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Historic and First-Class:

Momen's Blues Revue **2025**

It is a mind bender that this remarkable annual event is turning 38 years old this year. It is a bellwether concert that has consistently presented music talent of the highest order. From its first days at Toronto's Horseshoe Tavern in 1987 it has endured; gracing stages like Trinity St. Paul's, The Opera House, The Danforth Music Hall, U of T's Convocation Hall and Massey Hall. It had its 30th anniversary at Ottawa's National Art Centre. Artist Alumni read like a who's who of Canadian talent: Molly Johnson, Holly Cole, Diana Braithwaite, Sue Foley, Lee Aaron, Liberty Silver, Amanda Marshall, Serena Ryder, Carol Pope, Ellen McIlwaine, Divine Brown, Alana Bridgewater, Dawn Tyler Watson, Layla Zoe. It would take me until the end of this article to list all the epic participants over the years. And then there is the house band. What a band! It is typically composed of at least eight women musicians: each of them highly regarded artists. Consider past alumni Jane Bunnett, Maureen Brown, Lily Sazz, Rebecca Hennessy, Suzie Vinnick and Colleen Allen, just to name a few. The Band alone is worth the cost of admission. But they are on the stage for a reason and that is to feature the headliners. And this year's lineup leaves no doubt that this iconic concert should not be missed.

Featured vocalists this year include Jackie Richardson, Cheryl Lescom, Shakura S'Aida, Celeigh Cardinal, Joce Reyome and Angelica Jones. Jackie Richardson will be making a triumphant return to the Women's Blues Revue stage as she headlined the first WBR in 1987. It will be an emotionally charged performance by a woman whose career has come full circle. To read more about her legendary film and music story, check out our Maple Blues October issue. Cheryl Lescom's career also spans several decades. But like a superb wine she is better now than ever. This dynamic performer and singing sensation are like the Revue itself: a Class Act. Reflections on her remarkable career can be found in our Maple Blues September issue. Shakura S'Aida is

a three-time Juno nominee and entertainer extraordinaire. She has garnered multiple Maple Blues nominations winning "Female Blues Artist of the Year "and the Independent Music Award's "Blues Artist of the Year" in 2011. Her success as a singer and an actress (Lost Girl, Schitt's Creek, Flashpoint) is extraordinary. She will be doing double duty as both host and performer.

How could this night of music possibly get any better? Well, with three more headliners. They are a little less known and newer to the music scene, but they bring a rich tapestry of extraordinary talent to this iconic Revue. Let me introduce Angelica Jones. I recently saw her high-spirited performance

at this Summer's Wasaga Blues Festival. Angelica (formerly of the Angelina Hunter Trio) hails from the Ottawa area and she is a powerhouse. Her beautiful vocals are not stand alone as she is a dynamic, accomplished electric lead guitarist. The girl likes to rock and she rocks hard. Her youthful energy, skill and passion for her craft gives her star quality. She brings all she has to the stage, and we are better for it. This will be her first appearance at WBR. And then there is Celeigh Cardinal. They call her the Folk Songstress from the Northern Prairies. She has been making music history. Her album "Stories from a Downtown Apartment" won a Juno award for Indigenous Music Album of the Year in 2020. Her gorgeous vocals defy labels as she embraces Pop, Fok, Blues and Metis Soul. Her song writing talent has kept her music original and authentic. "Light of the Moon" won her the 2024 "Songwriter of the Year" honor at the Western Canadian Music Awards. Now living in Edmonton, Alberta, it will also be her first appearance at WBR. And last but by no means least, is Joce Reyome. Considered a Blues sensation and a superb session musician (bass) Joce recently made her debut appearance at this summer's Ottawa and Mont-Tremblant Blues Festivals. The response to her shows was one of sheer pleasure as she inspired both audiences and critics alike. Transplanted from Massachusetts U.S. to Prince Edward Island in 2016, Joce has helped redefine the East Coast music scene. She won First Place in the Solo/Duo category at this year's International Blues Challenge in Memphis, the only Canadian to ever do so. The youngest of the headliners this year, her music can be seen as a window into the future of Blues. All three musicians are exciting new additions to an already superb lineup and a guarantee that this concert will be a night to remember.

I would be amiss if I did not mention the names of the musicians in the house band for this wonderful, historic evening. Each is an acknowledged artist with wild ability and huge talent: Elena Kapeleris, Carrie Chestnutt, Tara Kannangara, Alison Young, Angelique Francis, Emily Burgess, Jasmine Jones-Ball and Jennie Thai. The concert will be curated by the passionate and exceptional artist and musician Quisha Wint, who returns as producer for this 2025 program.

