Congratulations to all the Maple Blues Award nominees and winners who recently came out to the Phoenix Concert Theatre. The community gathered for a great night of live music led by The Maples, making their public debut! Performances from host Quisha Wint, Blackburn, Matt Andersen, Angelina Hunter, Brandon Isaak and first time recipient of an Indigenous Blues Award, Crystal Shawanda were truly sweet. With some voting results surprising the MBA attendees and the national blues fans, The Toronto Blues Society will be consulting with the community so we can listen for recommendations to address the problem of the absence of black artist awardees. The TBS will hold consultations with various stakeholders to reassess and reconsider the procedure of the voting process for the MBAs in order to make them more transparent to the general public.

New Brunswick blues belter Matt Andersen was the big winner at the 27th annual Maple Blues Awards, held at The Phoenix Concert Theatre in Toronto. Anderson was the only multi-award winner of the evening, taking home statuettes for Entertainer of the Year, Male Vocalist of the Year, Recording/Producer of the Year and Songwriter of the Year.

Ontario's Little Magic Sam won New Artist/Group of the Year, Nova Scotian Garrett Mason for Guitarist of the Year, with two previously announced winners Crystal Shawanda for the inaugural Indigenous Artist of the Year, and British Columbia's Brant Zwicker for Blues Booster of the Year.

Hosted by multi-talented artist Quisha Wint, who also performed for an enthralled audience, the blues music event of the year also included rousing performances from nominees including Blackburn Brothers, Brandon Isaak, Matt Andersen, Angelina Hunter, and Crystal Shawanda, all backed by the new Maple Blues Awards house band, The Maples.

Breathtaking Vocalist And Songwriter Ndidi O's **Simple Songs For Complicated Times**

Ndidi Onukwulu submitted a three song demo to the TBS Talent Search as an early first step in her Toronto career, twenty years ago. She didn't "compete" in the session as the submission came in too late, however the tracks were so compelling, she got an invite to the Women's Blues Revue in 2004 at Massey. Also on the bill were lackie Richardson, Sue Foley, Rita Chiarelli, Dawn Tyler Watson and Serena Ryder. It was quite a debut and she hasn't looked back. Her latest recording is supported by her story in a "one sheet" from Steve Dawson's label Black Hen

Ndidi O has never been one to pull her punches. A true force of nature, her raw and powerful voice has breathed fire into

her heart-on-the-sleeve songs for more than two decades now. For all of her many accomplishments over the years, Ndidi's never given us a record quite like Simple Songs for Complicated Times.

Born and raised in Burns Lake, British Columbia, music has always been part of Ndidi's life. As a young woman, she left her rural town for New York and Toronto to find her voice and develop her distinctive style. Over the years, she's recorded 5 solo albums, earning her 2 JUNO

nominations and WCMA Blues Artist of the Year accolades. In search of her musical holy grail, she's experimented with roots, blues, soul, and trip-hop as a solo artist, and with Boga, Sankova, (featuring Allison Russell) and The Lightning 3 amongst others.

Ndidi's previous project, 2022's The Blue and the Gold, with Trish Klein of The Be Good Tanyas, paid tribute to underappreciated female creators in blues music, and laid the foundation for her new album, where with characteristic bravery, Ndidi O takes on a subject rarely covered in popular music. The deceptively titled Simple songs for Complicated Times is a thematic tour de force, a song cycle that illuminates the choices of women who neglected to follow 'the plan,' and missed the boat that picked up their peers to sail into the waters of domestic bliss.

If the territory sounds intimidating, Ndidi's soulful, uplifting performances smooth over the rough edges and encourage her audience

to listen deeply. With a voice that exudes the rawness of Etta James one moment, and Dionne Warwick's delicate soul the next, listening to Ndidi O is a master class in phrasing. Every breath and nuance that comes from her serves the songs and brings them home. A truly masterful performer, this is the record Ndidi has been in training for a lifetime to make.

