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

Summer Blues Festivals (part 2)

"Summertime and the living is easy." George Gershwin

Summer should be easy, fun and full of music but the cost of food, accommodations. transportation, concert and festival tickets has skyrocketed. If you are on a tight budget it could mean a deep cut into attending any music events this summer, or even this year. That would be a shame as Summer Blues festivals, generally speaking, give us a great Bang for our Buck! And they go a long way in supporting Canadian Blues musicians not only financially but in a tangible, loving crowd kind of way. It really is the perfect formula for spending a few days outside on a Summer day.

Blues Festivals have been taking a hit with lower attendance and an aging demographic. It is certainly not because there has been a decline in the quality of the music. TBS has a complete list of upcoming festivals across Canada. Reconsider them for this Summer, as they are usually reasonably priced and provide an opportunity to see artists that you would pay a great deal more to see in a single concert at other times of the year. Some are family friendly and mostly free like the Orangeville Blues & Jazz Festival (May 31-June 2) or the Kitchener Blues Festival (August12-15) Both these festivals were featured in last months newsletter and are highly recommended but let's look at a few more

There could be no better kick off to the festival season than this year's Orangeville Blues and Jazz festival, May 30 to June 2

Orangeville has consistenly placed in the top tier of best music festivals in Ontario for years. Orangeville's main street, Broadway, closes for most of the festival and it becomes a pedestrian haven. There will be a return of the popular Blues Cruise on Broadway, with more than 200 vintage cars on display for perusal. It all opens with The Broadway Ramble & New Orleans style March and closes with the Blues and Bikes Show and Shine event. A free music stage & pop up bands will provide live music throughout the week-end. All is free with the exception of the ticketed Blues festival held at the Main Stage in Alexandra Park. Admission

This year the Orangeville Blues & Jazz Festivlal celebrates its 20th anniversary and the lineup is sensational. It includes: the legendary Downchild Blues Band, The Nick Moss Band featuring Dennis Gruenling, Dawn Tyler Watson with the Ben Racine Band, the Jack de Keyzer Band, the Ghost Town Blues Band, Harps of Gold featuring Steve Marriner, Paul Reddick, Jerome Godboo and Larry Kurtz, Spencer Mackenzie, Canefire featuring Jeremy Ledbetter, the Toronto Mass Choir, Brandon Isaak, Conor Gains & Devin Cuddy, Joshua Arden Miller & the Pappy Johns Band, She Wolves of London, the Angelina Hunter Trio, Danny Marks, Garnetta Cromwell & DaGroovmasters, Alan Gerber, Campbell & Johnston, Glenn Marais and the Mojo Train and Larry Kurtz and the Lawbreakers with special quest Rick Taylor.

The performer workshops held in Orangeville's historic downtown public library have returned for this year and they are free.

Then in June...

Pender Harbour Blues Festival (June 7-9) Pender Harbour, BC Produced by the Pender Harbour Blues Society is a festival whose mandate is to "preserve, nurture and promote BC Blues in all its forms." Headliners include Tom Lavin with the Grand Koolios, Marcus Mosely, Diana Braithwaite & Chris Whiteley and the Paperboys. There are no weekend passes and individual ticket prices range from \$15-\$40. Saturday afternoon's "Blues in the Park" from 1-4pm is free with a suggested donation of \$10.

Grand River Black Music Festival and Conference (June 14-16) Kitchener, Ont. The focus of this festival is to present some of our country's best Black musicians in concert embraced by music conferences that are open to discussion, learning and sharing the versatility of Black artistry. All events are at the Kitchener Public Library. Headliners include Errol Starr & TRIBZ, Reharm, Jully Black, Zochi, Solitair and the Toronto Mass Choir. Conference speakers include Michael Williams, Eric Alper, Jully Black, Rudy Blair, Carlos Morgan, Will Strickland and Master T. Food vendors and artisans will be available to the public in the library courtyard each day and to ticket holders in the evening as a licensed event. A free Sunday afternoon concert from 1-5 pm will be given by Solitair at the adjacent Civic Park. A complete listing and schedule can be found on their website. The 3 day pass that includes all conferences, concerts, taxes and charges is \$107.83.

