

Single Season

The music business has undergone a serious transformation and one of the notable effects has been the re-emergence of "singles". All those streaming platforms have focused the listening public's attention on "the song" rather than "the album". As a result, many artists are opting to release singles ahead of the album, or not even worry about making an album. The name of the game is getting your music out there.

Blue Room fans will be delighted to know that their boys (always a fixture at the Beaches Streetfest) have released some new music. The single is called "A Little Walk" and features Brian Neller-vocals, Paul Sanderson-guitar, John Bjarnasonharp, Fraser Lawrason-fretless bass, Pat Quinn-drums, Brent Barkman-organ. The song was written by Brian Neller and Paul Sanderson and produced by Russ Mackay for Blue Sound (Distributor: Distro Kid). Not content with a simple single, Danny Marks has upped the ante and included a "B-side" (just like the old days!) His new double-sided single "One Way Ticket Home" b/w "Please Mister Conductor," is out now through Cabbagetunes Records. The release unites Marks' authentic voice and masterful guitar work in a celebration of homecoming, resilience, and the spirit of the Blues. A lifelong pillar of Canadian music, Marks began playing guitar at age 11, later co-founding Edward Bear, who opened for Paul Butterfield, Led Zeppelin, The Byrds, Badfinger and Humble Pie. and his award-winning solo career spans acclaimed albums like 'Guitarchaeology' and 'Cities in Blue'. Since 1997, Danny has hosted BLUZ FM on JAZZ FM91, cementing his reputation as a trusted voice of Blues culture.

Reflecting on the songs, Marks says, "I got down to the station a little bit late and jumped on board without proper fare. Blues is truth. Every song is a story, and these two are pages from my life." Truth-telling is the heart of Marks' songwriting: real experiences turned into musical allegories that anyone can feel.

The A-side, "One Way Ticket Home", was born from a personal chapter of resilience following a devastating house fire. In its soaring chorus, Marks sings 'Home is where the heart is" capturing a universal truth about belonging, recovery, and the pull of familiar ground. It's a pledge of hope set to a driving Americana rhythm, shaped by a twelve-string Rickenbacker that channels the classic spirit of the Traveling Wilburys.

The B-side, "Please Mister Conductor", turns up the heat with raw, unfiltered Blues energy. Based on a true story of jumping aboard a train to Hamilton to sing with Lori Yates, Marks transforms the tale into a soulful plea—"Please Mister Conductor, won't you let me ride your train." The song carries humor, humility, and redemption all in one groove.

Both tracks feature an all-star lineup: Alec Fraser Jr. on bass, Jonathan Goldsmith on piano, Robert Piltch on guitar, Barry Keane and Chuck D Keeping on drums, and Gene Hardy on saxophone. The songs were produced by Marks and Fraser Jr., mixed and mastered by Jeff Wolpert, with the memory of Peter J. Moore honored throughout the project.



Spencer Mackenzie has released not one, not two, but THREE singles from his forthcoming album, *Empty Chairs*, releasing February 20th, 2026 on Gypsy Soul Records

"What You Do" is Spencer Mackenzie's 1st single and it makes you question when we say we are fine, are we really? Or are we just trying to save others over ourselves? We think we are doing the right thing, by holding up a lie, but we aren't! "What You Do" is a high energy blues rock song that's meant to bring your attention to the guessing game we all play and being able to see right through someone.

"Shoot Me Down" is Spencer Mackenzie's 2nd single. Released on October 24th, it cuts deep with its swampy slide guitar and stripped-down blues-rock grit, a raw reflection on one-sided love and the weight of carrying a relationship alone. "How can you hold up both ends if you're the only one?" Every note feels like a push and pull between hope and frustration, the sound of giving everything to someone who won't meet you halfway. With each slide and sting of the guitar, "Shoot Me Down" reminds us that you can't spend your life making up someone else's mind if all they ever do is tear you down.