Simple Songs for Complicated Times was primarily recorded live off the floor in the intimate confines of Steve Dawson's Henhouse studio in Nashville. Steve and Ndidi have collaborated many times over the years, including Ndidi's debut album 'The Contradictor', and have played many live shows together. But, Simple Songs for Complicated Times marks the first time they've created music in the studio in nearly two decades. The results speak for themselves. The intuition between the singer and musicians is exhilarating to experience. The whole band flows effortlessly with Ndidi's electricity and unique delivery. Steve is in top form, offering up some of his finest guitar

> and pedal steel playing. The


rhythm section of Sam Howard (bass) and Gary Craig (drums) lay a rock-solid foundation for Chris Gestrin's dynamic keyboard flourishes. The backup singers, Khari McClelland, a w n Pemberton and

Keri Latimer are truly inspired and take Ndidi's leads to another level

Finally, if the songs on Ndidi's new album are simple, their themes and the emotional landscape they operate in, is anything but. "Get Gone" is a searing evisceration of toxic people and places that age and wisdom teach us to leave behind. "Too Late" explores what it's like to be middle aged in an industry and culture that has always favored the young. This theme culminates in "Worth". the album's closing track. With its chorus proclaiming 'don't have a house/don't have a car/ain't got a man/don't want your kids,' it is at once a song for this moment, and for the ages.

Brash and challenging, warm and inviting, Simple Songs for Complicated Times reflects everything that has always been so appealing about Ndidi O's music. Heartbreak has never hurt so deliciously, nor has salvation ever seemed so near. This is Ndidi's moment. Simple Songs for Complicated Times will leave you breathless.





The Love You Bleed Danielle Nicole 40 Below Records

With the release of The Love You Bleed, Danielle Nicole's career continues to soar. Her previous album was nominated for a Grammy and topped the Billboard blues chart, and this current CD—her third since becoming a solo artist — has hit number one on the Billboard. iTunes and Amazon blues charts. As well as her potent vocals, Nicole plays bass and wrote or co-wrote all but one song on this album. Backing Nicole are guitarist Brandon Miller, Damon Parker on keyboards, drummer Go-Go Ray and Stevie Blacke supplying violin and cello. The theme threaded throughout is love amid pain.

"Love on My Brain" is a scorcher that sets the tone for what's to come. It's a propulsive, steamy number expressing the ambivalence of love that's an ideal demonstration of Nicole's vocal prowess. Her voice intensifies from smouldering lust to impassioned cries, interspersed with smoking guitar. There's a retro flavour to "Make Love," a song about constantly nourishing one's love for friends and family regardless of your own hurt. Nicole shifts gears in "Right By Your Side," displaying the depths of her desire through soulful vocals, squeezing each tear of emotion out of her vow to hold on tight to love. "How Did We Get to Goodbye" is a captivating heartbreaker concerning a precious love that is inexplicably dying.

Nicole perfectly portrays the wail of a mother's anguish in "Head Down Low." There's a haunting ambience to the music as she sings of a rebellious young man confronting the harsh realities of life away from home. "Fireproof" also describes unrealized expectations, in this case the depiction of an adolescent relationship that doesn't survive adulthood, the angst reflected in Brandon Miller's incendiary guitar.

Miller's acoustic guitar is the sole accompaniment to "A Lover Is Forever," the only song not written by Nicole. It's a pensive proclamation that it's true love, not necessarily marriage, that endures. She remains in a contemplative mood with the ballad "Sav You'll Stay," supported by strings and organ, with Miller's pedal steel guitar sliding in as an extension of her exquisite vocals. Her voice is exhilarating atop the heavily rhythmic "Fool's Gold," about one whose promises are worthless.

Her vocals again take wing in the rocker "Walk on By," dramatized by searing guitar, a warning against seeing the world on merely a superficial level. Nicole wrote "Who He Thinks You Are" about her older son, and the importance of nurturing love and never neglecting it, her voice transcendent as she conveys a mother's devotion. Concluding the CD, "Young Love on the Hill" is a delightful song of cherished memories, with elegant acoustic accompaniment.

In The Love You Bleed, Danielle Nicole wrings every drop of passion from her music, with superb vocals that showcase her versatility, not only in the album as a whole, but often within each track. A gifted songwriter, Nicole has crafted lyrics that speak of love in the face of loss, while her voice declares it all with profound feeling and extraordinary talent.

