including "I Ain't Superstitious," although Gray recalled others. He did more sessions with Pejoe than anyone else in Chicago, and also recorded behind Billy Boy Arnold, Dusty Brown, Harold Burrage, G.L. Crockett, Little Walter, Jimmy Reed, and Jimmy Rogers, among others. Back in Louisiana, he recorded with swamp bluesmen Whispering Smith, Clarence Edwards, Silas Hogan, and others, although his blues retained its hard Chicago edge.

His first release under his own name came with a 45 for the Blues Unlimited label of Crowley, Louisiana in 1970, "You're My Midnight Dream"/"I'm a Lucky Lucky Man." Lucky Man was also the title of his first full U.S. LP, on Blind Pig in 1988. But Gray had been decidedly unlucky in getting his own recordings released in Chicago, as sessions in the 1950s for Chess, Parrot, and Atomic-H remained in the can, despite their quality, until they were released on vintage Chicago blues compilation albums many years later. Gray, who worked as a roofer and driver in Baton Rouge, became more musically prolific as an elder statesman, adding albums for HighTone, Delta Groove, Lucky Cat, and several European and Japanese labels while making dozens of European tours and establishing himself on the U.S. festival and blues club circuit. A 2006 National Heritage Fellowship honoree, Gray continued to hit the stages even as a nonagenarian.

We join the rest of the blues world in sending condolences to his family

May his spirit live on through his wonderful music.

Murray Porter celebrates 25 Years of Rez **Blues**

Blues Man Murray Porter will be coming to town to celebrate the 25th Anniversary of Rez Blues. His music career has taken him all over the world for the last 35+ years. He's a proud Mohawk man from Six Nations of the Grand River Territory in southern Ontario, who now lives on Squamish Nation territory in North Vancouver, British Columbia.

Murray may have a blues soul to the core, but he also grew up on rock and roll, R & B and country music. Porter's first CD since his 2012 JUNO Award for 'Aboriginal Album of the Year' is titled, Stand Up! and reflects these early musical influences. He strongly feels that this next album is some of his best music to date. This album was nominated for two Native American Music Awards for 'Best Blues Recording' and 'Best Male Artist of the Year', last Fall.

His new music is a little bit of protest songs, a little bit of love songs, and a little bit of fun songs. Murray's well respected in both the Indigenous and Blues music communities. His voice is as smooth as a velvet growl.

The new songs address many issues facing Indigenous People today including: 'No More' (Idle No More movement); 'Highway 16' (Murdered & Missing Indigenous Women & Girls); 'Don't Let Go' (Suicide prevention); 'The Water' (State of the water today in Indigenous communities); 'In the Same Canoe' (Unity amongst all People).

Plus, in true Murray Porter fashion, he has some tongue-in-cheek songs and heartfelt songs about Love: 'Please Stay Gone'; 'Some Day I'll Never Learn'; 'Two Hearts One Soul'; 'Love Will Find a Way'.

Whether he is playing an intimate venue for local blues fans, as a solo, duo, trio or with his four-piece band, or on a festival stage to thousands of music aficionados, Porter's love of performing comes across clear and strong. He has been compared to Dr. John, Joe Cocker and even Elton John. Robbie Robertson has called Porter "a master bluesman." He captivates audiences wherever he performs and makes new fans...and they never leave his show disappointed. April 16 at Lula Lounge will be no exception.



Voxxy Lady Goes to Europe, Part 2

"Don't Take Photos at Pusher Street"

I left Holland on December 16th. I broke my rule of never departing for anywhere in the morning, and booked a 7:00 a.m. train to Copenhagen. I thrilled at the idea of the train being conducted onto a ferry

and then crossing the Baltic Sea. I had visions of standing on deck, looking out onto the open waters, and maybe seeing some landscape that would remind me of one of my favourite films—Babette's Feast. It would be charming. It would be relaxing. It was a disaster.