The Toronto Jazz Festival (June 21-30) Yorkville, Toronto Ticketed shows are

in various halls and clubs and at various prices. Headliners include Al di Meola, Cory Henry, Hiatus Kaiyote and the Preservation Hall Band. Yorkville will be the setting for free concerts with over 100 free shows. The Toronto Blues Society Talent Finals will be held on the TD Village Stage in Yorkville at 2:30 on June 24th. Free performances include Molly Johnson, Garnetta Cromwell & the DaGroovmasters, Blue Moon Marquee, Jully Black, BadBadNotGood and Charlotte McAfee-Brunner & her Fireflies. Late night jams begin at the Pilot at 10pm and there is no cover. Artists there include Jane Bunnett's Afro-Cuban Band, the Chris Gale Trio, Larnell Lewis X Joy Lapps & Friends and more. Please check the website listings.

In July:

Mariposa Folk Festival (July5-7) Orillia, Ontario. Technically not a Blues Festival but it is the revered grandfather of all Canadian Summer outdoor festivals. Here, there is a wide variety of styles of music including Blues. This festival was first held in Orillia in 1961, moved to Toronto or area for many years and returned home to Orillia in 2000. It is a family friendly celebration for all ages with over 100 performances on eleven stages. Gordon Lightfoot and many other Canadian superstars have helped to define this superb festival. This year's lineup includes Noah Cyrus, Bahamas, William Prince, Band of Horses, Bruce Cockburn and Old Crow Medicine Show. The multiple stage line up is extensive but here is a taste: Colin Linden, Kim Churchill, Jesse Cook, Amanda Rheaume, Ken Whiteley and Blue Moon Marquee. Too many great musicians to mention so check their website for a complete listing. The vibe is one of Peace and Love. Parking can be limited but shuttle buses will be available. All children 12 and under are free. An adult weekend pass for all shows for the entire 3 days including all taxes and charges is \$229. For young adults aged 19-24, \$125, and for youth aged 13-18 only \$50.

Lighthouse Blues Festival (July 12-14) Kincardine, Ontario. This is a top drawer, smaller festival in Kincardine, Ontario. With its beautiful lakeside 1000 seat venue overlooking Lake Huron's beaches, Kincardine Harbour and Lighthouse; this festival has injected huge amounts of charity support dollars into the community since its inception in 2009. Headliners this year include Blue Moon Marquee, Steve Marriner & Local Electric, Samantha Martin & Delta Sugar, FOG Blues & Brass Band, Steve Strongman and Colin Linden with multiple artists on various stages. There are 4 smaller stages, a free Saturday Street Festival, Artist Row & Retail Street Market, a vintage British sportscar display, Children's Zone and Petting Zoo and a Sunday morning 3 hour outdoor Revival that starts the day with a performance of Gospel music. Affordable. Weekend passes for the entire event with fees and taxes is \$82.02. Single day tickets are a little over \$40.

Donnacona Blues Festival (July 31-August 4) Donnacona, Quebec This 5 day event is another small festival that is worth the drive, although it is a long one from Toronto. Divide the trip in half by staying a night in Ottawa, which is always a great Music & Museum city to visit, and then head out to Donnacona, which is now about a 4 hour drive. There is only one outdoor stage which can be enclosed if it rains. This year's lineup includes Mr. Sipp (Missisippi, U.S) Sue Foley (Canada/U.S.) Popa Chubby (New York, U.S.) Matt Schofield (UK) the Boneshakers (Detroit U.S.) Lloyd Spiegel (Australia) Brandon Santini (Memphis, U.S.) and Big Dez from Paris, France. A complete lineup can be found on their website. Affordable. \$60/person for 4 nights with free admission to shows held in local clubs on July 31st. Children under 14 free. A trailer camping area is provided on site with an add on cost of approximately \$120 for the entire event. For this, booking must be done in advance. Otherwise look for a hotel or airbnb a short distance from the site but book soon!