Doc's Advice



I haven't missed many of the Maple Blues Awards. Canada's national celebration of blues, blues artists, and the community that makes it happen. The first

time I attended, at the Diamond Club, in Toronto, I walked across town from College and Bathurst to get there. I didn't have bus fare, much less the cost of admission, or the price of a beer. My feet were wet. It was cold. It seemed to me at the time that Canadian Blues was a small club, and if you really wanted to be part of it, you needed to go to at least some of the meetings. I still believe that. But in those days-even if you needed to sneak in through a loading gate- the doors were still open. What happens inside has always been subject to debate, and always should be.

Blues people are nothing if not passionate. Over the next twenty years or so after my winter walk I plunged into hard touring and I was blessed to work in some capacity with probably all of the blues societies in Canada - some on multiple occasions. My people. Passionate people. But many a blues society went up in flames. Arguments about who loved the blues the most, who had the most knowledge, the truest truth, the last word on what was the blues, and what wasn't the blues. When things got too hot, yeah, we can burn down the House and roll about in the ashes. I told you so! I told you! I told you! Sometimes the tents were really big, and sometimes the tents were very small - but they were all easily set ablaze and scattered to the wind. Tents are like that.

Playing nine or ten provinces and often a couple of territories every year for 17 years, I felt that I had a pretty comprehensive view of the Canadian blues scene. My view from the driver's seat: loading in to small venues in Duncan, or Spences Bridge, or Red Deer, or Lloydminster, or Saskatoon, or Thunder Bay, or Kingston, or Fredericton, or Halifax... whose posters were on the walls? Who was actually out... touring? And by that I mean more than three or four shows strung together. Touring is - or was - a lifestyle decision as much as a business decision: put yourself on a national stage - or stay close to home: local, regional, house gigs, occasional shows, sessions, freelance, close to family, and possibly to other income streams. It has very little to do with the kind or quality of the Blues. Some of the best - or most loved- artists only rarely leave their home towns. They'll play the Wednesday night forever, and sleep in their own beds. Their blues societies get behind

them and send them to Memphis every few years. And they're damn good. Some of them, anyway. As an out-of-town star, I'll get the exotic, Saturday night - and possibly sleep in my car, parked behind the venue. We're the same: we're just using different hands to toss the dice. We see different things, we live different stories.

But back to the Awards... One of the simple facts is that when people vote for particular Maple nominees, they tend to vote for the acts that they know and like - and these tend to be the higher profile, national touring acts that also perform at the major festivals. Or have in the recent past. The festivals hire largely from a pool of Maple Award winners, so there can often be a nice little loop of success once an artist is past the gate. "Of the Year" becomes the most recognized name, and not necessarily the measure of who has accomplished exceptional things that year. The least forgotten and the best known will often win in spite of an average year spent doing average things. These are the mundane mechanics of how it actually works, most of the time.

The bitter, push-pull on this is the politically correct - or home town supportive - inclusion of regional or local artists to the Maple ballot. The nominating committee is in many ways meant to provide regional perspectives to a national award - so in numerous instances we see west coast, east coast, Quebec, or Winnipeg nominees, somehow "balancing" the card. Naturally, every region knows its own artists the best - and wants them to win. And sometimes they are able to make this happen. But usually, more votes are cast where more people live, and often, the Nomination itself serves as an important career recognition for the local or regional artists lucky enough to get one. It goes on the poster, and the album cover, and in the bio. You weren't a wanker: you had a career! Not just a bum playing in bars. Nominated? You're a winner.

I've heard guys complain that a Maple or a Juno won't buy you a cup of coffee at a Tim's. Of course, these same folks are having their "Maple nominated artist" or "Maple winning artist" CDs played on radio shows, and downloaded on the streaming services. Lunch might actually be an option! And they do get to play at least some of the Canadian blues festivals, too. Festivals where you can get arrested for busking. Maple awards may be more meaningful to some than to others, but at some point in a Canadian based artist's career they can, and do, make a real and important difference. On a personal level, a nomination or award can be validating to the artist's family and supporters - and to the artist. Sometimes a significant personal sacrifice has taken place. Life in the blues can be difficult, and an award can provide and restore dignity, respect, and

a tangible feeling of achievement. I've seen artists totally overcome with emotion when receiving their Maple. It's not just the business of the blues that is at the heart of it all. You can't lose sight of the passionate heart. And blues people are nothing, if not passionate. I always applaud the winners, and the nominees, no matter who they are. And sometimes I cry, too.

