# Meet Dave towoM

Born in Peterborough, his father was of Irish-Scottish parentage. His mother is Mississauga Anishinabe and still living in Alderville First Nation at 91 years. Dave is the great-grandson of Fred Simpson of Alderville, who placed 6th in the 1908 Olympic Marathon, alongside the great Tom Longboat who collapsed at 19 miles in that famous race in London, England. It was an important legacy to grow up with in Peterborough and Alderville.

His maternal grandfather lived on the Alderville reserve and was a saxophone player, trapper, hunter, labourer. Dave never knew his paternal grandfather because he died in 1961 when Dave was fifteen months old. Johnny Mowat they called him, from Aberdeen originally and born in 1899, was a soldier in Palestine with the British Army during WWI. He came to Canada in 1925. His maternal grandmother was a lovely piano player.

Dave's father loved the Irish music, Scottish pipe bands, but also Ray Charles (ie the red Country and Western album in which at probably 4 years old he was struck by "I Can't Stop Loving You"), Jerry Lee Lewis, Nancy Wilson, Jackie Wilson, etc. He was a great whistler who had extremely good rhythm, always had a set of drum sticks in the drawer and apparently had played snare with the sea cadets band, who knows.

Dave arrived in Winnipeg in August 1982, on a Greyhound pretty broke, tired, and poor with a young family in tow. Those became hard years, in hard neighbourhoods in the Northend. Here, in the Northend neighbourhoods of Winnipeg and on Main Street Dave

saw the decay and destruction of the Indigenous peoples of that city, of his own people! While being in the middle of it he was also on the outside looking in because of where he was coming from. That has never left him to this day. Racism, murder, alcohol, racial division, police brutality.

He took up the harmonica somewhere around early 1983. From there it was bands by 1985 and onward in Winnipeg until he moved back to Ontario in 1995. By July of that year he was building his home back on the First Nation in Alderville and there began what is almost 29 years in this beautiful neck of the woods.

Dave's love of the blues is really rooted in Winnipeg, in his friend Big Dave McLean and the great harmonica player Gord Kidder, back over 40 years. But also in some of those sounds he heard as a youngster. Through the years there have been numerous experiences in the west and of course in southern Ontario, Crooked Road is reflective of those experiences. In the covers no doubt which speak generationally to the challenges between men and women, alcohol and life and in the originals the same may apply. But "Leland Hotel Blues" may best reflect his early years in Winnipeg. It's not pretty subject material, but rather real and desperate.

HIs experiences are influenced no doubt by the great Canadian musicians he has played with, certainly on this album, but also the great American players he also had the pleasure of playing with most notably in R.L. Burnside and Hubert

Life is a Crooked Road, there are no straight lines in Dave's travels from Point A to Point Z. He sends his gratitude to Jim Bowskill, Steve Marriner, Jesse O'Brien, Terry Wilkins, Clayton Yates and Brittany Brooks for all helping to make this a reality.

# Here Come the Summer Blues Festivals!

It has been a mild winter but that does not interfere with the anticipation one feels about summer and the summer Blues festivals that await us. Some exist no longer, others have redefined what they are. There are still many to choose from. TBS has compiled a comprehensive list of 2024 Blues Festivals across our great country. Here are some highlights from those who have announced their programme. We will start with the first (and some would say best) in our region.

## The Orangeville Blues & Jazz Festival May 30-June 2

This Orangeville festival has consistenly placed in the top tier of best music festivals in Ontario for years. Orangeville's main street; Broadway, closes for most of the festival and it becomes a pedestrian haven. There will be a return of the popular Blues Cruise on Broadway, with more than 200 vintage cars on display for perusal. It all opens with The Broadway Ramble & New Orleans style March and closes with the Blues and Bikes Show and Shine event. A free music stage & pop up bands will provide live music throughout the week-end. All is free with the exception of the ticketed Blues festival held at the Main Stage in Alexandra Park. Admission includes performances in the Town Hall's original Opera House built in 1875.

This year the Orangeville Blues & Jazz Festivlal celebrates its 20th anniversary and the lineup is sensational. It includes: the legendary Downchild Blues Band, The Nick Moss Band featuring Dennis Guenling, Dawn Tyler Watson with the Ben Racine Band, the Jack de Keyzer Band, the Ghost Town Blues Band, Harps of Gold featuring Steve Marriner, Paul Reddick, Jerome Godboo and Larry Kurtz, Spencer Mackenzie, Canefire featuring Jeremy Leadbetter and the Toronto Mass Choir.

