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




Herstory of The Women's **Blues Revue**

Quisha Wint is the incoming Producer of the 2024 edition of the Women's Blues Revue as a component of the succession plan underway for Derek Andrews to hand off TBS duties overseen for many years.

Jani Lauzon and David Barnard sparked the inaugural idea when they were both board members of the TBS. "We were sitting one night, David Barnard and I"blue-skying" about the importance of honouring the women of our genre - in blues music. Most events hadn't included women - we wanted to change that and we came up with the concept together."

Club Rhythm was the location of the first WBR, a long cabaret venue that convert to rock some years ago as The Velvet Underground. The place was packed and celebratory, with tons of estrogen but in that early day, an almost all male band led by Gary Kendall and Martin Aucoin had Maureen Brown on her kit showing the way. The band featured John Tilden and Michael Pickett but featured among the nine singers were Salome Bey and Jackie Richardson. Many of these details can be found on the TBS Archive pages dedicated to the Women's Blues Revue.

The popularity of the event escalated to the Horseshoe Tavern for two years, The Diamond Club (now Phoenix) in year four and then the Opera House, U of T's Convocation Hall then Trinity St. Paul on Bloor Street for six years. There were five years at the Danforth Music Hall before we finally landed at Massey Hall in 2004.



Throughout these many years the host was CBC's Shelagh Rogers and the concert was recorded for broadcast by CBC Radio leading to a compilation captured in 2006 with fifteen tracks produced by Lily Sazz, who was also bandleader for many years (1996-2006). After Lily's eleven years, Suzie Vinnick was also bandleader (2007-09) and yet to be famous Donna Grantis took the helm for a few (2010-12), then handed off to trumpet boss Rebecca Hennessy, who did nine years (2014-22) but recently recruited Elena Kapeleris to take the chair in 2023.

Diana Braithwaite commented in a TBS video: "It is an important event because it really focuses on the women in the blues!"

Looking back at the band evolution is an interesting signal on how things have progressed. It was only after eight years that the majority of the band were women (2008) but then Lily Sazz became Music Director and bandleader, always with a solid "Women with Horns" section!

Lily offers: "Some of my closest friendships and musical collaborations were formed over the years during the rehearsals and performances for Women's Blues Revue. Back in the day, the CBC would bring one of their remote studios and record the show sometimes airing it nationally as soon as the next morning! I hope that the Women's Blues Revue continues to inspire young women and girls as they witness the powerful beauty of these artists as they work together to stage one of the best concerts in the country each year."

As the size of venue grew, the risk also increased with mid-size rooms selling out

> Shuter Street. Early editions had as many as nine singers, making for a long night, but production costs influenced the shape of things with a six singer "formula" introducing new names with legends. The show always featured true blues, a couple "headliners and discovery. The concert has introduced Alana Bridgewater (1998), Amanda Marshall (1990), Serena Ryder (2002 & 04), Ndidi Onukwulu (2004), Nicky Yanofsky (2007), Little Miss Higgins (2010) and Crystal Shawanda (2015).

> Shakura S'Aida also commented in the video: "We get to see women who do the blues - and women who might not do the blues all the time. But they know that (blues) is where their gift comes from..."



Amanda Marshall only played the event once (1990) as her career took off like a rocket and similarly Holly Cole (1989) just played the Horseshoe Tavern edition, while rockers Lee Aaron (1996) Carole Pope (2000) and Martina Sorbara (Dragonette) and Melissa McClelland (2019) have pushed the blues to the edge. In a few instances, the show went on the road, with Rita Chiarelli, Jani Lauzon and Diana Braithwaite playing at the Vancouver Folk Music Festival and a more robust version landing at the National Arts Centre during Canada Scene in 2015.


Of the over 250 performances, a number of women have come back to the show due to popular demand and Dawn Tyler Watson, Shakura S'Aida and Diana Braithwaite share the honour of eight appearances. We saw legendary Jodie Drake three times in the early days before she passed, only two Americans have hit the stage, Rory Block and Alberta Adams!