This year, The Women's Blues Revue will be celebrating its 38th year at the elegant and comfortable Roy Thomson Hall located in the heart of downtown Toronto. Mark your calendar. November 28th/2025. Pioneer Profile

Ian Angus



As the TBS celebrates our 40th anniversary, we want to celebrate some of the folks who were part of the early development of the TBS. Ian Angus was a prominent telecommunications expert (as well as a popular blues DJ) and was recruited to the board when our newly launched award program was being criticized as Toronto-centric and he brought in an outside firm to assure an arms-length process for the voting. He served as Vice-President and helped set up the TBS charter as a non-profit organization. If you were around in the early days of the TBS, please consider writing up some of your recollections for a pioneer profile

I was not a founding member of TBS. I was a big blues fan, I had a large record collection, and in the early 90s I was the technician and fill-in host for David Barnard's wonderful show on CKLN — Doctor Feelgood's Blues Emporium, later renamed Blue Soul.

In 1995 or 1996, I took over David's time slot with my show, Let the Good Times Roll, which ran for a decade on CKLN and later on CIUT, and, I was invited to join the TBS Board. As it turned out, my main responsibility was managing the nomination and voting process for the Maple Blues Awards.

I'd like to say that we carefully planned the MBAs and worked out appropriate structures and procedures right from the beginning, but that wouldn't be true. We didn't have any models to follow so we worked things out as we went along.

The TBS Board had previously presented a "Blues With A Feeling" award annually to a prominent Blues performer, often someone from the US who happened to be appearing in Toronto. The first recipient, for example, was Chicago blues great Willie Dixon. We initially thought of the Maple Blues Awards as an experiment, a slightly larger event that wouldn't need any special arrangements, to see if there was sufficient interest. The Board itself decided the nominations and mailed the ballot to TBS members.

Our first indication that this was much bigger than we expected was the fact that seats in the Montreal Bistro, where the awards ceremony was held, sold out very quickly. We booked a second room for overflow, but people seated there could only hear the ceremony, not see it, which caused some justified dissatisfaction.

More seriously, we heard concerns from Blues fans and musicians elsewhere in Canada that the process was Torontocentric, that MBAs should be a national program, and the voting should be open to all Canadian blues fans.

So for the second year we went back to the drawing board. I took on the task of recruiting a national Nominating Panel, composed of people from across the country who were: (a) knowledgeable about Canadian blues nationally and in their region; (b) not eligible to be nominated themselves; and, (c) not in a long-term business relationship with any potential nominee.

The TBS Board continued to nominate the Blues with a Feeling Lifetime Achievement Award, but all other nominees were selected by some 35 independent panelists, mostly DJs and music journalists. Only 3 TBS Board members, all DJs, participated in the Nominating Panel's discussions and

Initially, voting was by mail: TBS and other blues societies across Canada distributed the ballots to their members. That worked, but it limited participation in areas where no society existed. The process took a big leap forward when KMP Designs, a web development company, agreed to set up and host a secure system for registering and voting online. At the same time, lawyer Michael Ellis took on certifying the results.

We booked a much larger venue for year two, and moved to larger ones when we outgrew that.

I moved away from Toronto after nine years and resigned from radio, from the Board and from the Nominating Panel. The honorary Maple Blues Award I received in my last year is one of my most treasured possessions, and I have been pleased and excited to watch the continued growth of this important project from afar.

Lance Anderson **Swings for Ray Charles at** The Redwood **Theatre**

Keyboardist Lance Anderson is one of those rare musicians who seems perpetually in motion, his creative energy spilling from one inspired project to the next. Last night at The Redwood Theatre, he brought the house down again—this time with a heartfelt celebration of Ray Charles, the man who bridged gospel, rhythm & blues, and the American popular songbook. From "Hit the Road Jack" to "Nighttime Is the Right Time," Anderson and company reached deep into that soulful lineage that has long defined his approach—earthy, authentic, and deeply musical.

Anderson and the Redwood Theatre have become kindred spirits, musical allies in bringing back the real stuff-music with a heartbeat. Not long ago, the two paired up for Mad Dogs and Englishmen, that wild Joe Cocker-era revival that reminded audiences what raw passion on stage could feel like. And then there's The Band's Last Waltz, another of Anderson's ongoing tributes to the roots of Americana—the fusion of country, blues, and soul that gave voice to a generation. Each of these projects lives and breathes because Anderson doesn't deal in nostalgia; he restores the foundation, the rough-hewn timbers that hold up each song. No bar-band shortcuts, no worn clichés. Just the real pulse of the music.