Impressed? You should be but I am not done yet: Brandon Isaak, Conor Gains & Devin Cuddy, Joshua Arden Miller & the Pappy Johns Band, She Wolves of London, the Angelina Hunter Trio, Danny Marks, Garnetta Cromwell & DaGroovmasters, Alan Gerber, Campbell & Johnston, Glenn Marais and the Mojo Train and Larry Kurtz and the Lawbreakers with special quest Rick Taylor.

library have returned for this year and they are free. What a great way to start the Summer! Tickets went on sale March 31st.

Now let's consider the biggest Blues Festival in Canada.

#### The Ottawa Blues Festival July 4-14

The running joke in Ottawa is that there is no Blues at the Ottawa Blues Festival! It's not true, there's a lot of Blues, just rarely on the Main Stage. This year look for the Blackburn Brothers, JW Jones, TJ Wheeler, the Tony D Band, Bywater Call, Annika Chambers/Paul Deslauriers, Sean Pinchin and many more. The major headliner is Neil Young.

And here is one of the smallest and most recently established. And it is free.

#### **Toronto Rotary Bluesfest June 22**

This one-day event is kid friendly, with entertainment from noon until 9pm. Held outdoors at the East York Civic Centre, there is a beverage terrace, food vendors and a Marketplace. The headliner is Gene Hardy & Sparkjiver.

These days free or affordable festivals are appreciated. Here are a few.

#### Mont Tremblant Blues Festival July 10-14

In a way this is the Disneyworld of Blues Fests. This winter ski destination north of Montreal with its commercial village that scales up the hill is unlike any other. Bars, retail stores and restaurants line the climb to the top where there is a Main Stage. A ski lift will also take you there. There is another smaller stage at the entrance and one half way up the hill. The surrounding area is absolutely beautiful. Mostly free but the accomodations are expensive, especially if you stay on site. Lineup pending.

#### Kitchener Blues Festival, August 8-11

This is one of the biggest free festivals in Ontario and one of the best. With 3 stages, workshops, after hours performances and great line ups, it knocks it out of the ball park. With the main street closed, it is relatively easy to navigate from one stage to another. Chairs are provided. Line-up will be announced April 13.

#### Burnaby Blues and Roots Festival Burnaby, B.C August 12

Held in beautiful Deer Lake Park in Burnaby B.C. this is a one day event and free to all who attend up to 9000 people. The lineup includes Bebe Buckskin, The Trade-Offs, Boy Golden, The Dip, Allison Russell and the headliner is Fleet Foxes.

#### Durham Rock & Blues Festival Oshawa, Sept.12-15.

Outdoors at the Victoria Street Parkette across from the Regent Theatre in Oshawa. Line up pending. Free.

And a few must mentions!

Salmon Arm Roots & Blues Festival, Salmon Arm B.C. July 26-28. Returning for its 32nd year, this great festival of multiple stages is a staple of the summer. Includes a great lineup this year: Brandon Isaak & his Saints of Swing, Tanika Charles, Crystal Shawanda, Rick Estrin & the Nightcats, The Hello Darlins, Amanda Marshall, Five Alarm Funk, Sarah McLachlan & more.

Stonebridge Wasaga Beach Blues Fest, Wasaga Beach Ont. Sept.13-15 This year's line up includes John Finley, Jeff Rogers, the Mike McCarthy Band, Garnetta Cromwell and the DaGroovmasters, LMT Connection and the Soul Motivators.

Sadly we have lost two or our Blues Festivals, Kingson's long standing Limestone Festival and North Bay's Capital Centre's Bluesfest. But often when one door closes, new ones open. Here are two.

## Belleville Downtown Blues Festival, . Sept. 6 & 7.

Free with a cash or food donation. Lineup includes Jack de Keyzer, Shawn Dore Big Blues Band, Brian Legere Blues Band, Hellbound Trail and the Fabulous Tonemasters. Workshops held by Paul Denyes (How We Got the Blues), Tony Vani (Harmonica) and Matt Smith (slide quitar)

#### Blues d' la Baie Petit Rocher, New Brunswick July 25 to 28

Acadian culture defines this beautiful area and great festival. Artists include Matt Minglewood, MonkeyJunk, David GoGo, the Steve Hill Band and the Devil Horns, the Downchild Blues Band, Black Dog and Ilam.