Shakura S'Aida says: "I have been a part of the Women's Blues Revue family for 32 years, almost the entirety of my musical career. Thanks to this brainchild of Derek Andrews, David Barnard and Jani Lauzon, I have been lucky enough to share the stage with some of the most talented vocalists and musicians in Canada and perform in front of audiences whose cheers and encouragement inspires us all to shine bigger and brighter every time. WBR has played an integral part in my career and has helped mold me into the artist that I am today."

A last comment from Jani from her documentary interview: "This show will leave you feeling like your heart has just exploded and your mind! You will leave with a big smile on your face."

The Blues Music Awards: Canadian and Canada-based blues artists Sue Foley and Kenny 'Blues Boss' Wayne had a big night in Memphis at the Blues Music Awards. Sue Foley won in the Traditional Female Artist (Koko Taylor Award) category. And Juno-winning keyboardist/singer Wayne also won, in the Pinetop Perkins Piano Player category. Both these artists are on the Stony Plain Records label, and current head Geoff Kulawick and label co-founder Holger Petersen were on hand to enjoy the celebration with them. Honourary-Canadian, Annika Chambers (Madame Paul Deslauriers) received the Soul Blues Female Artist. Guitarist Christone "Kingfish" Ingram was the night's biggest winner, taking home four awards, including "Album of the Year" for Live In London. Mike Zito, Bobby Rush, Ruthie Foster and John Primer also garnered multiple awards. The 45th Annual Blues Music Awards took place May 9 in Memphis. Go to blues.org for a full list of winners.

Sue Foley One Guitar Woman, A Tribute To The Female Pioneers Of Guitar Stony Plain

One Guitar Woman, A Tribute To The Female Pioneers Of Guitar, the first acoustic album by quitarist Sue Foley among sixteen personal opuses, let's say it bluntly, is a tour de force! In addition, it is probably a milestone that will remain significant in her career. After having collected, on numerous occasions, several awards and honours from both the United States and Canada. Blues Music Awards. Austin Music Awards. Maple Blues Awards, the musician from Ottawa returned to work without resting on her laurels. Heart and soul, she went to meet the artists who inspired her, trailblazers and visionaries from the beginning of the twentieth century, the era of the first blues music recorded and broadcast on the radio. These pioneers of the quitar, resilient artists and magicians of the stage, it was they who challenged her and showed her the way, from the beginning of her career. These extend beyond the confines of blues, the music of the "facts of life", and we find them in various roots or even traditional music, such as country, Tex-Mex, flamenco and even at the heart of classical music that has soul! A common denominator of these musical artists who illustrated their era and expanded the history of the guitar is that they are capable, even virtuoso, guitarists and that they have also marked the imagination by means of expression of their different styles, characters and particular attributes. Their names are: Elizabeth Cotten, a self-taught Piedmont fingerpicking style guitar that she plays with finesse. She began her career when she was already in her sixties. "Freight Train" and "Babe It Ain't No Lie" are the chosen selections. Memphis Minnie, born in 1897, is recognized as one of the

and guitarists in the history of the blues. Endowed with a strong personality, she was able, through strength of character and boldness, to carve out and maintain her place in the harsh, almost exclusively male blues environment of her time. In "My Girlish Days" and "Ain't Nothing In Rambling" are the evocative youthful titles chosen. Maybelle Carter, recognized as the matriarch of country music, was also Johnny Cash's mother-in-law and a significant mentor to him. She is an institution and a foundation herself and she incorporates different styles of guitar playing into her music. "Lonesome Homesick Blues" is the song selected for this tribute album. In addition, Sue Foley even wrote a song in her honor which highlights her substantial contribution to country music through the Carter Family. This is "Maybelle's Guitar", Sue's lyrics to the tune of AP Carter's "Wildwood Flower." Lydia Mendoza, nicknamed "Mother of Tejano Music" or Tex-Mex music, has had a career that has spanned six decades. She is a recognized and celebrated legend of the twentieth century. Sue Foley aptly interprets the poignant song "Mal Hombre", the story of a heartless man who abandons a young girl after using her. She translated the verses from Spanish to English, keeping only the chorus in the original language. Foley's adaptation of this song screams truth! Elvie Thomas and Geeshie Wiley are recognized country blues artists. They recorded only six titles together, while creating a deep impact, notably with "Motherless Child Blues" and "Last Kind Blues". These tunes are covered with aplomb on this album. Sister Rosetta Tharpe is celebrated as the "Godmother of Rock and Roll." She influenced icons such as Little Richard, Johnny Cash and Chuck Berry. She is said to have been the first gospel artist to transition to a career in popular music. For this collection, Sue Foley chose to interpret "My Journey To The Sky", an original composition by the artist which expresses a more reflective and profound aspect of her rich experience. With the choice of Ida Presti, a virtuoso guitarist born in France in 1924, Sue takes us into the fascinating world of the guitar within classical music. She offers us her personal interpretation of "Romance in A Minor" by Niccolo Paganini, the eminent violinist and composer of the nineteenth century. Sue Foley mentions that she has great admiration for this guitarist for her dexterity, her depth and her feeling. Charo. this multi-talented Spanish-American artist, actress, singer, comedienne is the first guitarist that Foley says she saw in performance. This classically trained artist coupled with mastery of the flamenco

