



it has become an iconic Toronto music spot. Located in the historic & artistically rich Queen West area, local bands have been performing here since 1981. The Cameron have some great blues coming up in May with Paul Reddick Band on Friday, May 5 (10pm) the Fraser Melvin Blues Band on May 12. On May 13 Big Tobacco and the Pickers at 6pm and Garrett Mason at 9pm in the back room.

Sauce on the Danforth defines itself as a Victorian/Goth New Orleans inspired local bar. Easily accessible on the Danforth subway line, it is both intimate and fun. Great drinks and free live music most nights. There is no stage but a parlor style front room with an old piano in the corner. Think "kitchen party". Styles of music vary, but you can find Blues here. Julian Fauth, a staple at Sauce, plays every Tuesday (6:30pm). His barrel house Blues stylings are perfect for the piano in-the-parlor atmosphere that Sauce provides. He has received multiple Blues award nominations, both winning a Maple Blues Award & a Juno in 2008. His third solo album was named "Best Blues Album of the Year" in 2012 by CBC. Paul Reddick, or his alter-ego Zeke Pippin plays most Fridays (8:30pm). Many fine musicians show up on Tuesday to jam with Julian. If you have never experienced this "Kitchen Party in the Key of Blues" you really should check it out.


And Monday night at Sauce is bound to become a popular blues destination with the indefatigable Steve Marriner scheduled every Monday night (8pm) throughout the summer, though there will surely be the occasional sub for our globe-trotting blues sideman/frontman/bass/guitar/keyboard/ harmonica wizard. He has won the Maple Blues Award for best harmonica player six times and best Male vocalist of the year in 2009. He saw the world touring with Colin James and Harry Manx and has played with some of the best of today's blues artists.

Blues in Kingston: How about a day full of Blues in Kingston as they celebrate the 15th year of a unique festival called the Home-Grown Live Music Festival. It is a oneday event, on May 6th, 2023. For the cost of a \$10 wristband, you can indulge in live local Blues at the historic waterfront R.C.H.A Club. Beginning at 2pm with the last show at 10pm, there will be 9 Blues bands featured. But that is not all. This festival celebrates multiple genres, everything from Singer-Songwriter, Folk & Roots, Indie, Jazz, Country, Youth & Emerging Artists, Ambient & Electronic, Alternative & Hard Rock ... you name it. All proceeds are donated to the musician inspired Kingston non-profit called the Joe Chithalen Free Instrument Lending Library. For over 20 years this library has provided hundreds of instruments, amps & resources for free to anyone who has an interest in music. This festival features local & live talent with more than 113 performances on 13 stages. The listings can be found on the Home-Grown Live Music Festival website.

Harpoonist & the Axe Murderer on screen: The National Music Centre will present "The Harpoonist & the Axe Murderer at the King Eddy" Concert and Film Screening on May 12 and 13. The blues duo will play the legendary venue where the live album was recorded on May 12, followed the next day by a Q&A and screening of the concert film at Studio Bell, where fans will get to see the electrifying concert film that was the culmination of the band's three-night residency in 2019. A live Q&A with the band will follow the screening.

In 2019, The Harpoonist & the Axe Murderer recorded a live-off-the-floor album at the Eddy using the adjacent Rolling Stones Mobile Studio, a marquee component of the National Music Centre recording collection. Germinating over three raucous nights, a rippin' live album and concert film of all the unfolding magic would result. The live album would also garner the band a 2023 JUNO Award nod and 2023 Western Canadian Music Award win for Blues Artist of the Year.

Donna Grantis tackling climate change: Famed music pioneer Brian Eno and Canadian guitarist Donna Grantis are collaborating on Grantis' newest creative




project, Culture vs Policy, fusing the emotive power of music with thought-provoking dialogue about the climate and ecological crises. A live performance of the first song from her Culture vs Policy project, titled "A Drop In The Bucket," was filmed at the inaugural Canadian Music Climate Summit, presented by Music Declares Emergency. In the powerful video, Grantis' inspired and incendiary guitar playing is featured alongside the voice of Tzeporah Berman, Chair of the Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty. Throughout the performance, Grantis improvises a visceral soundscape in support of Tzeporah's words which highlight the urgency to stop the expansion of fossil fuels and manage a global, just transition away from oil, gas, and coal. Grantis wrote, "As a supporter of the Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty, I was moved by Tzeporah's words from a recent podcast interview. She spoke about the continued extraction of fossil fuels; the resulting impacts on people and the planet; and ultimately, how change happens. I was inspired to compose 'A Drop In the Bucket' and highlight her message in hopes that it may evoke a feeling or spark an idea in someone, as it did with me."