I booked my train ticket online from Canada. A company called Happy Rail had a ticket from A m sterdam to Copenhagen for the incredibly low price of 40 Euros--and for good reason: the trip ended up being an Odyssey involving 8 intercity train connections--some with layovers--and

all involving drafty outdoor train platforms and copious stairs. There are no lounges, so be prepared to stand the whole time or sit on your suitcase. One of the 8 trains was late, so I missed my connection from Hamburg to Copenhagen. By the time the also-late-to-depart Hamburg train pulled out of the station, there was nothing to see out the window but blackness.

At Nyborg, Germany, the train boarded the ferry. Once stopped, we were all shunted off the train and told we needed to spend the next 45 minutes in the shops above. Passengers took a long flight of stairs upwards (no handicap access) and there we bought \$6 cups of coffee. Some boys played video games in the small arcade; some couples


trolled the duty-free shop. Most people sat in brittle chairs until the 45 minutes was up.

As we crossed the strait, I went out on deck, hoping to salvage even a shred of my *Babette's Feast* fantasy. Maybe I could gaze at the moon or at a horizon outlined by the glow of a sinking sun. The sky was so deep in clouds, however, that there was only a dark void beyond the ferry's railing. At the end of the journey, when I finally arrived at my hotel on Frederick Alle, it was almost midnight. I'd been travelling for 21 hours.

Copenhagen loves the blues. They have a mess of blues clubs, a blues cruise, and an annual blues festival in October that hosts plenty of great international acts. If you don't have a car, getting from club to club involves taking taxis (Uber has been outlawed in Norway) or buses at \$5 per ride.

The day after my arrival, I struck out to explore the music scene in a 19-acre area of Copenhagen called Freetown Christiania. This area was established as ramparts and a separate city by King Christian IV in 1617. It served as a military complex until after WWII, and then its use declined until it was abandoned altogether by the military by 1971. Enter homeless folks who squatted in the disused buildings, and neighbours who broke down a barricade and claimed the area as a playground for their children. Thus began a movement by the people to establish a paradise for peace-

seekers. The "Christianites" (no connection to Christianity) drew up a few rules to govern themselves and endorsed an open weed trade in their community. However, peace escaped them when criminal gangs from outside jockeyed to assume control of the drug trade on Christiania's Pusher Street. The gangs' attempts were repeatedly declined by pushers on the inside. In 2005, during a retribution hit, a carload of gang members with semi-automatics pulled up and fired 35 rounds into the streets of Christiania. Peace had by then eroded, and tensions between residents and government had become commonplace. It's into this fabled, clinging anarchy that I ventured in search of music.



After several minutes of walking, I came to Christiania JazzKlub. Jess Harpsoe, the manager of the club (there are no "owners" in Christiania), was standing outside having a smoke. He welcomed me into the dimly lit club, occupied by three cronies who sat smoking cigarettes and drinking beer. Denmark banned smoking in public buildings in 2007, but the ban doesn't apply to clubs that are 40 sq metres or less in size. Smokers seek out these small establishments, so their numbers are significant. I asked about the strangely out-of-place children's decor on the wall. "Yes", Jess explained, "this used to be a children's theatre."


Jess is fond of Canadian musicians. Mike Murley, Phil Dwyer, and David Braid have played the CJK to great review. Jess recalls Braid traveling with his own tuning fork and tuning the club's piano before the gig. Concerts start at 10pm and go until 5 am--civilized, like Chicago! Although an appreciative place to play, the CJK is not a moneymaker. Rather, it's a stopgap for touring musicians with a day or two to kill. The club has a blues jam on Sundays that starts at 7pm. There's no entrance fee and they pack the house. Players make around 500 Cronin (roughly Can\$95).

My return train trip to Amsterdam was a more forgiving one. As we clacked along, I reminisced about the itch I'd scratched these three weeks. I'd seen old friends and walked the familiar streets where I once lived; where I woke each morning to light the *kachetje* to chase the cold from the Bohemian attic where my sweetie and I had lived, loved, and played music; and where I'd assumed the pseudonym, Nikki Harlem, to deflect the authorities. I've decided to resurrect that name from time to time, so if you hear it, know it's me playing somewhere. Viva the blues.

who were selected as the best blues band at the International Blues Challenge in Memphis. They were representing the Ottawa Blues Society.