"Frozen Hearts," Spencer's 3rd single is a personal tribute honouring the victims of residential schools. With searing guitar riffs, soulful vocals, and a rhythm that echoes both sorrow and defiance, this song became a memorial in sound – ensuring that the voices of those who never made it home are forever heard. Writing Frozen Hearts meant confronting the painful legacy of children taken from their families, children whose laughter was silenced, whose lives were cut short, whose culture and identities were stripped away.

Miss Emily The Medicine Gypsy Soul Records

Emily Fennell is a blues singer, but her honesty and clarity mean she could choose any genre. She has a history of winning blues music awards. As a blues singer, she avoids cliché. She writes her own songs and has a distinctive voice. She also has a strong drive to sing her own truth. She's been singing for audiences since she was four years old.

Emily's commitment to singing her truth drives her artistry. When she performs onstage she sings right at you, driving a nail directly into your soul.

There is never anything pretentious about Fennell or her music. When she takes the stage, she pitches the tent right where she stands. Let the revival commence.

There ain't no use in lookin' back When the past is dark and reckless My dreams appear suspended In the time I should forget...

I was the one who held the key To my freedom...

Those are the opening words on the album The Medicine by Emily Fennell, also known as Miss Emily. The first song serves as a statement of purpose for this album. It's called My Freedom. She's leaving the past behind and steps into the now. The band lays down a groove worthy of Stax Records. Fennell delivers the song with ferocity. She means every word, as always.

The next song is Stand Together, Band Together. The title is the message. It has a

haunting backing track, powered by insistent drums. This album was produced by Colin Linden, so it follows that everything sounds great. There is a section where Fennell is joined by backup singers in a call-andresponse section of the chorus. It's an allpurpose inspirational anthem.

One of the most powerful tracks is The Medicine. "You took the medicine until the medicine took you," she sings. It is a lament about the losses of human life through the current drug epidemic. It's somber, with a nice organ part giving it a gospel feel. In its seriousness it never builds to a crescendo but remains sober and sorrowful.

Maybe is torchy in the best sense. Fennell belts it out, supported by an outstanding band. They play like they're happy to be on this song, supporting this magical singer. "I'm not telling you, baby..." The emotion, as everywhere on this record, is palpable.

You Make Believe is about the power of belief. Belief can save you, it can betray you. It can change your life for good or ill. Be careful what you choose to believe in."Where would we be without dreamers, baby?"

Running Again has a great vocal hook. Hot electric guitar comes in smoking about 2/3 of the way through the song. "It's all over before we get the words right...it's all right if it takes all night," she sings in a voice that turns sultry for just one phrase. This song is not about the words, it's about the feeling and the feeling is real.

Solid Ground. This may be the most moving song on the album. Any parent who has seen their child venture out into the world knows this feeling, hoping they have laid a solid foundation for their child to stand on. "I can't promise you I will always be around... at least I will have laid some solid ground..." As a parent, we hope we have done enough to give our child what they need to stand on their own. It is a feeling composed of hope, fear, and a longing so intense it borders on anguish. It is the longing that your child will be all right, whatever happens. That we have, indeed, done enough. Life is full of challenges and disasters, as well as joys and fulfillment. We wish, always, for the sun to shine on those we love. As a parent, we strongly hope we have helped them discover the inner resources to stand strong when the wind blows. Ferrell's delivery on this song is strong but restrained. The melody is engaging and powerful, and the band is majestic and supportive.

Smith's Bay Drowning is a song based on a poem by Suzanne Pasternak. Pasternak is best known for her book on the Halifax Explosion of 1917. This shipwreck poem has its roots in Prince Edward County, as does Fennell herself. It's a song she has been singing for years, and it's good to have it recorded.

Remember This Song is the last song on the album. It kicks off with a guitar passage that sounds like it was lifted from San Francisco, 1966. "Do you want to sing along, remember this song," she sings. "I want this to move you." The song is not simplistic. It is a song of thanks, and the arrangement is thrilling throughout. It's a great way to close out the album.