Slash's **SERPENT Festival** (July 28) Budweiser Stage, Ontario Place. S.E.R.P.E.N.T. is an anagram and stands for Solidarity, Engagement, Restore, Peace, Equality N' Tolerance. Starring SLASH with a rotating cast of accomplices including Keb Mo, Robert Randolph, ZZ Ward and more (more of a roadshow - lineup varies at different cities) July 27 in Windsor.

In August:

Calgary Blues Festival (August 1-August 4) Calgary, Alberta Held in Millenium Park in downtown Calgary this is an easy park to access either by free transit, biking or walking once you are in the downtown area. There is no parking at the site. This 4 day event includes headliners Lester Quitzau, Johnny Max Band, Chris Cain, Angelique Francis, Bobby Dean Blackburn and much more. After the daily concerts in the park. Festival passholders have free entrance to the Twilight Blues series held just a short walk from the park at Kirby Center. Shows go from 10pm until 1:30am. Full 4 day events including the Kirby Center are \$153.06 including all charges. Free music, workshops and events will be held at the legendary King Eddy for 3 days prior to the festival from July 29-31. A visit to the Bell Center Music Hall of Fame is highly recommended.

Chenango Blues Festival (August 16-17) Chenango County Fairgrounds, Norwich NY. Not too far across the border with Ruthie Foster, Sue Foley, Coco Montova, Tinsley EllisBywater Call, Ghalia Volt & many more

The West Coast Blues/Salt & Harvest Festival (August 30-Sept.1) Goderich, Ontario The Goderich Salt & Harvest festival was recently awarded best new event in Ontario in 2023 by Festival Events Ontario. This year, the organizers formed a new partnership with the West Coast Blues Festival which has been bringing Blues to the Goderich area since 2007. With this new alignment this year's festival will probably be the only one in the world that will combine Blues and, of course, Salt. Look for Salt markets, Salt activities, Salt information and history walks. Visit the Salty Basin Beer Garden. Jump on the Hop On-Hop Off bus tour. Enjoy the Flea Market, Farmer's Market, car show, petting zoo and wagon rides. Family friendly. Affordable. Line-up pending.

In September:

Stonebridge Wasaga Beach Blues Fest (Sept13-15) Wasaga Beach, Ontario In existence for twelve years, this is one of the last Summer ourdoor festivals in Ontario. It brings three days of great Blues to two performance stages. Held on the Main Street of Stonebridge Town Center in Wasaga Beach there is an abundance of parking, shops, restaurants and services. This is a bring your own lawnchair event. Coolers are allowed but all liquids are not. The line-up includes Smoke Wagon Blues Band, Erin McCallum, John Finley, the Soul Motivators, Jeff Rogers and LMT Connection. Please check the schedule for a complete list of musicians. Affordable. A 3 day pass is \$42.89 with fees. A single day pass is \$17.27. VIP tickets are available for \$53.14 per night. Located on grass, wheelchair mobility may be an issue.

Harvest Music Festival (Sept10-

15) Frederiction. New Brunswick One of the last of the year in Canada and one of the biggest! Originating in 1991 this festival is considered Eastern Canada's premiere music event with over 400 musicians, 150 performances covering 6 city blocks and 27 stages. Funk, Cajun, Jazz: you will find it all here and there is lots of Blues with a designated Blues stage. Headliners include Broken Social Scene, Feist, Spoon, Sarah Harmer, Skydiggers and Alejandro Escovedo. The Blues line-up includes Colin James & the Little Big Band, Big Sugar, Joanna Connor & the Wrecking Crew, Connor Fox, the Downtown Blues Band, Friends of the Brothers, Matt Minglewood and the Julian Taylor Band. The ultimate 5 day pass that includes all stages and all shows is \$345 plus taxes & fees, so


just under \$400. Combinations of various combined day or 2 day passes go from \$85/\$115 to \$155 plus taxes and fees. Prices vary but are quite reasonable for individual stage performances, so check their website for detailed information. There is an all free stage and tons of buskers, visiting artisans and food vendors. If you have never been to Fredriction this might be one of many good reasons to consider going.