Stateside, **The New York State Blues Festival, June 13-14-15** takes place at Chevy Court at NYS Fairgrounds. Toronto's Bywater Call plays Thursday June 13 alongside Lil' Ed & The Blues Imperials. Other highlights include Little Feat, Shemekia Copeland and Matt Schofield

We started by featuring one of the best early Summer Blues festivals in our area and it seems right to end with one of the best close to the end of the season.

#### Southside Shuffle, Port Credit Sept. 6-8

With much of this festival being free and along the beautiful Ontario lakefront, it is a winner. Spearheaded by the Downchild Blues Band and Mississauga's Mayor Hazel twenty-six years ago, it now brings in over 150 bands, engages over 300 volunteers and opens its main street to thousands of visitors. Acts confirmed on the Main Stage include, CJ Chenier & The Red Hot Louisiana Band, Jimmy Bowskill & Steve Marriner, and Philip Sayce on the Saturday. Sunday will feature Matt Minglewood and the Legendary Downchild Blues Band.

What to do on April 5? It's great to see the live blues scene coming back to life but this month we have one of those weird convergence of blues stars all playing on the same night, Friday April 5. Dave Mowat is having his album release party at the Cameron with an all-star lineup who helped with the recording, Steve Marriner, Jimmy Bowskill, Terry Wilkins, Jesse O'Brien and Clayton Yates. It's an early show (6:00 pm to 8:00 pm) so you might even be able to make it to another show later in the evening (Paul Reddick fans will want to hang the Cameron for his show at 10pm). Jack de Keyzer will rock the house at Hugh's Room Live...or catch a rare local appearance from Colin Linden at the TD Music Hall (behind Massey Hall). Then there's guitarslinger Shawn Kellerman celebrating his new solo CD at the Legendary Horseshoe (on a double bill with multi-instrumentalist Steve Marriner who is everywhere and sometimes even two places at once (not to mention being a new parent - Congrats Steve & Jacquie!). Then there's Castro regulars, Fraser/Daley who play from 5:30 pm to 7:30 pm at this beach blues haunt. And if you're out of the city, you might find some great blues shows in your hood: A'Court, Spiegel & Vinnick at the River Run Centre in Guelph. Garnetta Cromwell & DaGroovmasters at Sammy's Creamery in Brantford, and blues pioneer Andy Earle with Manny DeGrandis, Patrick Fockler and Al Cross at La Gabbia in Newmarket. And there's more - see the listings page. Can we say live blues is alive and well?

Jani Lauzon recognized: Congratulations to former TBS board member and friend of the blues Jani Lauzon on being selected as the 2024 Equity Showcase Cayle Woman of the Year. The citation reads "Jani's dedication to the arts and her outstanding contributions to the community make her a shining beacon of inspiration". Not only is she this year's deserving honouree, but Jani is also a past Cayle Award Winner and Mentor, embodying the spirit of excellence and mentorship. Jani Lauzon is a director/ writer/multidisciplinary performer of Métis/French/Finnish ancestry. She is a 10-time Dora Mayor Moore nominated actor/director/writer, a Juno nominated singer/songwriter, an award-winning screen actress, a Gemini Award-winning puppeteer and a Toronto Theatre Critics award-winning director. She is a recipient of the ACTRA Toronto Award of Excellence

and the John Hirsch Directors Award (OAC). As a puppeteershe was Grannie on Mr. Dress-up, Pa Foley on Big Comfy Couch, Seeka on Wumpa's World, and Sasha on Prairie Berry Pie. Her company, Paper Canoe Projects produces her original work including A Side of Dreams, I Call myself Princess and the award-winning Prophecy Fog. Her film Just One Word (supported by the Cayle Chernin Awards) had a successful run of film festivals worldwide. www.janilauzon.com www.papercanoeprojects.com

Road to Memphis: Big Dan Jeffares and his Band are off to Memphis for the International Blues Challenge next year representing the Grand River Blues Society (who just celebrated their 21st Anniversary). Big Dan started playing guitar when he was 8 years old. He caught on quickly and was gigging by the time he was 16. He soon became a big fan of the Blues.He has shared the stage with many greats including....Downchild Blues Band, Colin James, Paul James, Jack deKeyzer and Bobby Dean Blackburn to name a few... The Blues has taken him around the world with tours in Canada, United States, China, Japan and Hong Kong. The sound of Big Dan's voice and his guitar playing comes from deep within his soul. He gives it all he's got every song, every second, every bit of himself comes out in his music.... The band consists of Big Dan Jeffares guitar/ vocals, Toshi Otani guitar, Don Ray bass and Jerry Mclaren, drums. GRBS prez Bruce Hall reports, "The talent on stage from this four piece band was over the top as were all the phenomenal six other bands. The five esteemed judges had a difficult task in scoring the acts".