IW also took home the Gibson Guitar Award for Best Band Guitarist (and yes, he does get to keep that Gibson ES335). Hector Anchondo, from the Blues Society of Omaha, triumphed in the Solo/Duo Division as well as earning the Memphis Cigar Box Guitar Award as the Best Solo/Duo Guitarist. TBS representatives Sandra Bouza and Sean Pinchin showed Memphis (and the world) what Toronto has to offer and both report a great time while making valuable contacts in the U.S. and beyond. This year's winners also underscore the international aspect of the IBC, with a Canadian band taking the big prize and runners up from Spain (Felix Slim) and Costa Rica (Jose Ramirez Band), both now based in the USA.

The 36th annual talent competition took place Jan. 28-Feb. 1, with more than 260 blues acts from around the world competing for top honours. Touted as the world's largest gathering of blues professionals, it's also a talent-scouting and networking opportunity for the blues industry, attracting labels, agents, festival directors and promoters from several continents.

While the Challenge served as a centerpiece of IBC Week, The Blues Foundation also presented a varied lineup of unique events. This year's recipients of the Foundation's highly esteemed Keeping the Blues Alive Awards were celebrated at a special ceremony and another Canadian, musicologist Rob Bowman was recognized for his many years work in the blues world.

On Thursday, May 7, The Blues Foundation presents its other signature event, the Blues Music Awards. The 41st annual BMAs will be held at Memphis' Cannon Center for the

Closer to Home: Blues guitarist Mike McDonald has been named this year's winner of the Mel Brown Award, McDonald had hosted a weekly jam at Grossman's Tavern on Spadina for 13 years and after moving to Kitchener in 1993 he headed for the weekly jam at Pop the Gator that was led by Mel Brown—the legendary soul-jazz-funkblues fusion quitar master from Mississippi. McDonald became a fixture of the local music scene in K-W, he founded and led two CCR tribute bands-The Bayou Boys and Green River. He toured those bands back and forth across the country and when the Grand River Blues Society started a summer program to teach the blues to teens, McDonald volunteered to help. He's been a mainstay of the Blues Camp ever since. About six years ago he founded the Rolling Stones tribute band The Beggars Banquet.

McDonald says he is surprised, happy, flattered and humbled by the honour. "Thank you, a pat-on-the-back is always a good thing, no matter how long you have been at it," says McDonald. At 69, McDonald is on the waiting list for a kidney transplant. He needs dialysis twice a week. But he's never missed Mike's Monster Jam that he hosts every other Sunday at Rhapsody Barrel Bar. It has a loyal following.

"We are tickled pink to have Mike accept this award," says Rob Barkshire, president of






Sass Jordan Rebel Moon Blues Stony Plain/Warner

Veteran rocker Sass Jordan has won numerous awards and sold over a million albums. She maintains that all her work is influenced by blues and has decided to go all in for her new album, her first for Stony Plain. She's put together a crack band and culled some fine songs from across the blues spectrum for them to play on plus one original. She calls her band The Champagne Hookers, with Chris Caddell holding down lead guitar with Jimmy Reid on the other one, Derrick Brady on bass and Cassius Pereira on drums. The ubiquitous Steve Marriner guests on harp on most tracks with Jesse O'Brien on keys on a couple. You'll hear that she sticks pretty close to the originals but her signature raspy voice, her interpretations (by a woman) and the band's rivetting performances make this one a keeper. Sleepy John Estes'"Leaving Trunk" is the Taj Mahal version from his first album and this opener smokes. It's the first single too. Little Walter's "My Babe" retains his jazzy, light touch, with Marriner showing that his lessons were well-learned. Keb' Mo's "Am I Wrong" finds Jordan backed only by two slide guitars in an album highlight. More slide, with the full band, for Elmore James' "One Way Out" - another fine version. Freddie King's "Palace of the King" was a staple of his late career resurgence and gets an ambitious arrangement here with group vocals and a powerful Jordan vocal. "(I've Got) The Key (But I'm Digging a Hole)" is the one original and it's much