Ross Neilsen Within Tension Independent

What is "Within Tension", exactly? Ross Neilsen describes it as the pressure an artist feels, in-studio, as well as referring to the actual barometric pressure within the studio. Older era production giants like Jim Dickinson and Sam Phillips believed that the success of the recording process was influenced by the actual in-studio barometric pressure at the time of the session, based on its instantaneous effect on the recording artists themselves. Recording his 11th release in Sam Phillips' renowned Studio in Memphis, Neilsen has tackled this notion of tension - on both levels - with an eye to arriving at the perfect balance at this stage in his life. Within Tension, too, is the product of an acutely-focused attempt to reduce the stress of recording, if not a strong attempt to control its influence. His latest release brings you 9 original songs and 1 cover which - when absorbed in one sitting - delivers a progress report on where this chameleonic singersongwriter is today.

I first met Neilsen in Fredericton, where he was an up-and-coming local hero, given his strong talents as a writer and performer, together with his built-in blend of energy and enthusiasm. Based on his popularity, it seemed to trumpet the fact that this guy was going somewhere. And go somewhere he did - following his muse to various stopping points across the country and beyond, forever seeking a strong sense of place, if not belonging.

This seasoned road warrior has represented both Fredericton and Saskatoon at the International Blues Challenge in Memphis, together with multiple nominations in music competitions across the country. At the same time, between raising a family and touring constantly, Neilsen lives to play and steadily improves at what he does, evolving his substantial talents as a singer. a guitarist and a songwriter. To namecheck key influences, I once saw Neilsen burn up a Fredericton stage while teamed up with Cody Dickinson and the rest of his Hill Country Revue while time invested into Steve Earle's Camp Copperhead songwriting school in New York in '15 has only paid big dividends in Neilsen's ability to craft a smart lyric and glue it to a muscular melody.

There have also been bumps in the road – big bumps. Every artist goes through serious soul-searching when immersed in the largely thankless task of performing live music, getting there and back in one piece and slugging it out with venues for every dime promised. At the same time, these experiences, trial and tribulations not only build character – they provide the very meat and potatoes behind quality songwriting.

Enlisting friends and Memphis-ites John C. Stubblefield on bass, Rick Steff on all keyboards (both of Lucero) and Jay Sheffield III on drums, the chemistry seemed instantly in place. Mixing in the horns of Marc Franklin and Art Edmaiston (Little Feat) and added percussion from co-producer Kevin Houston on a few tracks and the barometer quickly pointed to fair weather.

Launching with the hard-hitting "Rock Ranger", you're immediately reminded of Neilsen's Rawk heritage. Always the rocker, Within Tension boasts both the bold, balls-to-the-walls component of his musical personality with the soft, tender side across these wide-ranging originals. Aside from Neilsen's big guitar sound (with tasty slide), a large presence from Steff's B3 and crack drumming from Sheffield III, this will scare the children – especially as it erupts into an extended jam.

"Best For You" cranks the speed even more, reminiscent of down'n'dirty ZZ Top with its hard rock pulse, underlining lyrics which tout total devotion and deep-set dedication.

Few know the "Road To Memphis" as well as Ross Neilsen – quite literally. He has created a tasty travelogue in praise of place, adding signature slide to Steff's standout piano. Perhaps their tourism board should be notified?

One might expect a sense of homesickness for the east coast with "Salt & Sea" – but you'd be wrong. A total change of gears as horns are

harnessed to create a slightly cosmopolitan feel, while added piano and Neilsen's vocal (with a reverb effect) to punch a lyric which espouses 'lightening up', for lack of a better phrase.

The next track – "Come To Be" – marks a sharp turn in the direction of this record and is the very best song on the album. Neilsen's elastic vocals allow him to roar with power or gently croon with the intimacy of a caring lover. Everything clicks – from the hook-ish melody to the soft instrumentation supporting the singer. The lyrics are the hero. A dash of B3 offsets acoustic guitar – the end result being a deep planting of an earworm which refuses to go away.

And then - "Devil's Picasso" – a complete turnaround as Neilsen and company erupt with guns a-blazing. It's a guitar and B3-driven rocker which, to me, conjures both Thin Lizzy and Uriah Heap (if you can believe it). Again, Neilsen's strengths on guitar are not to be understated as his beefy lead suggests here.