Musicians take note: If you're planning on gigging in the States, be advised that the fees for a visa have been raised (again). Starting April 1, US Immigration is increasing the fee from \$460 USD to \$510 USD. The processing time can be as long as 90 days so you better book far ahead. If you need your work permit in 30 days, they are happy to provide "premium" processing and the rate for that was just raised from \$2500. to \$2805 USD. There are more fees from the Canadian Federation of Musicians (you have to be an AFM member and then it's \$125 CAD for the first person, plus \$25 for each additional musician/technician) but you can't do it without them and they are very helpful. Any hope that the American Federation of Musicians would step up for their Canadian union brothers and sisters has been dashed so good luck to any independent Canadian blues artist trying to make a splash in the birthplace of the blues. 

Jack de Keyzer Solo Blue Star Records

During the pandemic shut-down, what better way for a seasoned blues guitarist and singer to keep his spirits up and stay in top form than delving into performing and recording a new CD, mainly in the acoustic and traditional style. It was Jack de Keyzer's way of dealing with deep emotions and feelings and to process them, or even sublimate them through music? This is the solution and the medicine that Jack de Keyzer found - killing two birds with one stone, preserving a delicate balance and producing an authentic, high quality album. Among the songs covered we find classics by Reverend Robert Wilkins, J.B. Lenoir, Robert Johnson, Slim Harpo, Eddie Taylor, and even a few modern surprises like Jimmy Page (Led Zeppelin) and Steve Winwood, Recorded at his home studio, Solo is his 13th disc and the adverse circumstances that led to the production of this anthology allows us to appreciate de Keyzer with a new perspective that demonstrate his vast experience and incredible talent. Apart from Richard Thornton's tenor sax overdub and conga on "Feeling Good" by J.B. Lenoir, this master musician plays all the other instruments including rack harmonica, maracas on guitar case, drumming on guitar case and some Fender Jazz Bass. This leading figure of Canadian blues, with two Junos and a Maple Blues Lifetime Achievement Award in 2001 has a huge list of accomplishments. Additionally, during his career, he has worked with big names, from Bo Diddley to the Canadian King Biscuit Boy (Richard Newell), as well as Etta James, Otis Rush, John Hammond and so on! Jack de Keyzer is an exceptional singer, expressing soul with a rare intensity that will stir your soul on this album. He is also a fabulous guitarist, both

acoustically and electrically, which is obvious on this opus. 4.5 stars out of 5! A certain Robert Zimmerman a.k.a. Bob Dylan once said "If Jack de Keyzer was from New York, Chicago or Los Angeles, he would be famous". And as for Jeff Healey, he called Jack the best blues player in Canada. I look forward to hearing the songs from Solo live on stage stage. I believe the show and the resulting performances would deserve to be played around the world and would make people feel good, demostrating that you no longer need to be born in New York, Chicago or Los Angeles to be famous.



Mike Goudreau Band Just want to Have Fun

Just want to Have Fun is the 23rd album by the prolific Mike Goudreau. It includes twelve originals by the artist and is co-produced and recorded with his long-time friend, Dany Roy, the brilliant saxophonist and arranger who also plays trumpet and flute on this opus. This quality production, refined and shot through with jazzy colours, took advantage of the presence of excellent musicians from the Montréal jazz scene, Richard Irwin on drums, Normand Lachapelle on bass, Paul Schrofel on keyboards and Frank Young on gypsy jazz guitar on "Country Cabin Hideway". This care in the selection, assembly and production of titles clearly demonstrates a search for coherence and optimal diversity on the part of the Goudreau-Roy team. Special guest on two tracks, harmonica player Guy Bélanger imprints his melodic, dynamic and fluid style with his characteristic energy. He doesn't go unnoticed, especially in his participation in the medium tempo shuffle "Come Back Home" on which he excels in his usual catchy style. As is often the case, Mike Goudreau's new offering is a successful and integrated amalgam of Swing Jazz, Jump Blues, Chicago Blues, Motown, Gypsy Jazz, Funk and Rock, all in his own way and with the refined taste of the experienced guitarist and singer from the Eastern Townships. Maybe that's what we call talent, passion, experience and sharing? It's worth mentioning that his