Summer should be livin'easy and fun and outdoor music festivals can sure help to make it feel that way. Even with inflation. many of these festivals are quite affordable. Accomodations can be your biggest cost so look to alternative ways of keeping prices managable. Consider sharing. Book early.

Find more affordable accomodations a short drive from the site. Consider camping or glamping. If there is an abundance of hotels to choose from compare prices. If the festival is in your area take public transit. Book airbnb's that have kitchens and/or outdoor bbg's to save on the cost of food. If you are travelling by car pre-buy your alcohol and plan and pre-cook some of your meals.

Richard Flohil-A life on the **Edge of Music**

After nearly a 65 year life commitment to music as a major Canadian publicist, writer, manager and concert promotor you would think Richard Flohil would be ready for a rocking chair to ponder that life. But no, Richard has never lost his passion for music or the desire to search out great talent. Nor has he stopped going out to hear live music, still

attending concerts locally and across the country: close to 40 shows already this year. He will be celebrating his 90th birthday on Monday, June 24th at Lula Lounge and it is going to be one hell of a party and a celebration not to be missed.

"At my age I don't think I want to rest in peace; If there is some sort of afterlife (which I doubt) I want to party my face off."

The lineup rocks and is a reflection of the deep respect musicians have for Richard. The fact that he is turning 90 years old is a lovely tidbit, but it is his lifetime of dedication to music and musicians that is the real story. It is going to be an all star concert and includes Jaymz Bee, Kevin Breit, Charlotte McAfee-Brunner, Sonya Cote, Treasa Levasseur, Mariska Martina, Andrea Ramolo, Corin Raymond, Paul Reddick, Shakura S'Aida, LorynTaggart, Samantha Windover and longtime friend Holger Petersen. A set will be given by Samantha Martin and Delta Sugar is the house band. There is also a very special surprise guest. All proceeds wil go to the Unison Fund, a non profit charity created in 2010 that offers life saving financial and counselling services to musicians in the Canadian music community.

Richard Flohil was nine years old when he was sent to a private boarding school 30 miles north of London, England. He now refers to it as a school for unwanted children. It was a place where every moment of the day was organized and controlled, and he hated it. "I was grubby and a poor student." I once scored 2 out of 100 on a mathematics

test, having only got my name and the date right. Even worse, I was hopeless at sports." The written word however fascinated him and he produced his first hand- written school newspaper at twelve years old. He developed a love for reading and books. The one sport he excelled at was long-distance running which helped him to tear to the common room once a week after classes to hear the BBC Jazz Club on the radio. "Alone among my peers I loved this music-the energy, the drive, the simplicity of the tunes, the skill of the players"

"I wanted to meet those iconic Blues musicians I had only heard on records".

This early passion for Jazz and the written word was to take him a long way. At sixteen, he began to work as a junior newspaper reporter north of London eventually becoming a chief reporter at the Selby Gazette and the Herald. He moved to Canada in his early 20's.

> Once in Toronto he began to edit trade magazines, slowly starting career promoting and managing local artists and presenting concerts and writing entertainment

articles most often for the Toronto Star. In 1970 he became editor of the music magazine "The Canadian Composer/Le Compositeur Canadien. He held that job for 22 years.

Richard Flohil's reputation as a "good guy" in the industry (something rarer than you would think) grew exponentially and he soon became one of the most prominent and experienced publicists in the music industry. He did get to present the first Canadian appearance of those very Blues musicians he had longed to meet in his youth: Muddy Waters, BB King, Bobby Bland and Buddy Guy. As a music promotor his clients read like a Who's Who of talent and are to be found in almost all genres of music: from Sir George Martin to kd Lang to Alice Cooper. In Canada he has worked for decades promoting Canadian musicians particularly in the early stages of their career. Clients have included Ani DiFranco, Prairie Oyster, Crash Test Dummies, Ian Tyson, Shakura S'Aida, Long John Baldry, Loreena McKennitt....too many to mention. He was the program director of the Mariposa Folk Festival for several years and was inducted into the Mariposa Hall of Fame in 2017. He was the co-manager of the Downchild Blues Band for several decades.