style left a deep impression on her with her flamboyant personality and brilliant playing. She covers, on this anthology disc, the very popular classic, "La Malaguena". The Ottawa-Texas quitarist says Charo is even the reason she plays Spanish guitar. In fact, on this extraordinary project, she uses only a nylon string guitar with a successful unifying effect. With the album, One Guitar Woman, A Tribute To The Female Pioneers of Guitar. Sue Foley delivers an exceptional achievement conceived and carried out with care and skill, as well as interpreted with sincerity and accuracy demonstrating that she is a creative artist who does not shy away from the beaten track. Adam Karch Some Awkward Country Ahead Independent

Adam Karch is a Ouebecois acoustic guitarist and singer, proven and expressive, who tells stories, life facts in a panorama of Americana and blues music. His hybrid acoustic playing technique consists of precise, dense, and natural fingerpicking, which he merges with rhythmic actions played with the thumb, as well as percussive and varied actions on the body and the strings of his guitar. These additions fused into his playing add bass and drum effects to his music that capture attention, energize the performance, and engage the audience. Certainly, he is not the only one to use these techniques; however, he executes them effectively and personally, so much so that his particular approach, his voice, and his presence allowed him to win the prize at the International Blues Challenge in Memphis in the category of Best Solo / Duo Guitarist in January 2023. He then represented the Montreal Blues Society among musicians from different regions of the United States and several countries. Some Awkward Country Ahead is his sixth album. It includes eleven compatible selections, assembled into a well-integrated whole. He claims two of

them himself, including the title track Some Awkward Country Ahead, which deals with resilience and determination in the face of a strange and uncomfortable environment where he wants to make his mark. The second, Kelly's Blues, is an instrumental in a style reminiscent of Mississippi John Hurt as a tribute to Kelly Joe Phelps, a guitarist he particularly appreciates. Black And Blue is a composition with darker angles and perspectives that he shares with James Stadnick, a long-time collaborator. The opening piece, My Birmingham, comes from the pen of the Gaspe storyteller musician, Dale Boyle. It speaks of letting go and keeping hope for a better future, following unrequited love. Four excellent tracks were also developed in collaboration with experienced lyricists from Ohio, including New York City's a Lie, my personal favorite from this album. It is a beautiful folk song, with a magnificent melody accompanied by a direct and poignant lyric that tells the clear and decisive story of a country boy who finds none of his bearings in the bustling city full of artifices. Ain't nothin' pretty 'bout New York City to a country boy like me I'd rather see him strut and watch an old buck ruttin' from a deer stand up in a tree... Trade a sky-scraper for forty-five acres and a piece of simple life and I'll get by... Two excellent covers complete the whole. The first, Moonshiner, is a public domain song that tells the raw and realistic story of a hardened drinker. The result is incisive from popular expressions and simple words imbued with the truth of experience. The second is John the Revelator, a holy blues, a striking classic by Blind Willie Johnson that completes this album on an inspiring note. The album Some Awkward Country Ahead was played, recorded live, and produced by Adam Karch, at his own pace, on his terms, in the intimacy of his apartment. The mixing is by François Thiffault and the mastering by Philip Shaw Bova. The ultra-realistic and bizarre illustration on the cover is by Marc Audet. It depicts, with acuity, the dichotomous strangeness of the country to be traversed. The magnificent, colorful photo of the lefthanded guitarist with his instrument is by James St-Laurent. The overall result of this self-production, marked by great simplicity, is original and carefully crafted in every way. The album sounds great and exudes authenticity! Karch's acoustic guitar playing is brilliant and rich with uplifting intros. The selected lyrics are relevant, picturesque, and the interpretation is sensitive and masterfully executed. Fans of Adam Karch, folk, Americana, blues, and acoustic guitar should be delighted. Beneath the surface, behind the image, there is a vast, rich, and strange country to inhabit... Anthony Geraci Tears In My Eyes Blue Heart Records