With a little tongue-in-cheek, Neilsen's perky "Troubled Mind" incorporates a little bit of quirky fun as it rocks back and forth, compliments of a sturdy rhythm section, while Neilsen's quitar spars with Steff's burbling B3.

Those familiar with Eddie Hinton's reputation won't be surprised by Neilsen's cover of a lesser known "Something Heavy". Like Hinton, Neilsen sports a soulful vocal whenever he wants to while, like Hinton, Neilsen's guitar-playing would command serious attention if he couldn't sing at all. So, in the spirit of Muscle Shoals, this comparably gentle, rhythmic track enjoys a sensitive reading from a fellow soul-searcher as the band follows suit. A stand-out vocal.

The horns return to add some majesty to "Good Enough" – another highlight track which makes the most of subtlety and a strong lyric as the song's intensity builds, paced by Neilsen's extremely soulful vocal. Again, the lyrics work like poetry while Steff's piano and minimal guitar serve the song. This is a beautiful composition which seemingly revels in heartbreak and lost love.

Likewise, the bittersweet "Bold & Beaten" begins with fingerstyle acoustic guitar and B3 backing while Neilsen turns in yet another gem, his vocal steeped in the sadness that comes with living life, taking its punches yet appreciating every minute of it. Neilsen shines in the light of the heart he wears on his sleeve.

Without doubt this is an album of extremes, yet it's all bound together by an artist who is searching for his rightful place. At the same time, he's already arrived there, driven by his deep desire to make bewitching music which speaks to everyone who hears it. This is an album—like many of his others—deserving of

an extended audience. And, while some of the 70's-style rockers may not be for everyone, his softer side remains his ace in the hole. (Eric Thom)


Don't Look Back is Mississippi Heat's 14th album. Straight From The Heart, the first, was released in 1992. Thirty-three years of discography—that's what you call experience! Mississippi Heat invents and charts its path built on talent, passion, and resilience... This new release features 14 tracks, including one instrumental. For the first time, Pierre Lacocque wrote and composed all the pieces in this consistent offering. His favorite subjects are inspired by his life experiences, his joys, interests, and concerns. Among other things, it talks about love, the devastation of drugs and alcohol, the pain of losing his father, who died at the age of 94 from COVID complications... In fact, all the artist's themes illustrate the "facts of life" with this positive and liberating vision, which is inherent to the Blues. Before talking about the album content itself, I think it is useful to mention that this opus was co-produced by Lacoque alongside Michael Freeman,

described as a "Legendary Producer" and also a Grammy winner. Another point to highlight is the participation of 21 musicians, including four female vocalists and one male vocalist, on this album, each invested in their contributing role for a harmonious and unified result. Once again, Lacocque exemplarily puts into practice his motto, "My motto is to build on the talents that surround me."The result is that each artist contributes to the delivery and expression of the message, as well as to the particular atmosphere of each of the songs.


The album opens with You Ain't The Only One, a driving shuffle interpreted by the energetic Sheryl Youngblood, the main vocalist who performs on nine tracks in total. The band is solid, Giles Corey's lead guitar is sharp and dynamic, and Lacocque's harmonica is very present. The tone is set!... The expressive Danielle Nicole follows with Third Wheel, a slightly slower shuffle; Billy Flynn is on quitar, Johnny Iguana on piano, and Lacocque heats up the harmonica! Thereafter, Inetta Visor & Daneisha Hamilton are not left behind when they interpret Quarter To Three. After three shuffles, Youngblood skillfully interprets Stepped Out Of Line, a slow, elegant blues, enhanced by a choir of three female vocalists. The entire track, interpreted impeccably, exhales soul and refinement! One can appreciate the solid performance of John Kattke on the organ. Moonshine Man is a lively harmonica duet with Omar Coleman on acoustic and Lacocque on electric. This driving challenge gives way to a knowing, well-supported dialogue between the two harmonicas! Shivering Blues, a slow blues, is, in my opinion, the album's pièce de résistance!... It's kind of a fresh look at St. Louis Jimmy Oden/ Howlin Wolf's classic "Going Down Slow". It is written by a son intimately connected to the painful passing of his father, André Lacocque, due to COVID, to whom this anthology moment is dedicated... It is interpreted with confidence, intensity, heart, and guts by Danielle Nicole, a truly exceptional singer! The entire band is wonderful in this deep blues, a blues of urgency... when life hangs by a single thread!...