"It's too late to quit now." John Lee Hooker Richard's long involvement with music

has presented him with many opportunities to interact with iconic musical artists. Last year he launched "Stories from the Edge of Music". He is a masterful story teller and a gifted writer. There are already 29 instalments of stories that are personal, funny, insightful and delightful. They are about human beings who happen to be musicians, sometimes very famous ones. Take his poignant story about helping to bring legendary trombonist Chris Barber to Toronto to play with Jeff Healey not too long before Jeff died from sarcoma cancer at 42 years of age: it is a story that melts the heart. Or his memories of meeting and then writing the very first cover story on Stompin' Tom Connors, a man who came from a poverty stricken childhood framed by orphanages, group homes and ill-chosen foster parents. Or his remarkably personal yet bitter sweet interaction with the then reclusive, eccentric Jazz genius Miles Davis who offered to buy his beat up old vehicle for \$2000 cash so he could drive home after a show at Massey Hall.

And there are many more stories yet to come: "more than anything else I consider myself a storyteller. I got into music promotion because I wanted to hear and meet the musicians. How could a passion for music in a career as long as mine not have stories

"Richard is my quardian angel, my buddy, a great artist of those who become great. It was so important to have him on my record. He has never been on an album and he deserves that." Shakura S'Aida

In 2022 Shakura S'Aida released "Hold on to Love", a soulful, sexy exhilarating album of mostly original songs. She decided her last song on the album would be Neil Young's "Heart of Gold" and she knew she wanted Richard to be part of that song. Her interpretation is beautiful and ends with Richard's final whisper of the lyrics. It was a wise and respectful choice by an artist who understands that Richard only has to look to himself to find that heart. A heart of gold that has lived a life rich with the love of music. And a heart that is soon to log 90 years of living.

Friends of King Biscuit Boy annual concert: The 20th annual Blues with a Feeling concert will be held Saturday, May 11 at 8:00pm at the Leander Boat Club in Hamilton. Presented by The Friends of Richard Newell the annual concert pays tribute to Hamilton's foremost exponent of the blues, the late Richard Newell a.k.a. King Biscuit Boy. This year's show presents two dynamic blues guitarists and their electrifying bands-Steve Strongman and Brant Parker and a tribute to King Biscuit Boy must include at least one outstanding harmonica player and this year it's multiple Maple Blues Award winner and Juno nominee Carlos del Junco. Increased Support for Music in Budget 2024: A big thank-you to the Canadian Government, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, and Minister of Canadian Heritage Pascale St Onge, for the increase in support to Canada Arts Presentation Fund (CAPF) and the Canada Music Fund (CMF) in the 2024 Federal Budget. The budget allocates \$31 million over two years (starting 2024-25) to the CAPF, supporting organizations that professionally present arts festivals/performing arts series. Glenn Marais & the Mojo Train Red, Hot and Blue

It's not easy to settle on a genre that defines Red. Hot and Blue the latest album from Newmarket, Ontario's Glenn Marais & the Mojo Train. Is it blues? Funk? Rock? R&B? Yes.

If you've ever met Marais, you'll know that the Juno-nominated singer-songwriter likes to colour outside the lines. Saying that his band's new album doesn't easily fit into any one musical genre probably won't bother him at all.

You'll hear it in Marais' cackling laugh. He likes to mess with people. For sure, he likes to get people moving, dancing and singing, but the artist in him also likes to challenge people.

Marais does this on multiple levels: in his songwriting and music, but also with his poetry, with the story and characters in his award-winning play JOOK, and in anti-racism and anti-bullying performances he delivers in schools throughout Ontario.

So how are Marais and the Mojo Train "messing with us" with their latest album "Red, Hot and Blue"?

I caught up with Marais recently to capture some of his thoughts behind the band's latest album. He and the Mojo Train were fresh off a trip where the band performed many of the songs on their new album en route to reaching the semi-finals in the International Blues Competition in Memphis, Tenn.