world-class music has been heard on dozens of Hollywood and American TV productions, including The Banker (with Samuel Jackson, 2020) and Dark Waters (Mark Ruffalo, 2019), the TV show Dynasty (CBS, 2020) and the Christmas TV movie, The Happiest Season (Hulu, 2020). Of Quebecois origin on his father's side and American on his mother's side, this aficionado of the scene has been able to immerse himself in both cultures and integrate them intimately, and in a beautiful way, which makes him, perhaps the most American of our Quebec blues performers. Thanks to his skills, perseverance and insight, he has been able to make the most of this strategic advantage to make a living from his contribution to the musical field in all aspects, from creation to live performance. "Just want to Have Fun" is a track that defines and represents well the bright and playful approach of Mike Goudreau and his band of hand-picked musicians. Happy listening!

# Blues On The Danny, "A History Lesson"

Danforth Ave.. The Danforth or the Danny as it's affectionately known is one of the main thorofares

on the east side of Toronto, Ontario. Home to numerous bars and nightclubs presenting live music and it's encouraging to know that The Blues presence is strong.

Mike Mckenna's Slidewinder performs on The Black Swan Tavern stage with Mike Sedgewick hosting an acoustic jam Mondays and a Friday Night Jam with his full band on weekends. The 2nd floor blues bar from time gone by is now home to a theatre group. Live music has moved to the main floor. Noonan's across the street from the Swan book The Swingin Blackjacks, Little Magic Sam and The Fraser Melvin Blues Band, lining them up with numerous dates spread out over a year.

Jerome Tucker and Frank Cosentino roll in

on Sundays at The Linsmore Tavern just east of Greenwood and Danforth. Down the block from the Linsmore, Paul Reddick and Steve Marriner slip into residency nights at Sauce disguised as Zeke Pippin and Local Electric respectively and Julian Fauth has held down Tuesday evenings there for years.. A little further east at Coxwell you'll find CC's On Danforth with Heather Luckhart and Broke Fuse holding court.

But let's dial it back a bit and revisit how it all started.

I moved to the east end of Toronto in 1982. My previous 13 years in my chosen home town had me residing in the Annex, Parkdale and Little Italy. East of the Don Valley Parkway was another world. I'd rarely spend time there except to visit inlaws. In the beginning this new part of town

didn't inspire much interest from me. I was in the last segement of my first go round with Downchild, my work was mostly on the road or occassionally in the downtown section of the city.

The Danforth is a 7.2 km avenue that begins on the east side of the Viaduct, the bridge spanning the Don River, signaling the end of Bloor St. It continues east connecting to Danforth Rd and winding up into Scarborough. In the early 80's the

> east end was a music waste land for me with exception of the legendary Knob Hill Hotel at Eglington and Danforth Rd. where Downchild played regularly.

> Not long after the move I became aware of The Black Swan Tavern near the Broadview intersection. Rick Byce and Danny Narducci, two guys I'd met when they managed The El Mocambo in the 70's had moved over to this low profile, off the radar, neighborhood pub. They were booking boring solo acts, playing covers on the second floor. I was working with a talented singer/songwriter, the late Ray Edge, helping him with his career. I booked a solo acoustic gig for him at the Swan. His orginal material didn't impress and he had no following so I think it might have been one engagement, maybe two. I didn't think

much of the place, wondering how Danny and Rick could move from a happening joint like the El Mo to nowheresville.

Within a year things changed, I was out of Downchild and wondering if I still had a career. Rick Byce called during the summer of 1983 and asked if I would like to do a Saturday afternoon Blues jam at The Black Swan Tavern. Why not, I didn't have much going on with the exception of subbing for Omar Tunnoch occassionally with The Biscaynes, working the country bar circuit

> that was thriving in Toronto at the time. Early in my music education I had learned a valuable lesson, never say NO to anything. The answer is always YES, figure out how you're going to pull it off later.

> I had no band and only a few weeks to get it together so I moved fast. First call. Cash Wall for drums and vocals. He was, like me a former member of Downchild (different eras) and an expert at playing traditional blues. We had a rhythm section. Next, Richard Smyth, not really a blues quitarist but one who had studied blues and knew the feel. A really good schooled musician. The last piece was Bob Adams, a

harmonica player Cash and I had met when we were with Dollars in the 70's. He was now going by Cadillac Eddy (he didn't own a Caddy). The Kendall Wall Band was born. We were off and running, dumping the word jam and tagging the gig as a Blues Matinee.