Anthony Geraci is an experienced pianist and organist born in New Haven, Connecticut and residing in Boston. From a young age, he attended live performances by great bluesmen such as B.B. King, Muddy Waters, and Jimmy Rogers, who influenced him and contributed to his musical education. Later, he would come full circle when he had the opportunity to perform with them as well as with several other heavyweights. In the meantime, Geraci graduated from Berklee College of Music with a B.A. (Bachelor of Arts), and then from Skidmore College with an M.A. (Master Degree). His significant encounters with bluesmen and subsequent academic training have contributed to shaping the eclectic and accomplished artist he has become over time. Over his career spanning more than five decades, he has produced several albums under his name and contributed to dozens of recordings with renowned performers. An anecdote highlights that he even played organ and piano on five tracks of the first CD by Quebecois Steve Hill in 1997. Tears In My Eyes is the second album by this experienced and renowned pianist and keyboardist on Blue Heart Records. It includes eleven original tracks by Geraci. This opus is an eclectic mix of electric blues in the purest tradition, and it also includes five instrumental pieces with varied styles and instrumentation. These include the participation of Drew Davies on saxophone on five tracks and Anne Harris on violin on the evocative and melodic Memphis Mist. Singer and harmonica player Sugar Ray Norcia, his road companion from the colorful period of the Bluetones, contributes vocals on three tracks. If a mix of electric blues in the purest tradition, juxtaposed with elements of jazz, soul, and instrumental pieces of varied styles interests you, this personal record by Anthony Geraci and his band The Boston Blues All-Stars is for you!

Summer Blues Festivals (part 3)

Here's some highlights for June...

Pender Harbour Blues Festival (June 7-9) Pender Harbour, BC Produced by the Pender Harbour Blues Society is a festival whose mandate is to "preserve, nurture and promote BC Blues in all its forms." Headliners include Tom Lavin with the Grand Koolios, Marcus Mosely, Diana Braithwaite & Chris Whiteley and the Paperboys. There are no weekend passes and individual ticket prices range from \$15-\$40. Saturday afternoon's "Blues in the Park" from 1-4pm is free with a suggested donation of \$10.

Grand River Black Music Festival and Conference (June 14-16) Kitchener, Ont. The focus of this festival is to present some of our country's best Black musicians in concert embraced by music conferences that are open to discussion, learning and sharing the versatility of Black artistry. All events are at the Kitchener Public Library. Headliners include Errol Starr & TRIBZ, Reharm, Jully Black, Zochi, Solitair and the Toronto Mass Choir. Conference speakers include Michael Williams, Eric Alper, Jully Black, Rudy Blair, Carlos Morgan, Will Strickland and Master T. Food vendors and artisans will be available to the public in the library courtyard each day and to ticket holders in the evening as a licensed event. A free Sunday afternoon concert from 1-5 pm will be given by Solitair at the adjacent Civic Park. A complete listing and schedule can be found on their website. The 3 day pass that includes all conferences, concerts, taxes and charges is \$107.83.

The Toronto Jazz Festival (June 21-30) Yorkville, Toronto Ticketed shows are in various halls and clubs and at various prices. Headliners include Al di Meola, Cory Henry, Hiatus Kaiyote and the Preservation Hall Band. Yorkville will be the setting for free concerts with over 100 free shows.