"This time around, it's all about love," said Marais with a laugh. "Love denied, love discovered. I'm in a better place now than I was and that's reflected in the writing and in the music. I'm more comfortable now with who I am, and being more loving. I'm learning to appreciate the moment more."

Marais said recovering from the grief of losing his brother and mother had a profound

effect on him. "My brother Andre was always pushing me, saying 'you hold back too much.' I don't play the same way now. I'm much more uninhibited."

Marais said part of opening up was allowing more room for his bandmates to get involved with this album. "We started to change the way we were doing things," he said. "It was more collaborative. Before I would just try to do everything, even things like fundraising and merchandising. It wasn't effective and it was frustrating me."

This openness is reflected in the album's sound, with bandmates taking a much more active role in lyrics, and in the directions of songs.

Performing on Red, Hot and Blue are the Mojo Train regulars: drummer Jeff Saulnier, bassist Manny DeGrandis, and keyboard player Jesse Karwat (who recently played keys on tour with I Mother Earth). Other session musicians Mike Stevens who played harmonica on some tracks and former Mojo member Nick Bogoeff who played flute and sax. The album was produced by Karwat and Marais and mastered by Adam Ayan.

"This is really a band album. Each of us was fully involved for the whole recording," said DeGrandis. "The album shows exactly what we are like now as a band. High energy, funky catchy hooks with a blues rock base."

DeGrandis said the pandemic shut down the band in the middle of recording the album, but it ended up working out for them, because it gave them time to keep improving the songs. "We would record a couple songs at a time, work on finishing them, and then hit another couple of songs. A lot of times bands need to rush recording their albums because of time or financial constraints."

Marais said four of the songs on the new album were born during sound checks. "There is a loose atmosphere during sound check in the way we interact. You are just feeling everything. There's a lot of work to get everything set up, and now we just get to play and be creative," he said.

The Mojo Train has been playing together for more than a decade and it shows on the album and in their live performances. For a band fully capable of jamming and improvising for hours at the drop of a hat, they are tightly-connected on the new album. Even though Marais is a skilled lead quitarist known for blistering solos, he's reined it in on the album, all in the support of keeping the vibe and elevating the songs.

This self restraint lets the listener glide along on a rhythmic wave, hearing each of the instruments clearly and with the vocals well up in the mix to deliver the nuance and emotion to deliver the message behind the music.

But the band's irrepressible energy can only be contained for so long, and when the dynamics shift on the title track Red, Hot and Blue, the slow ride on the Mojo Train speeds into full-blown blues rock, ending only after an emotion-packed and lengthy note held by Marais that ends the song.

The Delta Blues make more than just a quest appearance on the album with the track "It All Went Down", a heavier rhythmic number with a driving beat with a wailing harmonica trying desperately to be heard in the mix, like a suppressed cry.

"That's Where My Mojo's At" showcases the band's strengths as a high energy live act, and is the song they used to kick off their performances in the Memphis blues competitions. The strength of the band's rhythm section shines through with DeGrandis' driving bass and Saulnier's drumming holding the ship steady while Marais unleashes his Strat and delivers some tasty licks.

On "Love, Sweet Love", the band switches it up again and delivers a Stevie Wonder vibe that would have been perfectly happy lighting up radio stations in the 70s. It's a tune that just makes you want to smile and clap along.

On "Pink Lemonade", the band veers into pop terrain with a punchy beat and "fluffier" lyrics, with Marais reminiscing about youthful days drinking pink lemonade, giving us a break from the heavier themes, and taking us back to a time when life was less serious and less complicated.

"The Song of Love" is a sleepy blues burner that would be perfectly suited for an upscale coffee house or jazz bar. Horns make an appearance, adding to the jazzy feel, and even the guitar licks are slow and yearning, adding new musical directions.


Red, Hot and Blue won't be for everyone's taste, because while the album holds together, it crosses into different musical lanes.