Last night, though, he faced a worthy opponent: The World Series-Blue Jays vs. Dodgers—a battle that could have drained any crowd. Yet the night belonged to both. A flat screen quietly broadcast the game from an unassuming corner while the stage exploded in rhythm and fire. Baseball and R&B found common ground—each about timing, tension, and swing. As one band member joked, "Ray Charles could've hit cleanup."

The lineup was a powerhouse. Matt Weidinger took on most of the lead vocals, soulful and tender, with that slow-burn phrasing that lets the lyric breathe. Beside him, Jesse O'Brien, another keyboard wizard, traded licks and smiles with Anderson, the two pianos pulsing like twin engines of a southern freight. Anderson anchored the night from his Hammond A, summoning that holy rumble only he can coax from its spinning tonewheels. Kevan Mackenzie kept the groove steady and fierce, Gene Hardy



blew his tenor sax with the ferocity of a man chasing midnight, and Quisha Wint lifted every chorus higher with a voice that could stir the spirits of Ray's old Raelettes.

I spent the night with a camera in hand, slipping between frames of sound and lightcatching those fleeting, joyful exchanges that define live performance. The images say it best: musicians lost in the moment, audience caught in the glow, the spirit of Ray Charles alive and well on a cool Toronto night.

Guitar Talk:

Looking for my first electric guitar: a piece of my musical soul.

My journey began with a 1974 El Degas, a stunning replica of the legendary Gibson Les Paul, known as the "Black Beauty." Its deep, warm tone and solid mahogany body made every note unforgettable, especially when I cranked it through my trusty old tube amp.

By 1977, I traded that guitar for my first American Fender Stratocaster-a bright, versatile, and exciting instrument that opened a new world of sound.

Years later, I couldn't shake the longing for that original guitar. Recently, I finally turned a dream into reality: I acquired a Gibson Custom Shop Les Paul Custom, with dazzling gold hardware and intricate inlays.

Yet, even amidst this luxurious upgrade, a part of me yearned for my first love-the 1974 El Degas.

For over ten years, I scoured vintage shops, online auctions, and guitar shows, relentless in my quest. And at last, I found it—an exact 1974 model of that very guitar that ignited my passion.

Seeing it again in person was a decisive, emotional moment, reconnecting me with my musical roots.

It's fascinating how nostalgia exerts such a powerful influence. Surrounded by incredible instruments today, I spent nearly a decade chasing that one special guitar-proof that sometimes, memories are priceless and worth the wait.

Many things can hold our hearts; for some of us, it's quitars.

This is my story, but you can rest assured this very experience has played out for many who picked up a guitar and embraced the life.

Head)," a strong, new statement of resistance and resilience in the face of a world gone crazy. A languid, bluesy riff anchors the song, later echoed by a rootsy banjo, and diverted into reggae rhythms in the second verse, and echoing rock vocals in the chorus. "I will be there to the bitter end," Taylor sings, alongside producer Jim James, and you feel his conviction. The 5x JUNO-Award and Polaris Music Prize-nominated artist Taylor returns with the soulful new song that brings together alt-country grit and blues rock urgency with one of modern music's most distinctive voices: Jim James of My Morning Jacket. The single will be out on all major platforms. Recorded at Gold Standard alongside Aaron Goldstein, David Engle, Tony Rabalo and Anna Ruddick, the track carries both raw spontaneity and emotional weight. What began years ago as

an electronic-leaning demo that Taylor and Engle wrote for film/TV sync, has evolved into a fully organic, groove-driven anthem that feels as natural as it is powerful. www. juliantaylormusic.ca

Networking events within this conference allow for industry discussion alongside artist discovery through the showcase program.

city's heritage office) but the new owners couldn't use the name so it's called Dina's Tavern, because the name is still owned by Dave Yarmus, who ran the place for 20 years and has now opened another room on Oueen Street west which is called, of course, the Silver Dollar Room. The Oueen St. venue also serves as the (new) Comfort Zone, which used to be the after-hours basement room at the Dollar and for the moment seems to be more active with DIs and a late-night crowd than the main room. The elegant El Mocambo also seems to coming to the realization that an upscale room with prestige acts at big ticket prices is not that viable. A recent evening at the Elmo presented a who's who of Toronto indie artists celebrating the artwork of August Knight and we can only hope it will get more activity, blues and otherwise, because it is a great sounding room. And this just in: The Duke, Toronto's second oldest bar, has a new owner and here's hoping it can include some blues in it's future programming. You have to tip your hat to anyone who would buy a live music venue in these days but it bodes well for the future of live music in Toronto

Lily Sazz What Just Happened (Independent)

Lily Sazz, a long-time presence at Toronto Blues Society events and musical groupings, has released her first solo album, What Just Happened.