Grantis completed the Climate Reality Leadership Corps Virtual Global Training led by former Vice President Al Gore. She was selected to join the first Creative Climate Leadership program in Canada hosted by Julie's Bicycle and the Centre for Sustainable Practice in the Arts. As an EarthPercent artist, an endorser of the Music Declares Emergency declaration, an advisor to The Jellyfish Project, and a roundtable member of SCALE/LeSAUT, she is passionate about harnessing the power of music to create transformative cultural change.

Another Robert Johnson biography: Biography of a Phantom has just been released by Smithsonian Books and it poses more questions than it answers about the already mysterious Blues legend Robert Johnson. Mack McCormick knew more about Robert Johnson than anyone and promised for years that he would publish a biography of the blues legend but it never happened until after his death and his archives were handed over to the Smithsonian museum who have just published an early draft that was left unfinished and unpublished at the time of McCormick's death.

"Mack allegedly had answers to all the open questions about Johnson. He had not only discovered the man who murdered the famous blues guitarist-but had even confronted the killer face to face. And that was just the start of what Mack knew about Robert Johnson and the Delta blues," writes Ted Gioia on his Substack blog, The Honest Broker, "Ever since it was announced a half

century ago, this work has been eagerly anticipated by blues fans and music scholars—who hoped it would solve all the mysteries surrounding the most enigmatic figure in twentieth century American music. We heard crazy stories about him selling his soul to the devil, or showing up in unlikely cities under assumed names, or finally getting poisoned by a jealous husband who literally got away with murder in the racist South."

McCormick's literary executor, Mike Hall published an article in *Texas Monthly* and wrote "[Mack] said he was having serious doubts that the man whose trail he had discovered back in 1970—the Robert Johnson from Mississippi—was, in fact, the Robert Johnson who'd recorded those immortal songs in Texas. There was no proof, he said—no contracts, no letters...."

In fact McCormick researched 31 individuals named Robert Johnson, narrowing it down to 6 individuals. These theories do not appear in the newly published book because they chose to release an early draft of the biography, before Mack came up with all these conflicting stories late in life, some say as a result of an intense rivalry with other bluesologists and conflicts with Johnson family members, which resulted in the Smithsonian pulling out chapters that were based on information from Johnson's sisters. You can hardly call this a "definitive" biography when the author admitted he made stuff up, but for Robert Johnson aficionados, it's a must-read. *Biography of a Phantom* is available from Amazon and Audible.



Michael Jerome Browne Gettin' Together Borealis

Michael Jerome Browne is the son of two university professors, so it's no wonder that his research into the blues is so deep. On this latest release, *Gettin'Together*, he has curated 14 songs from more obscure blues artists of the past century such as William Bunch and Bayless Rose, as well as the more familiar artists like John Hurt and Booker White.


Browne, who was born in Indiana and raised in Montreal, has been playing acoustic blues for over 40 years, starting as a teenager and getting right into the fingerpicking style which has become more powerful and intricate over the years. Playing the blues for so long has given him a great respect for the genre and the African Americans who created it under conditions of hardship. As he says in the liner notes: "I do not own it. I am merely borrowing it and I try to be true to its origins." It's no wonder he has been nominated no less than 35 times for Maple Blues awards, as well as for Juno and Canadian Folk Music awards.

After the three-year Covid hiatus, Browne got together mainly for duets with his favourite artists, some of whom have been a big influence on his art. Happy Traum wrote the instruction book from which he first learned fingerpicking blues. Harrison Kennedy took harmonica lessons from Sonny Terry. Browne learned tablespoonfuls from backing up and touring with Eric Bibb. And, of course, John Sebastian has a half-century of playing and influencing roots music.

One thing that strikes me about this album is the variety of the grooves and feel in country blues. Yes, it's mainly three chords, but there are so many ways of telling the truth. Booker White's *Shake 'em on Down"* has a pulsating drive without a conventional rhythm section through the interplay of two guitars. Harold Holiday's *Married Man Blues* is almost funereal, mourning that the woman he loves is married. *Diamond Joe*, with fiddle and gourd banjo, has an old-time feel, which says a lot about the orgins of traditional Appalachian music.

Browne does some of his best work teamed up with Mary Flower, one of the greatest contemporary acoustic blues guitarists. The interplay between her picking and Browne's on *Coffee Blues*, backed by Sebastian's harmonica, makes this a standout. Flower's lap slide guitar on a slowed down instrumental version of *I've Got Those Big River Blues*, which became a standard in Doc Watson's hands, is downright incendiary.