Even in Memphis, the band's genre-fluidity probably kept them from advancing further in the competition because the judges didn't quite know what to do with a band whose driving energy ignited the crowds in the Beale Street clubs, but did so outside the familiar confines of the 12-bar blues.

But Glenn Marais and the Mojo Train don't like to play by the rules, they set their own and take what comes their way, which is usually praise and more fans.

RickVito Cadillac Man Blue Heart Records


Rick Vito, born in 1949 had, I must say, escaped my attention, like an invisible man who has nevertheless played on over a hundred records, including a dozen releases, CDs and DVDs under his own signature. When I listened to him blind, I was seduced by his slide guitar playing! His sound and know-how made me open my ears and all my senses, wide! This guitarist and singer went to the right school, learning slide guitar from Elmore James and Robert Nighthawk, not to mention B.B. King, Les Paul and many others. By the 1970s, he had played on albums by such diverse artists as Todd Rundgren, Bobby Whitlock, John Mayall, John Prine, Roger McGuinn, Steve Goodman and Maria Muldaur. His contributions have since multiplied, including Bob Seger, Bonnie Raitt, Albert Collins, Jackson Browne, Little Richard, Roy Orbison, John Fogerty, and the list goes on... From 1987 to 1991, he was a member of the legendary band Fleetwood Mac. Nominated for a Grammy in 2010 in the Best Traditional Blues category, as both artist and producer, he also won a W.C. Handy Award in 2001 for his song "It's Two AM", then performed by the warm Shemekia Copeland, the daughter of the Texas Twister. Returning to his Cadillac Man album, on which, incidentally, he enlists the help of Canadian harmonica player Steve Marriner on the upbeat, danceable "Little Sheba", it sounds like a comfortable ride in a Cadillac, cruising through different blues styles and the vagaries of the road! "Crying At Midnight" is a slow blues with a solemn style, soaring guitar tones and expressive vocals. The result is an intense, atmospheric blues! "Sliding In The Blue", which closes the album, is a slow, slide-instrumental blues that showcases all the finesse and subtlety of a musician with refined taste and enhanced experience. With the release of Cadillac Blues, Rick Vito proves once again that he is a high caliber artist to be discovered or revisited, as the case may be. Enjoy the ride!

Eric Bibb Live at the Scala Theatre Stony Plain

After five decades of a fruitful career and thirty-six albums behind him, Eric Bibb, in the tireless pursuit of his musical journey of blues, folk, gospel and Americana represents for me a style, a genre in itself. Faithful to his deep roots, his rich family musical legacy, his positive philosophy and style, he breathes his music, his voice and his approach into the spirit of the times for whoever wants to listen. His latest opus, Live at The Scala Theater in Stockholm, flows and unfolds harmoniously with the close, heartfelt collaboration of his musician friends. The instrumentation used is rich and includes acoustic and electric guitar, slide guitar, pedal steel guitar, bass and double bass, drums, harmonica, violin, kora, mandola (alto mandolin of Algerian origin), piano and keyboards. The use of a string quartet for two songs, as well as three vocalists for the final tune, demonstrates that he did not skimp on the means and efforts to make the best possible arrangements work. The ensemble of musicians, as in a concert of roots music, tastefully renders Americana that is sweet to the ear, peaceful to body and soul as well as to the live audience who basked in this human and warm celebration! The repertoire includes the traditional "Goin' Down The Road Feelin' Bad", "500 Miles" and "Mole In The Ground", arranged in his own unique style. The blues pioneers, Leadbelly

and Walter Vinson of the Mississippi Sheiks are revisited and we are also treated to some compositions by Bibb, "Silver Spoon", "Along The Way", "Rosewood", co-written with Glenvin Anthony Scott, his musical director, as well as "River Blues".



These tell us more about Bibb's life experiences and his view on the facts of life. At the end of the show, he invites the audience to sing with him the chorus of the simple and beautiful "Mole in the Ground", this singalong resulting in a warm and feel-good finale! Eric Bibb represents for me the sharing of music, and sung poetry that never goes out of style, well rooted in the tradition and evolving with the seasons! It's a generosity, a charm, an enchantment! 