Sazz was the bandleader of TBS' Women's Blues Revue for over a decade, as well as a member of the band Cootes Paradise. Based in Dundas, Ontario, she has long been a respected keyboardist and performer in Toronto, Hamilton and beyond.

This first solo effort finds her sharing a deeply personal collection of songs that grew out of events in her own life. The ten songs on this record share her voice, piano and words to express herself after a period of change.

She also shares collaborations with many of her friends in the music community, a adding a diversity of voices and sounds to the production.

The first song on the record is "Goodnight, Sweetheart". It's a heart-rending song saying a goodnight that might also be a goodbye. She is accompanied by Colin Linden on slide guitar. As usual, he turns in a masterclass of a performance. He always seems to know just what any song needs, and this is no exception. The song, and therefore, the album, starts with a dramatic take on the So What theme that opens Miles' Kind of Blue album. It's a comfortable way to slide into this new collection of songs. Soon, the emotion and musicianship of the song makes you forget the opening, but it has served its purpose.

There are ten songs on here, and for me to review each one individually would detract from the wholeness of the record. Let's have a look at some of my favorites.

"In a Hurry" is a light-hearted number about city life and the constant effort of keeping up with everything. It has a good line

about the traffic situation that those who have been there will be able to relate to. Charlotte McAffee-Brunner, also known as Trombone Charlotte, delivers a great solo. Sazz calls to "cut the solo short, because I'm in a HURRY!"

Often, the guest musicians elevate a song by bringing exactly what it needs. "This Train is Rollin'", besides being a great song, features Harry Manx on guest vocals and an extended acoustic slide guitar solo that is riveting. "Future Me" has some beautiful saxophone on it, played by Darcy Hepner.

An outstanding number is "Isn't That So", written by Jesse Winchester. It has long been a favorite of mine. It was originally released in 1972 on a beautiful album produced by Robbie Robertson. The album is called Third Down, 110 to Go. Sazz is accompanied by Suzie Vinnick on guitar and co-vocal. Every choice Vinnick makes is the perfect choice. There's a beautiful piano solo as well.

Vinnick also appears on "Gaslight". Steve Marriner is on blues harp and Vinnick plays a crunchy rhythm guitar that fits perfectly. They make a great team. Meanwhile, Sazz is wailing "The man I love is giving me the gaslight!" It's a wonderful performance.

The album ends with another humorous number, "I Can't Jam". It's all about how Sazz can't jam because her chords are too complex, she plays too many notes, and more. Meanwhile, guitarist Mike Branton gives the lie to her claims as he jams like crazy over her chords and excess notes. It's a lot of fun.

While there are some songs that aim for humour, the album as a whole is reflective and, in places, sorrowful or desperate or just plain serious as she expresses her truths. She sings in a warm, natural, lived-in voice that is all her own. It reflects her personality and her truth just as much as her individual voice on the piano does. What Just Happened? never answers her own question but gives us the ripple effects of whatever it was that did happen. It left its mark on her, and she is able to share that mark with us through these songs. It's a remarkable album. (John Mulligan)

Clela Errington Walkin' Each Other Home (Independent)

When it comes to singers, there's nothing on earth quite as beautiful as a woman's voice. Far more emotive than even the best of male voices and capable of reaching notes with the capacity to pierce you through your heart in an instant, Clela Errington is among those to be considered something very special. Her fifth release, this low-key folkie is so much more than she pretends to be - with the vocal wallop of a veteran artist and, seemingly, as many musical interests and potential directions as befits her many

talents. This songbird, (as visualized on the cover of her last release, 2014's More Love and Happiness) is all ours and deserves our complete attention. One listen to Walking Each Other Home is all it'll take to take you

This sophisticated release reveals another significant strength: it's one thing to have a stunning vocal ability but quite another to use it to the greatest advantage by selecting smart songs to cover. With 8 of 10 song choices representing a significant range or musical landscapes - from folk to blues, to jazz and back, the listener is treated to Errington's ability to do more than re-interpret them. She makes these songs by artists she clearly admires - and owns them. Better still, her velveteen vocals tie the entire recording together through her injection of heartfelt soul into each selection. There's no genre-jumping disturbing the flow of the album - it's 'all Errington', which is quite an accomplishment.