closer to her rock repertoire, although it fits in rather well here, written with co-producer D#. The arrangement for J.B. Hutto's "Too Much Alcohol" has an attractive new slide part and retains the lighter sound to emphasize Jordan's wonderful vocal. She concludes with Gary Moore's slow one "Still Got the Blues" bringing to a close a varied and successful program. I hope there will be more. Sass Jordan, being Canadian, is versatile and she's currently touring worldwide with A Bowie Celebration which will be in town on March 21 at the Oueen Elizabeth Theatre. This album will be released on CD & vinyl on March 13 but her web site, www.sassjordan.com, shows no dates yet for this wonderful band. Speaking of versatile, she also has her own Rebel Moon Whisky and her own Kick Ass Sass wine!



David Clayton-Thomas Say Somethin'

Say Somethin' is David Clayton-Thomas' call to action on a number of social issues. From a failed justice system to gun control to climate change and immigration, we get his bluesiest album in some time. In place of the Blood Sweat and Tears-style big band he has chosen a quartet of veterans to help him out: Eric St. Laurent on various quitars, Lou Pomanti on keyboards, George Koller on bass and Davide Direnzo on drums. He starts out with a piece about his teenage years called "Burwash", the industrial farm in northern Ontario where he was sent as a delinguent. A guitar left behind by an Indigenous inmate showed him the future. He takes the story to his days in Yorkville with the Shavs and on to New York where he found fame & fortune - a powerful talking blues and a major highlight."The System" is the second single and a jazzy

condemnation of the justice system has failed many of today's youth. Apparently, not much has changed since his days in the system. "Dear Mr. Obama" contrasts eloquent comments from the former president about including others with today's much more partisan rhetoric, a tuneful, well-written ballad. The first single is "Never Again", released last fall, an effective blues about the violence from guns in the US and the desperate need for gun control. "The Circus" is a jaunty, accordion-led song about the goings-on in Washington. A slower blues he calls "The Precipice" describes where we are in the fight for climate change, a hard-hitting call for action. "Bright Shining City" addresses the people who are building walls instead of tearing them down the way we should be if we are to welcome our neighbours. He ends with a tender paean to his homeland, "God's Country". It appears that various band members helped with the music and arrangements while Clayton-Thomas wrote the incisive lyrics. Wherever the credit goes, and David Clayton-Thomas is the producer, the result is brilliant accompaniments and well-crafted and performed lyrics. Perhaps listeners can choose one of these topics and say somethin' as doing nothing is not an option. This album will be released on March 20 and his web site is www. davidclaytonthomas.com.



Layla Zoe Retrospective Tour 2019 Self

With her famous ability to improvise lyrics, Layla Zoe would probably prefer to record live albums and this one is her fifth. With that title, this one does indeed look back at most, but not all, of her albums. Ms. Zoe began her career in BC, moved here and then to Montreal but has for some years now lived in Germany. She has a new trio and these two discs document an evening in Bremen last

November 27th. Five of the thirteen songs are from Gemini, her last album which was a 2CD acoustic/electric set and a song from it opens, "She Don't Believe" with just Krissy Matthews on guitar as accompanist, lyrically not too different from the studio version but Matthews' guitar part is very attractive. She then goes back to her very first album, Shades of Blues, and the more traditional blues forms she was using then. "Leave You For Good" is a song to a wayward partner and it leaves lots of room for Matthews, who certainly knows his way around a fretboard. "Don't Want to Hurt Nobody" is from Hoochie Coochie Woman and is quite a nice slow blues with bassist Paul Jobson switching to organ. The Lily was the first album recorded in Germany and moves her firmly into her current blues rock style. "Never Met a Man (Like You)" rocks out and turns into an audience singalong before it ends. From the album Sleep Little Girl comes "Black Oil", a remarkably effective performance of this climate change warning song. "Backstage Queen", from Breaking Free, was about a young woman headed in the wrong direction. It segues into "Weakness", another Gemini song about another wayward partner, "Ghost Train" from Gemini, features drummer Frank Duindam, in a song about the importance of realizing your potential. A ballad from Sleep Little Girl, the lengthy "Hippy Chick" concludes the program but the encore is "I Shall be Released" with Jobson back on organ. Not previously recorded by Layla, she turns in a heartfelt performance with a very gospel-flavoured organ part that certainly gave the audience on this night a great concert. As on earlier albums, she likes to drop in F-bombs on occasion and "Bitch With The Red Head" should have a parental advisory warning. She also goes over the top vocally on occasion but that too is part of a Layla Zoe performance. As a modern blues rock album this is a well programmed and her new band is excellent. A worthy and welcome addition to her growing discography. Her web site is www.layla.ca.