Browne's vocal interpretations are warm, weathered and honest, and the guy is a virtuoso on all kinds of guitars (six-string, twelve-string and tenor) in lots of tunings as well as six-string and gourd banjo. This album is one great dive into the blue, and that's the truth. (*Mike Sadava*)



Eric Bibb Ridin'

Eric Bibb's immense musical talents, his fierce and focused dedication to musical forms largely steeped in the blues and folk traditions, have long been coupled with his magnificent, immediately identifiable voice that is one of the most penetrating instruments of our time.

Bibb's voice is one of authority, sensitivity, conviction, and understated power, while the songs he sings, no matter the source, have left many a listener moved, enlightened, educated and inspired thanks to a discography that is now closing in on some three dozen releases.

With his latest album *Ridin'*, Bibb frames a number of civil rights related stories into one offering. The timing of this release couldn't be better, as *Ridin'* is a musical rallying point that acts as a reminder of what the black North American population has dealt with for countless generations. It also comes at a time when forces of racism and hate gather at a place that now appears to be much closer than the horizon.

It is no easy feat to combine fifteen

pieces of music that pinpoint specific and horrific tales of injustice, with those that tackle overarching themes of struggle and resisitance, and come out the other side with a such a complete piece of work that is charged with indignation and determination, yet is musically riveting throughout the entire ride.

The multiple combinations of instrumentation and vocal arrangements are a reminder of what a deep well Bibb draws from, and what makes him such a distinctive artist when he gets into his brand of musical alchemy. Then there's variety of grooves, all of them consistently deep trenches, many of which co-exist with wonderful melodies. Each piece has its own firm setting but all of the offerings roll together with a fluidity that makes for a wonderfully engaging listen on every level.

The title track, the second song in, is gripping and gritty. Although it kicks in with the spare sound of Bibb's acoustic guitar and voice, it's a bass drum that starts driving the beat before some haunting slide guitar rips the piece wide open while Bibb's voice surfs the groove, imploring that freedom is an undeniable goal.

Taj Mahal shares the vocals with Bibb on "Blues Funky Like Dat", where an infectious rhythm, and lyrics, give a big nod to the groove and sound of a respected Atlanta preacher. All of it bouyed by the glistening metallic slide riffs of Jontavious Willis.

Many of us will remember John Griffin's sixties book *Black Like Me*, that documented a white man's transition to being colored under a doctor's care. Bibb retells Griffin's eye-opening and brutal story with admiration and appreciation.

Ridin' really is one exceptional piece after another. Whether it's the oft-recorded gem "500 Miles" that is sung by Bibb with a sombre sense of loneliness and isolation that lifts up its great melody, or "Tulsa Town", where the bottom end of its sonic range delivers a brooding beat that foreshadows the impending horror of a white mob's massacre of a black community in Oklahoma in 1921.

There's an interlude that allows the lyrical focus to shift into sounds of hope and resistance. The piece "Joybells" is one of many the emotionally stirring songs of the collection as Bibb closes the piece with the recitation of names of black men who were murdered.

Additional guest appearances by Harrison Kennedy, master jazz and blues guitarist Russell Malone, Habib Koite and a female chorus are all perfectly placed, and soulfully played and sung by those artists. By the time *Ridin'* rolls to a close with Church Bells, it's evident that a masterpiece has been created by Bibb with considerable help from his musical friends, with producer Glen Scott deserving a special mention. Recordings of such substantial depth and artistic brilliance as *Ridin'* don't come along very often, nor do artists like Eric Bibb. (*Peter North*)




John Mayall The Sun Is Shining Down 40 Below Records

Marvel not at his age but at his legacy. From his hearty catalogue of 37 studio and 34 live releases (many defining the very heart and soul of British blues), Mayall remains the last of his kind and the great grandfather of this time-honoured genre. Regardless of whether you appreciate his reedy voice, his flash-free harmonica and his endless ability to reinvent himself, his seminal Bluesbreakers birthed some of the greatest guitarists of our time. Mayall's stamp of approval meant everything - and still does. Case in point, The Sun Is Shining Down is a showcase of established and/or up-and-coming guitarists. A stickler for adherence to standard blues forms (Mayall resented the godfather title, as his choice for the British Blues crown were heroes, Cyril Davis and Alexis Korner), to graduate from the Mayall school became a springboard to success for many players.