From start to finish, there is no downtime on this album. It is dedicated to Carl Weathersby, guitarist and Soul Man who was a faithful friend of Pierre's! Overall, this 14th milestone of 14 tracks of blues & associated music is a rapid-fire offering that modulates acutely and navigates competently through the turbulent waters and deep emotions of the blues! Highly recommended! (Pierre Jobin)



Short Take: Gérard Herzhaft's The Great Encyclopedia of the Blues, published by Fayard in 1997 (450 pages), is a relevant and very well-documented reference tool that I highly recommend. Its original publication date is 1979. This encyclopedia by one of the most remarkable writers on American music has been translated into at least eight languages, including English, under the title Encyclopedia of the Blues, University of Arkansas Press (Second edition), 1997, 300 pages.

The first edition with the same publisher dates back to 1989, and it has since been reprinted six times. Gérard Herzhaft is a diverse, prolific, and fascinating author to discover! He received the Keeping the Blues Award from the Blues Foundation in 2014 (Pierre Jobin).



Blues Britannia: Can Blue Men Sing the Whites?

I was doing my usual YouTube journey last night — a bit of forging for berries in the Alaskan wilderness, a detour through historic lofts in New York City, and then a jaw-dropping study in the tech brilliance of China — Chongqing, a megacity of 32 million, where a single transit terminal could host an entire metropolis. It's architectural bravado at a level beyond comprehension. After the sensory overload of steel, glass, and light, I sought something familiar, human, and raw. That's when I stumbled across the BBC Four series Blues Britannia: Can Blue Men Sing the Whites? — and it stopped me dead in my tracks.

I'd already spent an hour flipping through Apple, Netflix, and Crave, scanning thumbnails like a lost miner searching for gold dust. Nothing felt right. I wasn't sure what another British documentary could teach me about the blues — that well-worn story of English boys repackaging the raw nerve of America's Black soul music. But what I didn't expect was the emotional precision, the social archaeology, and the honesty of what followed. This wasn't nostalgia. It was a revelation.

Post-war Britain was a wounded landscape. Bomb craters are still filled with rainwater. Brick chimneys coughed soot into the cold gray air. The nation survived on ration cards and tepid hope. For the young, there was little promise beyond a lifetime in the factory, a modest room with peeling wallpaper, and the weight of history pressing down like fog.

Music was still stuck in a parlour frame — sentimental songs that clung to pre-war notions of decorum and longing. The BBC spoon-fed ballads to an audience that had yet to shake off the Great War's shadow. But across the Atlantic, a different sound crackled through transistor radios: the explosion of rock 'n' roll — Elvis Presley, Chuck Berry, Little Richard, Jerry Lee Lewis. The spark of liberation. The blueprint for teenage rebellion.

When Elvis was drafted, Chuck got locked up, Jerry Lee scandalized himself into exile, and Little Richard turned to God — that bright flame dimmed. Yet for a restless new generation of British boys, the hunger didn't fade. They wanted something more profound, earthier, truer.

And then came the imports — vinyl slabs that carried the voice of the Mississippi Delta, the Chicago South Side, and the Louisiana juke joints. The faces on the covers were unfamiliar — proud, Black, weathered, mysterious. Muddy Waters, Howlin' Wolf, Elmore James, John Lee Hooker, B.B. King.

Their names sounded like thunder. The music within was a raw sermon — distortion, pain, redemption.

There was no 12-bar count, no polished production, no three-minute formula. Just instinct, repetition, and the heartbeat of a life lived on the margins. These young British kids — future Stones, future Yardbirds, future Cream — took that sound and made it their own.