Each region forever complains that they haven't had enough nominees, or enough winners. The "New Artist" category could have been invented to give the regions something to compete over, but the rivalry has long since extended to all categories. Perhaps the Maples would be better served if its national and regional aspirations were better defined. A National award should perhaps be exactly what? Should it be based on a criteria of accomplishments on the national stage: whether performance, recording, composition, film, social activism, international achievement, or some combination thereof? Where is this criteria articulated, and who communicates this to our "panel of experts?" It is up to the nominating committee to serve up candidates that actually meet some such criteria? Or at very least some criteria which can be easily and commonly understood and communicated. And maybe they believe that they have done this. And maybe they have. Or maybe they haven't. I'm certain that at least most of the committee members take their work very seriously. I know many of the nominating committee personally, and I know how much effort they put into the process. That said, I regard them as part of a jury, and I have never asked anyone to disclose their process or deliberations. I spent years trying to figure it out, but never managed. I know it is more than simply issuing a CD, and mailing it. Or playing 3 out of 5 festivals... There is mojo in it somewhere... Right?

When passionate blues people arrive year after year with greatly differing expectations, we divide ourselves into winners and losers. Today there are words sparking out there that threaten to burn down the house we've built. I flew in from Africa to attend the awards, and was saddened by how far the Maples had deteriorated over just a few years. While I'm not shocked by the disappointment and rage expressed by some over the results, the tone of the discussion in some quarters is worrisome.

There has always been disappointment and rage around the edges. Outrage around the vote, when the blues fans don't sway as some would hope. It's very emotional. I've often felt that way when the nominations were announced. On the road someplace. Getting the List. Reading. Feeling the disconnect between my world and the List. Some years ago I simply stopped reading it, and

stopped voting. But I do remember vividly the excitement of waiting for the List. The Century Blues Tour with Big Dave McLean - over 100 back-to-back shows from coast to coast, arguably the most comprehensive Canadian tour ever undertaken. Dave didn't have internet, so I looked it up. We were staying in the little apartment above Bud's on Broadway, in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan. "Hey, Dave! You've been nominated for Entertainer of the Year!"While Dave ran out to phone his wife, I changed a couple of guitar strings and put a set list together. Or in Edmonton, Alberta: staying at the old Commercial Hotel for a week of shows. Me, playing one nighters around the region; Ross Neilsen band, playing a little joint down the street. Keith Hallett band, playing downstairs for six nights. Like the hockey teams in the playoffs: nobody shaves until the last puck drops. The Saturday matinee: a few tunes: a couple of drinks: the List. Ah, you can't fault the winners. There's always next year, boys. None of us stood a chance, but the dream was always there to tease us along.

This year I stood at the back of a hall and looked at a sea of largely male, white hair between me and the stage. I don't know how the Maple attendees voted, but their aging, white male demographic dominates the fan base for this music almost everywhere. According to my social media trackers, over 25 percent of my fans are now men over 65. Another 20 percent are women in the same age bracket. These folks have spent their lives listening to blues and roots music, support it with their wallets, know what they like, and vote. Proposals that the rules of the game should be changed so as to give them less say are insulting. Their whiteness does not make them stupid, racist, or misogynistic. The Awards remain a popularity contest, albeit one that is meant to give greater profile to all of the artists and participants in the blues community but, after the nominating committee puts the names forward, the fans own the contest. Or most of it.

There is a well known saying about bringing horses to water. Audiences are like that, too. Wish all you want, but one needs to win their audience. And reel 'em in. In the blues, that is often one bum at a time - no matter how good you are. And we've now got a lot of empty chairs in our tent: empty chairs. When the non-trophy acts figure out how to fill these chairs, they will be the new, trophy winning acts. Really. And sometimes it doesn't happen overnight. Or quickly. Or at all. Sorry. And sometimes the panel of experts is ahead of the curve. Good on them. Canadians, be kind to one and other. Keep moving forward. Debate. Renovate. Do the Right Thing. But don't burn down the house.