More bandleader than actual virtuoso on any of his chosen instruments, Mayall nevertheless delivers the blues every time, surrounded by hand-picked bandmates while coaxing the best out of them. He still does. His current band of Greg Rzab (bass), Jay Davenport (drums) and Carolyn Wonderland (rhythm/lead guitar) takes a slight backseat to featured artists on each song. Standout tracks include "Can't Take No More", unleashing Marcus King's soulful sting, supplemented by a slick horn section (Ron Dzibla, sax; Mark Pender, trumpet; Richard Rosenberg, trombone) and both Mayall-original tracks accompanied by Scarlett Rivera's still-sultry violin ("Got To Find A Better Way" and "Deep Blue Sea". Understandably, Mayall's voice is hit-andmiss, strength-wise, falling short on occasion (Bobby Rush's "I'm As Good As Gone" -

supplemented by effects - and the upbeat, but otherwise lacklustre take on Bernard Allison's "Chills and Thrills", despite Mike Campbell's contribution). The back-to-basics strength of his own band on Tinsley Ellis'"A Quitter Never Wins" hits a strong note, with Mayall's harp and B3 more than compensating on a less-than-robust vocal. Roosevelt Sykes' "Driving Wheel" gets a significant boost from Mississippi-born guitarist, Melvin Taylor's jazz-inflected Chicago blues guitar, bolstered by strong horns and Eric Corne's rhythm guitar - seemingly taking the pressure off Mayall to weave his patented spell. The title track grants Wonderland her due in the spotlight, elegantly so.

All-in-all, Mayall continues to retain his distinctive sound, delivering his stilldistinctive version of the blues, following a lifelong crusade to turn music fans onto the joy of the blues. His age has very little to do with it. Long may he reign. (*Eric Thom*)



Taj Mahal Savoy

Upon first glance at the song titles of Taj Mahal's latest album, one could be excused for initially wondering if renditions of 14 classic jazz/blues songs that have been cut dozens and dozens of times would be close to required listening.

Titled Savoy, after the legendary Harlem Ballroom that was *the* fountain of a musical explosion of black culture almost a century ago, the album rolls around titles like *Do Nothin' Till You Hear From Me, Sweet Georgia Brown, Lady Be Good, Caldonia* and *Summertime* in what is a fourteen song set.

Toss any perceived predictability factor out the window. Instead settle into a Taj Mahal album like no other and bathe in a glorious recording that is built upon expertly, uniquely delivered renderings of classics that are as much the creation of producer John Simon and a cast of brilliant instrumentalists, as they are that of the featured artist.

Out of the gate, Stompin' At The Savoy is

driven by soulful singing and a polished and swinging band that ingests these timeless pieces and then exhales them with a sense of pure purpose and joy with exacting precision.

The head turning arrangements are the work and artistry of Simon, whose body of work as a producer and arranger includes classic recordings from artists as varied as The Band, Big Brother & the Holding Company, Leonard Cohen, Gil Evans and John Hartford.

As Holger Petersen's liner notes state, Simon chose particular horn players for specific pieces, and with that compass as part of the equation, tone and nuance throughout *Savoy* is as varied as dialects of a particular language.

Put Taj Mahal's unmistakeable voice, and one of the greatest in the history of the blues, into the midst of this delectable instrumental brew and it's guaranteed that any fan of this era of music, composed by heavyweights like Ellington, Goodman, Gershwin, Bigard, Arlen, Mercer, and Jordan, will be coming back for repeated listens.

The gravel in Taj's voice is the focal point of *I'm JustA Lucky So-and-So* that also features a lovely flute solo that floats above the superb playing of the core band, which finds Simon at the piano, Danny Caron playing guitar, Ruth Davies on bass and Leon Joyce Jr. at the drums, as they are throughout the session.

The main man sings with total conviction and investment from start to finish. Even though his instrument shows a little wear in his advancing years, Taj Mahal's ability to insert a new turn of a phrase, or his instinct to deliver a unique way of responding to a classic riff is central to the success of this set of classics coming off with a fresh feel.

On Gee Baby, Ain't I Good To You, which has been given some superb treatments over the decades, Taj delivers the lyric as though he's reading a love letter he's just penned, as the ghost of Charlie Christian, via the playing of Caron, binds the stunning piece together.

The lead vocal on *Summertime* gives the song a new spin and cadence that works wonderfully, while Simon's arrangement embraces a sound that personified some of Miles Davis's work in the late fifties.

Everyone on the session shines, whether it's the bold clarinet playing of Sheldon Brown on *Mood Indigo*, which dovetails beautifully with a soothing vocal chorus, or the bluesy, swinging Grappelli-like violin work from Evan Price on the intro to *Sweet Georgia Brown* that gives way to some fabulous call and response between Taj Mahal and the horn section.