They didn't mimic. They worshipped. They studied the phrasing, the tone, the feel. They went to the woodshed, guitars in hand, and returned with something transformed — a hybrid born of reverence and rebellion.

Here's what the documentary nails: the British didn't just copy the blues — they resurrected it.

In America, by the late 1950s, the blues had become background music for white audiences. It was juke music, bar music, the soundtrack to Black labour and heartbreak — dismissed as primitive by the same society that owed it its soul. But when Muddy Waters landed in London, guitar plugged in, roaring through "Hoochie Coochie Man," those young white audiences stood in rapture. They listened, learned, and bowed their heads.

The British press referred to it as the blues boom. Clubs like the Marquee, the Crawdaddy, and the Ealing roared with this new electric sermon. Alexis Korner and Cyril Davies led the congregation. The young converts followed — Mick Jagger, Keith Richards, Brian Jones, Eric Clapton, Peter Green, Jimmy Page, Jack Bruce, Ginger Baker, and John Mayall.

For the first time, the blues were not the background. It was front and center, a holy language being spoken anew in a foreign tongue.

The Stones carried that sound into the pop mainstream, forever tethered to Muddy Waters and Robert Johnson. The Yardbirds gave us a triad of guitar gods — Clapton, Beck, and Page — each channelling a different emotional current: Clapton's mournful clarity, Beck's screaming distortion, Page's dark mysticism.

John Mayall became the conservatory — his Bluesbreakers record with Clapton in 1966 was the gospel text. That Les Paul tone, pushed through a Marshall combo, was like lightning striking copper. "Clapton is God," someone scrawled on a London wall, and for a brief shining moment, he was.

Then came Cream. Bruce, Baker, and Clapton — three men who broke every rule of form and duration. They turned the blues into a canvas for jazz improvisation, modal exploration, long-form tension and release. Every bar of "Crossroads" or "Spoonful" felt like a cosmic negotiation between precision and chaos.

Meanwhile, the blues themselves came home to roost. The very artists who inspired the movement—B.B.King, Buddy Guy, Muddy Waters—found themselves suddenly in demand across Europe. Their pay jumped from thirty bucks in an American bar to a thousand a night in London or Manchester. For once, they were treated as the royalty they had always aspired to be.

What struck me most about Blues Britannia is the humility in the telling. The British musicians — Keith Richards, Jack Bruce, Mick Fleetwood, and John Mayall — all acknowledge where it came from. They speak with awe, not arrogance. They were custodians of a sacred fire, not claimants of a stolen one.

This wasn't cultural theft. It was cultural salvation. They amplified the voices of the very men America ignored. They reintroduced the blues to its homeland, dressed in feedback and fury. And in that act of translation, they lit the fuse for rock, metal, psychedelia, and everything that followed.

Watching those grainy black-and-white clips — Willie Dixon in a pressed suit, Sister Rosetta Tharpe shredding gospel riffs in a British rail yard, Muddy Waters grinning through a cloud of cigarette smoke — you can feel the world turning.

You realize that pain travels well. That the cry of the human spirit doesn't need a passport. Whether it's the Delta or Deptford, the blues speak the same truth: survival, desire, faith, and the long road home.

The doc isn't just about music — it's about empathy. It's about how one oppressed culture reached across the ocean and gave another the means to find itself. It's about how the language of suffering can become the architecture of liberation.

B.B. King once said, "The beautiful thing about learning is that nobody can take it away from you." By the time he died, after taxes and the endless grind of touring, he was worth around five million dollars — not vast by today's standards, but for a man who started on the plantation, it was redemption writ large.

Those British bands didn't just play the blues. They gave the blues a second life — one that still echoes through every bar band, festival, and street corner solo across the planet.

The film closes on that haunting question: Can blue men sing the whites? The answer, after all these years, is both yes and no. They didn't just sing the whites — they sang for them, with them, through them. And in doing so, they bridged the Atlantic not with money or politics, but with twelve bars of truth.