We stumbled along for a couple of years at the Swan surviving an ownership change, management change and a major renovation on the 2nd floor bar, our home base. Some how we survived it all. After the renovations the walls were bare. The owners allowed me to cover them with framed photos and posters of blues artists. They also let me program the between set music with mixed blues tapes. The joint transformed into a blues club modeled after ones I'd experienced while touring Canada and the U.S. with Downchild. When

we started adding special guests to the Blues Matinee we finally started attracting attention. People were now crossing the Don Valley Parkway to catch some good blues in Toronto's east end. Some were even coming from outside the city and we'd converted neighborhood rounders into blues fans.

Eventually the band changed with Jeff Baker taking over on harmonica and adding vocals. The guitar chair rotated often. Richard Smyth was followed by Mike McKenna, Teddy Leonard, Kevin Higgins and Chris Burgess. Cash, Jeff and I were The Kendall Wall Band mainstays.

The bar raised extensively when the booker of Albert's Hall, Toronto's #1 Blues Room during that period discovered us and asked if we would like to have some of their acts questing on Saturday afternoon. In those days the touring bands were in town for a week. This was a huge gift. Our guest line up of local heros, Donnie Walsh, Hock Walsh, Morgan Davis, Rita Chiarelli, Jack de Keyzer, Diana Braithwaite, Danny Marks and many others now expanded to feature Lazy Lester, Snooky Pryor, A.C. Reed, Tinsley Ellis, Chubby Carrier, Luther "Guitar Junior" Johnson, Phil Guy, Eddie Kirkland, Pinetop Perkins, Fenton Robinson, Little Willie Littlefield and many more blues stars of the day. KWB packed the place every Saturday afternoon from early October to mid May, taking a break during the summer months.

We had a fantastic run for nine years but like all good things the end had to come. When the series wrapped for the summer in 1992 Cash Wall and Jeff Baker decided to leave the music business. Continuing without them wasn't an option. A great period of my life was ending, change was coming. I eventually rejoined Downchild, formed The Maple Blues Band, began working with local acts like The Swingin Blackjacks and The Mighty Duck Blues Band in St. Catharines. The terrific years at The Black Swan Tavern, The Blues Matinee and The Kendall Wall Band have been preserved in a great Christopher Darton documentary, The Way We Was available to watch at www.kendallwallband.com It's a wonderful snapshot of Toronto Blues in the 80's and early 90's.

These days when I drive across The Danny. end to end in my part of Toronto I pass by the current hot spots and take great pleasure in seeing what The Kendall Wall Band began in 1983 still thrives.

## Mike McKenna

"I wish the old friends were still around, but I am still learning and I am still inspired"

Can you guess who recently said this? Do you know your Canadian music history? Let's slide guitar into the past, and shine a light on a great foundation of the Blues: live, local music.


There are many major Canadian musicians who have successfully offered up their talent to an appreciative world. Possibly less lauded but whose influence is equally important are local bands. Bands who pour their hearts, souls and sound on the floor of local venues for us. Live. Intimate. A moment in time shared. These artists carry the torch to young musicians starting out and keep the love of live music burning in our local venues.

Blues encompasses all that we are and is much greater than a label. The featured musician of this article can easily shine under the Blues umbrella, but in addition, his contribution to the Toronto/Canadian music scene spans more than 5 decades! He continues to perform with passion and skill to this day. In 2003, he was nominated for a Maple Blues lifetime achievement award. Let me tell you more.

-One of the first bands he helped form played in Toronto's Yorkville Village in the early 1960's. By 1964 he helped create a legendary band that continues to play live locally. His guitar style helped to label this band "innovators of electric blues". In 1967 they did a seven day gig at the historic O'Keefe Centre, opening for the Grateful Dead and Jefferson Airplane.

-In 1968 he and a bandmate created an original band that opened for the Jeff Beck Group in the U.S.; where they received multiple standing ovations. On the cusp of 1969, this band replaced Jimi Hendrix at the Utrecht Pop Festival; remaining in England for an extended time to play and wow crowds on the English and European Club circuit.