Trumpeter Charles McNeal, who has worked on some of Boz Scaggs' best sides, shines on a number tracks, and Danny Caron's cont'd on p13



from Miss Emily Calling Out the Blues Purists



I am very aware that there are some incredibly varying opinions on what constitutes "Blues" music. Recently, after yet another criticism of some of my latest art being deemed "not Blues enough" by an album reviewer, I vented my frustration to a friend of mine in music who stated "It's just white people making more rules about black music."

And there it was. What feels like an incredibly true statement.

I refer to myself as a "Soul-Blues" artist. I have traditional Country/ Americana elements in my music and traditional gospel elements in my music. I sing with soul. In my opinion, you can take almost any song, add pedal steel and call it "country music" so I'm not quite sure why there's such a passionate group of people when it comes to opinions on what is and is NOT Blues music.

With the conversation around Indigenous music and culture being appropriated, there has been more talk about what constitutes 'appropriation' versus 'celebration' of other cultures' music and art.

The conversation is happening in the Blues music genre. It's important to address where you stand through your actions as an artist, not just your words. In my personal creation of music, I want to celebrate the music that inspires me (ie: Blues music) without appropriating it... and in case you needed a real definition for what appropriation means, here's part of the Oxford Languages listing:

Appropriation 1. the action of taking something for one's own use, typically without the owner's permission. 2. the artistic practice or technique of reworking images from well-known paintings, photographs, etc., in one's own work.

I'm not here to blow the whistle on anyone. I'm a white woman who makes a living on music inspired by black art. The finger could be pointed at me and question the authenticity of the music I make. BUT, I have to ask, where is the line drawn between music that's 'Blues' or 'Not Blues Enough'? And honestly, who's making that call? Who has the right to make that call? White people? I don't think so.

The Grammy Awards recognize 'Best Traditional Blues Album' and 'Best Contemporary Blues Album'. Both 'Blues' recognized categories, but Blues purists might want to give a listen to 2021 winner Fantastic Negrito's album "Have You Lost Your Mind Yet". It's a great example of a Blues inspired musical art piece. This album uses modern day production and there's definitely no 12-bar Blues forms. Again - this album won a Grammy! A Blues Grammy!

I love traditional Blues music. I love the complex emotions in sometimes seemingly simple melodies or chord progressions. I love traditional Blues rhythms. In the many genres that exist in music on this planet, there's room for traditional or older styles and room for new interpretations. Classic Rock radio stations and Top 40 Pop stations help listeners know what they can expect when they tune in. There are also festivals and radio programs devoted to showcasing only traditional Blues styles. These are important for giving traditional Blues music a consistent platform. While some 'Blues' festivals have broadened the genres or sub-genres represented in their line-ups, others have made a point of focusing specifically on more traditional Blues styles. There are a lot of music lovers out there and lots of opportunities for artists, no matter what genre they generally fall into. Diversification is happening in so many ways in this industry and there's a place for everyone. The word is "inclusivity" and it plays an important role in many musical genres moving forward.

I'm a Soul-Blues artist. I make music inspired by the Blues. As a white woman, I don't feel it's my place to make super traditional sounding Blues recordings and claim them as MY art. You might be a white person (or person who isn't black) and make very traditional Blues sounding music and think that's fine. No problem. You do you. I'll stick to what I feel is best for me. If the Black community at large decides we, as non-black artists, shouldn't make music traditional to their culture, then we can look at the changes that need to be made. This very thing has happened with traditional Indigenous music and other Indigenous-rooted art forms. In the meantime - please can we STOP labeling music as not being 'Blues' enough?? We don't have to like everything, but what gives someone the credentials to claim whether something meets Blues genre standards? Maybe it's time we start encouraging the growth of the Blues genre, not trying to limit it. - *Emily Fennell*

nimble yet deadly guitar playing actually steals the spotlight on the Benny Golson classic Killer Joe. Maria Muldaur makes an appearance, helping her old friend Taj take Baby, It's Cold Outside, out of the Yuletide frame it's usually associated with. The two turn the song into a slow burning, sexually charged tour de force, as the arrangement eventually doubles down on the vocal duet with a gorgeous muted trumpet and violin conversation.

Add in some superb liner notes from Petersen that add interesting context to the creation of this work, along with some superior artwork and Taj Mahal's Savoy is an essential piece of work for fans of this classic and timeless music. (Peter North)



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