Adam Karch Everything Can Change Disques Bros

Montreal's Adam Karch returns with album number five, a most impressive set of originals and selected covers. On most of the songs he plays several quitars with Richard Deschênes on bass and Marc-André Drouin on drums. He opens most tunefully with "It's Your

Song", a toe-tapper on the power of music. Another highlight is by Alan McElcheran called "Fair Verona Blues" it's a dark retelling of the Romeo & Juliette story featuring some fine fingerpicking from Karch. JJ Cale's "After Midnight" gets a deep blues workout with Karch on a lap steel. He calls "Bitter Harvest", written with Jim Stadnyk, a swamp blues and it's an unhappy tale of a departing lover. Robert Johnson's "Preachin' Blues" gets an intricate fingerpicking arrangement combined with Karch's innovative percussive technique. He writes in his notes that he can fall into a trance playing this and that it can last ten minutes or more - easy to believe. The generous blues portion includes two versions of an instrumental, "Porch



Groove (Sunday Morning)" & "Porch Groove (Saturday Night)" that are further displays of his fingerpicking skills. Of the more Americana songs here, Wade Olson's "In the Wintertime" is a delight. His web site is www.adamkarchmusic.

Rory Block Prove It On Me Stony Plain/Warner

After her 6 CD Mentor Series, which focused on the rediscovered blues singers she met personally (all male), Rory Block launched her 'Power Women of the Blues' Series with a full disc devoted to Bessie Smith. That last album, A Woman's Soul, was deservedly devoted to one power woman. This new one broadens the palette to ten women from the well-known to the much lesser known, from to '20's to the '40's. As in all of her recent albums, these are quite ambitious self-productions: Rory plays several guitars with an acoustic slide usually being the lead. She multi-tracks her vocals, including harmony vocals up to a full chorus and she adds percussion on each. The result, though, is a most

effective showcase for these women and highlights abound. Arizona Dranes was a highly regarded gospel pianist about whom almost nothing was known until recently. The new info is gathered along with her collected recordings on a Tompkins Square release that Rory's performance of "I Shall Wear A Crown" will no doubt entice you to search out. (He Is My Story-The Sanctified Soul of Arizona Dranes, by Michael Corcoran) There is also much new research that tells us more about Elvie Thomas and her partner Geeshie Wiley, singer quitarists we now know to be from Texas. All that had been known was six songs on rare 78's. Rory's version of Thomas' "Motherless Child" will show you why these 78's are such collector's items. Helen Humes isn't normally included in sets of prewar blues, being much more known for jazz & R&B but this performance of "He May



Be Your Man" puts her firmly in this company. Rory has once again included an original song: rather than choosing one of her subjects to sing about, she's chosen to do some autobiography. "Eagles", she says in her notes, is a pretty straight forward account of her own life, with one line being an exception. Rory is nominated this year for the Koko Taylor Award for Female Blues Singer of the Year at the Blues Music Awards, including herself in this tribute disc shows how the tradition continues. With songs by Ma Rainey, Sister Rosetta Tharpe, Memphis Minnie ("In My Girlish Days" is the first single), Lottie Kimbrough and more, this is an excellent collection of country blues in its own right. Pursuing your favourites further will bring hours of pleasure. The album will be officially released on March 27 and her web site, www.roryblock.com, shows a must-see date at Music by the Bay Live in Ajax on June 8.



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


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


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