-In April 1969 they signed with United Artists and recorded their first album. It was and still is highly regarded. They were the first "major label" act to be a victim of "bootlegging". In 1971 they recorded their second album in San Franscisco. Subsequently they toured Australia. In 1972, they recorded a live album at the old run-down Victory Theater in Toronto. The concert featured a stand up comic and Vaudville style

strippers. The band performed in tuxedo attire. Stuff of legend to this day.

-In 1972, the other main originator of the band left and was replaced by Rick James. Then, James played around Toronto including in a band with Neil Young. (the Mynah Birds) They continued to play to huge, receptive crowds across Canada until James left to pursue a solo career and "SuperFreak" fame.

-When the original "El Mocambo" closed in 2001, this original reunited band made Toronto history as the last to perform on Elmo's famous upstairs stage. Within 20 minutes of the bands encore, construction crews began to tear out the walls.

The story really, in many ways, begins here.

By the early 1960's Toronto was undergoing a transformation. Post war baby boomers were defining themselves as a new generation in every way. Music was the catalyst. Anchored by the scene in Yorkville and Yonge Street this transformation reached a peak in 1966. By then there were more than 1400 rock bands playing live in clubs around the city. From this myriad of bands more

than a few went on to great fame, like Neil Young and The Band. This exciting, live performance output briefly came to be known as the "Toronto Sound."

Mike McKenna, guitarist, singer & songwriter was part of this sound from the beginning. Inspired by Blues guitarist Jimmy Reed, he helped to create the band "Luke and the Apostles". They were considered innovators of "electric blues" with a Toronto sound and when Luke Gibson was brought in as the lead singer, they were considered dynamite! Soon, they were invited to New York to play at the iconic Greenwich Village nightclub called Cafe au Go Go. They were asked to stay for a second week to open for the Grateful Dead. It became an eight week billing.

One can only imagine how exciting this scene must have been for these young musicians. Mike of course, confirms this. But his memories spill over into sheer joy when he recalls the club after their show was over, and the doors were closed. "Some of the best musicians of the time stayed on or dropped in to play and jam deep into the night.....John Hammond, Mike Bloomfield, BB King, Paul Butterfield, Richie Havens, band

members of the Grateful Dead ....we learned from each other....it was one of the best times of my life."

Mike returned from New York to a vital, creative music culture here in Toronto. He played with the best local musicians of the time and at clubs that were thriving. The Blue Note, the Cellar Club, the Devil's Bin, El Patio, the Purple Onion and many more. He joined the "Ugly Ducklings". Eventually, he started his own band called Mainline with self described Canuckian, Mendelson Joe. After Mendelson Joe left Mainline in 1972 and a brief reunion to make a 4th album in 1975; McKenna continued to play with many bands: Downchild, The Guess Who, Diamondback. In the early 1990's Mainline rebooted with new members playing regularly into the 2000's. They often played to sold out crowds at the original El Mocambo. In 2009, Mainline gave their last show at the Black Swan Tavern celebrating McKenna's 45 years on the Toronto music scene.

The Mike McKenna Slidewinder Blues Band was formed in the mid 1990's and released a self titled album in 1997. And though some of the band members have changed over the years, Mike continues to be the force behind Slidewinder, playing live to appreciative local audiences and at festivals and events. He hopes to keep the music of Mainline, Luke and the Apostles and the music inspired by the "Toronto Sound" accessible to new listeners. And yet, he continues to redefine himself. In 2017, Mike teamed up with Maple Blues nominated New Artist of 2021, Jay Moonah forming the McKenna Moona Blues Duo.

Todav Mike McKenna is considered one of the most enduring of Toronto musicians and in league with the best of guitarists Toronto has ever produced. He was inducted into the Canada South Blues Society Hall of Fame in 2013.

Now 77, these days Mike usually sits when he plays, but his virtuosity on the quitar easily can be considered better than ever. He continues to bring all his passion, dedication and love of music to his playing. "It's no different as to when I was a kid except that now the energy required to get to gigs is more challenging. Once there though, all of that is forgotten."

Mike is in the process of writing a book about the magic of the music of the 60's and 70's in Toronto at that time. "It was a time when talented local bands wrote, performed and created amazing music." When asked if Mike has any advice for young musicians making their way to the stage, his first response is "get a day job". But that belies his true feelings. "Be open to music. Listen. Never forget the old music. Keep listening and learning." Something that Mike McKenna continues to do in a live and real way and in our own backyard to this day.