While we're at it, she doesn't accomplish this entirely on her own. The connection between Errington's vocals and the quality of the musicianship is entirely simpatico. Both are stronger together and the sound quality on this recording is stand-out. Co-producing with the steady hand of Jimmy Bowskill, who expertly adds electric and acoustic guitars, pedal steel, acoustic bass and mandolin as prescribed by each composition, Errington is clearly and fully relaxed. The stunning keyboard work of Steve O'Connor is equally outstanding. With a rhythm section of Bowskill (acoustic bass) - Alec Fraser guests on "Careless Love", "My Dear Companion" and the final track - and Ian McEwan (drums) adding considerable depth in a warm, gentle manner. The addition of Chris Bartos' electric violin and back-up vocals from Jocelyn Barth (Errington's daughter) provide complimentary shades of colour to Errington's vocal power, without ever overpowering her lead.

Beginning with the slow, slinky "I Know You Rider" a traditional song covered by no less than Judy Henske and the Kingston Trio (!), its role in helping to build the kingdom of

the Grateful Dead is not lost on her updated approach. Here. 'rider' is an old blues term which references a lover but its theme of lost love is merely melted butter in her hands.

Another traditional song (made famous by Bessie Smith and covered by everyone from Elvis to Pete Seeger, Janis Joplin to Madeleine Peyroux), "Careless Love" mines the heartbreak of a relationship gone south, dripping with regret. Introducing mandolin and reinforced with some sublime piano work, lending an element of country to the piece.

Possibly a role model, Abbey Lincoln's "Throw It Away" is perfect Errington fare, dispensing words to live by, while the addition of accordion (O'Connor) for an extra dash of Cohen-like of despair, if not a slightly European flavour.

Can there ever be enough train songs with folkies? No. Errington's own "Standing on the Platform" stands tall amongst the company. A highlight, actually - she kisses the lyric with a jazzlike flourish, as Bowskill & Co. use acoustic guitar, piano, B3 and drums to simulate the actual train as it chugs along the tracks, gradually picking up speed as it draws closer.

Tackling the spiritual twist of bluesman Eric Bibb's "Don't' Let Nobody Drag You Down" is equally daring, yet Errington's jazzy approach still maintains the gospel-friendly original as her band accentuates the rhythm with electric guitar (and a touch of slide) and an exceptional piano groove while sturdy backup singers underline a needed element of church.

In a wild left turn, Errington's cover of Lucinda William's bluesy "Born To Be Loved" benefits from the liquid quality of her voice. Less raw and raspy than the original, she injects it a certain vocal clarity which serves to accentuate the lyric while Bowskill's tasteful electric guitar, warm acoustic bass and O'Connor's B3 provide her with a creamy-soft backdrop to pivot from.

Memphis Minnie's "Got To Make A Change Blues" allows Errington to stretch her bluesy side with a jazzed up treatment which also seems to invigorate the band. A rollicking run-through with acoustic guitar and piano featured alongside the foot-tapping power of this rhythm section, would make this a lot of fun to see and hear live.


No less than Linda Ronstadt, Emmylou Harris, Dolly Parton and Peggy Seeger have covered Jean Ritchie's near-sacred "Dear Companion" - a haunting song of lost love, which Bowskill nails with his expertise on country-friendly pedal steel. Errington accentuates her deep-dish lonesome sound with a turn on harmonica. Simply beautiful.

Another likely role model for Errington might well be Eliza Gilkyson - here covering her "Once I Had A Home". Pure emotion and an unerring sense of longing for home is found at the heart of this song and Errington delivers this with ease, her band backing it up with delicate touches of drums, piano and B3. This might be one of the album's most impactful songs - revealing Errington's voice as even more than a gift, bringing tears to the eves.

An additional original is Errington's "Full Moon Dart Time". Any fan of the Everly's ability to harmonize will appreciate the power of this mother-daughter duet, which they have perfected over the years. Gentle

guitar and Bartos' electric violin (adding some interesting effects) support this tender combination without ever detracting from the intimacy of this showcase. Written to comfort a friend dealing with family issues, this closing track pays tribute - as well - to the beauty of the human voice.

Let Clela Errington take you for a walk with this new release. It serves up an emotional intensity on a truly personal level as it calls attention to an artist who truly deserves a much larger stage. A good, caring listen to this recording makes it all the more unbelievable that this hasn't happened before now. With luck and added exposure, it will. (Eric Thom


